THE RECTOR'S LETTER.

All Saints' Rectory,

29th March, 1943.

Dear People of All Saints',

The Harvest Festival gifts this year were indeed a pleasant surprise! Knowing that many things are scarce, and many more very dear, we naturally thought we could not hope to do so well as in previous years. As a matter of fact, the gifts were more numerous than ever; and we are very grateful to **ALL** who responded so liberally, including the girls and boys of our Sunday School, particularly the Kindergarten Department, where the response was excellent. We record our thanks to all our parishioners and friends who by their gifts and service co-operated in making the day a real Festival of Thanksgiving. The Church was most artistically decorated for the Festival; Mrs. Morris and Mrs. Yarrington were not able, owing to bereavement, to take their usual part in decorating, but they had kindly obtained and prepared the wheat and corn, and Miss Adams, assisted by Mrs. Reilly and Mrs. Sinclair, were responsible for decorative work. We are indebted to Mr. McKinley for his kindness in transporting our Harvest gifts to the Home of Peace. You will find the Matron's letter of appreciation elsewhere in this issue.

When this letter reaches you, we shall be drawing near to another Holy Week (which commences on Palm Sunday—April 18) and Good Friday. So far as you possibly can in these days of war, will you try to keep that week free from all social engagements, so that you may be able to observe it in the way its name suggests, and take advantage of the opportunities your Church provides for meditation and prayer? Our younger people will, I hope, understand that the proper observance of this Sacred Week concerns them equally with the more senior parishioners. There will, of course, be no meetings of Clubs and Societies during Holy Week.

Then there is **Good Friday**. I have heard people getting into all sorts of heated arguments about the observance of this most sacred day of the year. There isn't anything to argue about. Either you realise that our Lord was crucified for us on Good Friday, and that that is the **ONLY REASON** for its observance as a holiday; or you do not. If you do; then you can have no doubt whatever where your loyalty lies. Your Church makes ample provision for all people to spend this sacred day quietly and thoughtfully in corporate acts of penitence and thankfulness. It is by making use of the opportunities provided throughout Holy Week that we best prepare ourselves to enter into communion with our Risen Lord on Easter Day. The trumpet call of Easter has never sounded with a clearer note than in these days of anxiety. Through pain and sorrow, through failure and death, through loss and defeat, God can bring the good cause to victory for those who have faith in Him.


It was Mr. Churchill's magnificent faith in our destiny which won the people of the Empire to his allegiance; **not** his ability. I could imagine some people daring to question his ability, but no one dares to question his faith. And his faith will win. It is our faith in God which will win. It may meet with little or no response here and there, but we are stewards of this faith and our task is to spread it abroad. Our faith in God, in response to God's faith in us, enables God to win His victories for righteousness. We often say "the right must win"; we do not allow ourselves to think otherwise; but we often overlook the fact that good causes have failed because of man's lack of response to God's call. It is an unhappy fact of man's history that God is ever coming into his life and he will not receive Him. "Behold I stand at the door and knock;" and at certain times in man's history God has knocked loud and long; the summons to open has been imperative; but, alas, man has not heard, or if he has heard, he has ignored the summons—and God is powerless because of man's failure to respond. But God never gives up faith and hope in man; He never lets us down.

It is our faith which collapses, our hopes which die, and we who let Him down. The assurance of the ultimate victory of good, should stiffen us for the endurance of all that may be involved in the conflict; but we cannot expect to have any part in that victory if we decline our share of the cost.

If you have not yet received your Lenten Box or Envelope, please ask for one. All our Lenten gifts go to the Australian Board of Missions and the Church Missionary Society. Most of us know how much we owe to the "boys" of the New Guinea Mission, who have saved many an Australian life in the present struggle. Those who attended the recent A.B.M. Rally in the Sydney Town Hall, will have some idea of post-war needs, and will want to do something practical to help rebuild the Mission Stations when the time comes to do so.

I would refer you to the last page of this paper for details of the services for Holy Week and Easter. Gifts of white flowers for the Easter Festival will be most acceptable and should be left at the Church on Saturday morning, April 24. We wish you all a holy, happy Easter—a happiness that the world can neither give nor take away.

Women's Guild.—The annual meeting of this society was held on Thursday, March 25. The Rector presided, and there was a good attendance. The secretary's and treasurer's reports showed that the Guild's various activities are in a healthy state. The former showed work dealing with the spiritual and social side, and the latter, of course, with finance. During the year amounts raised totalled £158, which had been disbursed between the Parish Hall Quota Fund, Curate Fund, A.B.M., C.M.S., CENEFF, C.A.S., H.M. She is leaving Petersham to reside in Goulburn and our best wishes go with her to her new home. During the evening presentations were made to the President, Miss Adams, and the Treasurer, Miss Lucas, and the meeting was brought to a close with the dispensing of supper, provided by members of the executive. Next meeting, April 8th, Bible Study—the Rector. We face another year of work with a high courage, and “go out into the darkness putting our hands into the hand of God.”

During the month the annual picnic was held at National Park. A number of members made the trip, and a pleasant afternoon was spent with cricket bat and ball, and in the charms of the park, and in the comradeship which is such a marked feature of Y.C.I. outings.—D.B.H.

Special organisations, Choirs, etc., are invited to march as special groups, wearing robes, or uniforms.
