THE RECTOR'S LETTER

All Saints' Rectory,

29th March, 1952.

Dear People of All Saints',

This "Chronicle" will be available on Palm Sunday, the first day of Holy Week. Holy Week commenced with a procession and ended with one: but how different were the two processions—the cheering, enthusiastic multitude which poured into the city on Palm Sunday is in marked contrast with the rabble goaded to hatred which came from the same city on Good Friday morning.

Once again, we express the hope that Holy Week may be kept free from social engagements, so that we may spend some portion of each day in meditation and worship. Day by day throughout this Holy Week let us find some time to be with our Lord in the triumph of His love through the agony which the selfishness of men brings upon Him. Particulars of the Holy Week and Easter services were printed in the March "Chronicle," to which we refer you; but details of Good Friday and Easter Day services are re-printed in this issue. There will be no meetings of our clubs and societies during Holy Week; members are invited to attend the daily services, particularly on the day of their regular meeting.

We trust you will continue to protest, both by word and deed, against anything and everything which mars the solemnity of Good Friday. It is difficult to understand how we can claim to a Christian nation while we permit, without a protest, this most sacred and solemn day in the whole Christian year to be used merely for material gain and for pleasure. Your Church makes ample provision for you to spend, quietly and thoughtfully, the day on which our Lord was crucified on Calvary's Hill for us and for all men. We specially ask that parents will encourage their children to attend their own service, and that they will make it possible for them to be present. In addition to the morning service, which commences at half-past ten, we commend to you the Three Hours' Devotion from 12 noon to 3 p.m.

Should you be planning to be absent from the parish on Easter Day, will you help by sending or bringing your Lenten and Easter offerings before leaving? We are hoping to increase our Lenten gifts for the Australian Board of Missions and the Church Missionary Society this year, so that we may help both Societies not only to carry on their existing work, but to expand it, even in these days of increasing costs.

May we, on Easter Day, recall and re-affirm the "Power of the Resurrection" in our own lives and in the Church. Whatever we may think of Christ Himself, we are all rather apt to despair of the Church. It is declining, played-out, obsolete! If we are feeling uncharitable we change its name to "Organised Religion" (a horrible phrase!) and throw mud at that. If we still love the Church, we moan about the empty pews and the indifferent masses outside. Of course, we ought to deplore the Churches' faults and weaknesses. May we ever be preserved from complacency! But let us pause and remember that our pessimism may slide over into downright unbelief. It may disable us from doing the vigorous and cheerful work that needs doing now. Let us believe in "the Power of His Resurrection" in the world. I know that is difficult. We are only too well aware of the tragedy of our modern world. A generation that grew up under the stress of the first world war, has practically never known a world really at peace. We can see the unrest and the horrors of the world to-day: and at the back of our minds there is the threat of even worse things—biological warfare, atom bombs and so on. Again, let us pause in our thinking, and remember this is God's world. Nothing that has happened in our modern world is worse than what happened at Calvary, and the Cross was not the end of everything. Good Friday was followed by Easter, the Cross by the Resurrection

with its gospel of new life and forgiveness. Even in this great, struggling, sinful world the last word is never of death, but of life, for the holy purpose of God Almighty, the giver and sustainer of life, runs through everything. May we experience the abiding presence of the Risen Christ, and really know "the Power of His Resurrection" in the world, in the Church, and in our own hearts and lives.

Gifts of white flower for the Easter Festival will be very acceptable and should be left at the Church or Rectory not later than the morning of Easter Eve—April 12th.

Wishing you all a Holy, Happy Easter.

MATTERS MAINLY PAROCHIAL

Appreciation.—The following letters of thanks have been received from (a) The Matron of The Home of Peace, and (b) The Federal Secretary of the Church Army:

(a) "It was a great pleasure to receive the gifts from the Harvest Festival Services, held recently at All Saints' Church, and I would be glad if you will pass on to your parishioners our sincere thanks for their kindness. We feel that your people are sharing with us in Christian fellowship, in this very vital and necessary work, which is being done in the Name of our Lord and Master, and, therefore, in the name of our Church. Also in these days of rising prices, it is a tremendous help to have such donations of groceries, eggs, fruit and vegetables, for they greatly help to reduce the expenses. As you know, our motto is that we do not waste anything, so I can assure you that we really do use all commodities. To make the best use of your gifts and those from other parishes, I have organised several working bees to prepare fruit and vegetables for bottling and jam making, and as a result, the shelves are well filled with Fowler jars, containing tomatoes, pears, pineapples, beetroot, rhubarb, grape and melon and lemon jam, and sauces and chutneys. At the present time, we have over 75 patients, as well as about 40 staff to cater for each day, so the housekeeping problem is considerably eased when we receive such practical help. Receipt for £1 is enclosed herewith, representing extra donation. We are most grateful to the friends who also helped in this way."

(b) "Thank you very much indeed for the cheque for £8/18/8 from your parish, this amount representing the retiring collection on the occasion of my recent visit. I can assure you I appreciated the opportunity so kindly given to me by your good Rector; it is always a joy to tell our Church people what Church Army is really doing in their name."
