LETTER FROM ACTING RECTOR

Dear Parishioners,

It may seem unrealistic to use that adjective when I am a stranger to most of you, but it does express at least the attitude that, as priest-in-charge, I should adopt to you all, for in Christ we are all one family, God's dear children. It also expresses the relationship which will develop between us as the days pass by and I get to know you better.

LENT

I want to say a few words about this season of self-discipline and preparation for Easter. The visit of our young Queen has been a revelation to us of something which has been repressed in us, a capacity for worship. For the Queen is not just a young and beautiful lady, but in her office she represents something which appeals to the deepest levels of our hearts. In her is summed up the expression of the best and noblest in our ideal of race and Empire. She is thus sacramental in her person and office, the outward symbol of an invisible and honoured reality. The outward often conceals that which it expresses of the inward and invisible. Lent comes to us with a challenge—can we offer to God that which we felt and offered to our Queen? God, as revealed in Christ and in Nature, is worthy of our highest adoration, "We needs must love the Highest when we see it." What hinders us? Is it not because we are so immersed in the cares and pleasures of this material world that we are unable to perceive the Presence of the Living God, revealed in many ways around us?

Two worlds are ours: 'tis only sin
Forbids us to descry
The mystic heaven and earth within
Plain as the sea and sky.

Thou who hast given me eyes to see
And love this sight so fair,
Give me a heart to find out Thee,
And read Thee everywhere.

Surely this means that a Christian should train himself to see God, in Christ, in every experience and in every place each day. He begins each day with a quiet time, when in the stillness of his own heart he becomes aware of God, and God's will begins to unfold as he reviews the engagements and occupations of the day. From then, he finds that God has gone on ahead of him to meet him at each step. We need to realize that all that is visible to us must first have been seen in the mind of its Creator, that all that happens must have been "foreseen" by God, and that for each of us there is a right and a wrong way of meeting it. Thus Lent is a training in the sacramental life, and when Easter comes our attitude to the Easter Communion will not be just formal, but the outburst of a repressed gift of worship and adoration as we receive the expression of the Love of God.

The Parish Council—Rector.—The Board of Nominators, on which our Parish is represented, is doing its utmost to fill the vacancy in the Parish with the least possible delay. who has been a tower of strength to the Parish during the period of our late Rector's illness and subsequent to his death. In the Parish's time of sorrow his presence and labours among us was a great comfort. We welcome the Rev. Hugh Linton, who has been appointed Locum Tenens, and we feel sure that he will receive the support of all parishioners in his work among us.

Our Future Clergy.—March 10, 12 and 13, Wed., Fri. and Sat., are **Ember Days** on which we, as members of the church, are asked to pray for those who are to be ordained at this season. They are to be the officers and leaders of the church in their generation. Can we expect the best from the Clergy if we are not interested enough to pray for them? Let us also pray that more young men may hear the call of God and offer their lives to His service—"Whom shall I send, and who will go for us?" "Here am I, send me."

Church Roof.—The recent heavy rains found further weaknesses in the church roof and emphasise the need for its complete overhaul. Minor repairs have been carried out from time to time but they have proved expensive and ineffective. The Parish Council is awaiting a report from the architects, and on receipt of this document it is hoped to call for tenders without further delay. Parishioners are reminded, however, that the Jubilee Fund is not yet closed—we have not reached our objective—and donations will be welcomed by the Hon. Treasurer.

Mothering Sunday.—Owing to the mention in the Epistle for the day of the words "Jerusalem which is above is the mother of us all"—from earliest days in England the fourth Sunday in Lent has been observed as Mothering Sunday, for our ancestors felt that sons and daughters who had learnt to honour their earthly mother were the right material for honouring their church, their heavenly mother. This is not to be confused with Mothers' Day in May, which has taken so much of its symbolism from the old English observance.

Women's Guild.—The Guild commenced the new year with a Gift Evening on Thursday 25th February, the gifts of groceries, fruit, etc., being used for the Harvest Festival and later to go to the Home of Peace. We are grateful for Matron Claydon coming along as our guest speaker and telling us all the latest news about the Home.

The next Guild meeting will be Thursday, 11th March, at 8 p.m. As this is an important meeting with the election of officers and planning for the coming year we hope all members and friends will be present.

The Choir.—For Easter this year the Choir has in preparation an Easter Cantata new to the parish of All Saints. It is "The Passion of Our Lord according to St. Mark." by Charles Wood. The work is beautifully conceived. Speech rhythm has been used most effectively by the composer in both the chorus parts and in the part of the narrator. By this means, the composer has been able to use the words of the Gospel without any alteration of the Biblical text in his musical setting.

The cantata commences and ends with the sturdy ancient passiontide hymn:—

Sing, my tongue, the glorious battle,
Sing the ending of the fray;
Now above the Cross, the trophy,
Sound the loud triumphant lay:
Tell how Christ, the world's Redeemer,
As a victim won the day.

As the Congregation will be invited to join in the singing of the hymns used in the cantata, an opportunity will be given to them on the Sundays during Lent to learn them by singing them with the Choir.

As the Choir has spent many months learning this work as their act of devotion for passiontide, and as very good soloists have been engaged for the occasion, it is hoped that the congregation will attend the service
