Day of Prayer in connexion with the War.—The Archbishop of the Diocese has issued the following letter to the Clergy:—

“Rev and Dear Brethren.

“The Provincial Synod of New South Wales at the last Session passed the following resolution:—‘That this Provincial Synod requests the Metropolitan and the Bishops of the Province to take early steps for the observance by Church people of a week-day throughout New South Wales as a day of Prayer and Fasting to Almighty God that the Nations may be turned to repentance, and so the present disastrous War be brought to a happy termination. That the Heads of the other Churches be invited to take similar steps, so that the heart of the whole State may be touched.’ After consultation, it has been arranged to devote Wednesday, November 21st, as such a Day of Prayer in the several Parishes.”

We feel sure that the appointment of such a day will appeal to all who realise the seriousness of the times through which we are passing and that no one will allow the day to go by without taking their part in the united voice of supplication and intercession.

In accordance with a subsequent note, the following arrangement has been made for the observance of this important day in our own Parish, where united Services will be held in the Parish Church as follows:—

All Saints' Church.

Day of Prayer, Wednesday, November 21st, 1917.

7.0 a.m. Holy Communion.

4.15 p.m. Service for School Children

11.0 a.m., 3.0 and 8.0 p.m. Special Services of Intercession.

In addition to the above Services, the Church will, as usual, be open all day for such as desire to use it for prayer and meditation.

The Sale of Work and Gifts, in aid of the funds of the Church, has claimed attention during the past month. There have been several meetings of ladies who are interesting themselves in the various stalls, and on Monday, October 29th, a general meeting was held in the School Hall, at which there was a goodly attendance of ladies and gentlemen, and much interest and enthusiasm was shown in the movement. Messrs. Oliver and Stephenson have been appointed Secretaries, and the Churchwardens will, as usual, act as Treasurers. It was arranged that the next General Meeting of all Helpers, both ladies and gentlemen, should be held in All Saints' School Hall on Wednesday evening, November 14th, at 8.15; and also, that the proposed Social and Gift Evening, in aid of furnishing the stalls, should take place on Monday evening, November 19th, in the School Hall, at 8 o'clock. Mrs. Goddard undertook to have a Grocery Tea at the Rectory on Thursday afternoon, November 15th, for the purpose of helping to supply that stall. Arrangements were furthered for providing the following stalls: Soldiers' Comforts and Plain & Fancy Work Stalls, Groceries, Provisions, Hardware and useful articles, Flowers and Plants, Sweets, etc. There will be a Refreshment Room and various "Dips" and Competitions. The members of the All Saints' Choir have offered to provide a General Stall by their own efforts.

The Committee has held its final meeting, but as some monies are still outstanding, the financial result is not definitely known, but the Treasurer has reason to hope that it will be well up to the figure of former years.

IMPORTANT NOTICE.

While this Paper was passing through the Press news came to hand that "Our Day" for the British Red Cross Fund had just been fixed for November 30th. A meeting of all helpers was therefore called at which it was decided to hold 'the Sale' a week earlier viz. on Friday and Saturday, November 23rd and 24th, and the Grocery Tea at the Rectory on Thursday, November 15th instead of the 28th as printed in the Kalendar.

It is pleasant to record that the very representative gathering took in good part the unavoidable alteration in date and resolved that the shortening of the time should not interfere with the success of the Sale, as all agreed to speed up their preparation. We hope that all good friends who are working will follow this excellent example.

The Parochial School Annual Concert, in aid of the Prize and School Funds, will take place in the Petersham Town Hall on Tuesday evening, November 13th, at 7.45. The programme to be rendered by the pupils and friends comprises the Cantata "A Merry Party," by Junior Pupils; Illustrated Songs, Tableaux, Physical Culture Displays by Senior Pupils, and Musical Items by All Saints' Choristers and others. The interest of Parishioners in this annual public event, in connection with our Day School, will, doubtless, be continued again this year as always in the past so that we expect a crowded audience in the Town Hall on the occasion.

A Social and Gift Evening, in aid of the forthcoming Sale of Work and Gifts, will be held in All Saints' School Hall on Monday, November 19th, at 8 o'clock. There will be no tickets of admission, but each guest is asked to bring a gift to help **provide** the stalls at the sale.

All Saints' Day.—DEDICATION FESTIVAL SERVICES were held in the Parish Church on Thursday, November 1st, when we observed the Forty-seventh Anniversary of the Opening and Dedication of the Church. The Services were as follows:—7 a.m., Holy Communion; 11 a.m., Holy Communion; 8 p.m., Festal Evensong, preacher Ven. Archdeacon Martin, Rector of St. Clement's, Marrickville. At the Festal Evensong the Choir rendered special music. The collection was in aid of the necessary repairs to the Organ.




