THE RECTOR'S LETTER

All Saints' Rectory,
28th February, 1948.

Dear People of All Saints',

The 1948 Harvest Festival gifts were, once again, striking evidence of your desire to thank God for the bounteous harvest and to show your thankfulness by helping others in a very practical way. The response was excellent; it included a great number of gifts from all departments of our Sunday School, offered at the Children's Festival Service. We sincerely thank **ALL** our parishioners and friends for their kindly and willing co-operation in making the Festival a day of real Thanksgiving. The Church looked absolutely lovely, with its very effective Harvest decorations, for which Miss Adams and her helpers (Mrs. Yarrington, Mrs. Morris and Miss Hayes) were responsible.

We also appreciate the good work of the Choir throughout the day and the very practical help of Mr. A. J. Harris in transporting our gifts to the Home of Peace, where they were so gratefully received, as you may see from the Matron's letter on page three. Looking at the many gifts one could not fail to remember how much we in Australia have for which to give thanks; which should be an incentive to do all we can for our friends in Britain who still need all the food we can send them.

Lenten boxes and envelopes were issued at the beginning of Lent. As you know, all our Lenten offerings received through these boxes and envelopes are given to the work of the Australian Board of Missions and the Church Missionary Society. We would like to increase our Lenten gifts to enable both societies to extend their work in these days of tremendous opportunity. If you have not yet received your Lenten box or envelope, please **ask** for one when you come to Church; if you cannot attend, ask your District Visitor to bring you one.


I hope you will take advantage of the many opportunities your Church provides for the proper observance of Holy Week. Will you keep that week (which commences on Palm Sunday, March 21st) free from all social engagements, if you possibly can, so that you may be able to spend at least a part of each day in meditation and worship? You will find details of Holy Week and Easter services set out on the inset of this issue. There will, of course, be no meetings of clubs and societies during Holy Week; members are invited to attend the daily services, particularly on the day of their regular meeting. Our young people are reminded that the observance of this Sacred Season concerns **them** as well as their Seniors.

We again ask you to take your place on the side of those who, by word and deed, are endeavouring to keep the most sacred day in the year—Good Friday—as a Holy Day and not a mere holiday. The Church makes ample provision for you and all her people to spend this most sacred day quietly and thoughtfully. We continue to protest against anything which mars the solemnity of Good Friday. There are many amongst us who want this to be a Christian country, who want to think of themselves as Christians, regardless of the fact that they are doing nothing whatever to keep it or themselves Christian. I fail to see how we can claim to be a Christian nation whilst we permit, without a protest, the use of the Day on which our Lord was crucified on Calvary's Hill for us and for all men, as a day devoted to pleasure and material gain.

The best preparation for our Easter Communion is a proper observance of the days preceding Easter. It is only as we know the "Power of His Resurrection" that we are able to make effective our aspirations for a better world; only in His Power can the Church (which means you and me) rise above its failures and frustrations, and stand more powerfully for God and righteousness.

Gifts of white flowers for the Easter Festival will be very acceptable, and should be left at the Church or Rectory no later than Saturday morning, March 27th.

Harvest Festival Gifts.—The Rector has received the following letter of thanks and appreciation from Matron F. I. 
