Asian Church Women's Conference Multicultural Concert of Praise

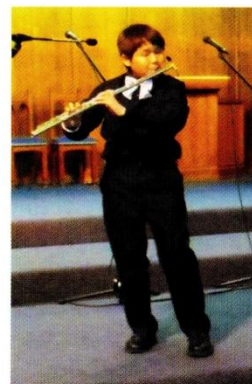
The annual service for Asian Church Women's Conference was celebrated by the NSW State Unit Inc of ACWC on Sunday 11th September, again taking the form of a multicultural concert of praise. The concert was held at Eastwood Baptist Church before an overflow congregation of 220 + people. We thank the Eastwood Baptist Church for their hospitality and support on the day and in the weeks leading up to the concert.

This year's concert was notable for its variety. The audience was treated to a feast of items that ranged from a very young flautist, Master Brian Kim, who thrilled us with his rendition of *Fantasie No 2 in A minor by Telemann*, to Chinese cultural dancers with a dance interpretation of *The Lord is My Shepherd*. A Korean Salvation Army brass band provided musical items before, after and during the concert as well as accompanying the congregational singing and performed with a high degree of excellence. Two choirs participated in the concert, the Sydney Chinese Association for Sacred Music and the Fijian Choir from the Uniting Church Parramatta. The contributions from both choirs were musically delightful and spiritually inspiring. Twelve lovely smiling young women from The Salvation Army Wollongong captivated the congregation with their skilful timbrel displays. Two vocal soloists, Mary Ree and Lisa Kim moved everyone present with their beautiful voices raised in soulful praise to their Lord. It was especially interesting during the concert to hear the two Cantonese vocalists say how they had met at a previous ACWC Concert of Praise.

During the concert an offering was received for the work of ACWC. The concert ended with the whole congregation joining in singing the paean of praise *Majesty*. The magnificent accompaniment to the hymn by the Eastwood Baptist Church organist brought the concert to a brilliant conclusion and its highest note as every voice was raised in joyful praise – ***Unto Jesus be all glory, honour and praise!***

Report of National Conference 2011—Adelaide

National Conference Adelaide was held at Immanuel College, Novar Gardens. Accommodation was comfortable, meals excellent, and the college gardens displayed some beautiful flowers, especially roses, and lovely trees.

Renewing friendships and making new friends has to be a highlight of such gatherings, and this conference was no exception. *Turning Darkness into Light* was the theme of the South Australian National Executive, providing the focus for the Ecumenical Service and devotions. My recollection of Father Anthony Kain who was the speaker at the Ecumenical Service is that darkness is not necessarily a negative thing, but rather something that can be useful if used wisely. We don't need to dispel all darkness, but we must not let it overcome us. Some of the devotions led by State Units explored this concept in a helpful way.

In a short thanksgiving service, members of Australian Church Women who died in the last two years were remembered. Acknowledgment was made of those who have been accorded recognition in church and community, and thanks given for all.

Bible studies were based on Colossians. The Rev. Joan Riley, an Anglican priest in Adelaide, gave us a good grounding in the community at Colossae before delving into the text. She then looked at the current situation of refugees and related their plight to the situation in Colossae at the time Paul wrote. Her personal encounter with refugees has made her think hard about the current situation, and some personal stories from Conference participants pricked our consciences too.

Business sessions were rather tense at times. By bringing in 'experts' to talk about incorporation and insurance, National Executive helped many in attendance to understand how these issues affect us. We must meet the legal requirements of our day, and the ACW Constitution is a case in point. More work is needed to refine this document.

Reports were received from National Conveners, State and Territory Units, National Denominational bodies, and World Day of Prayer.

Some of the stresses of finding and supporting Winifred Kiek scholars were given an airing, mainly because when National Conference is in Adelaide all the Trustees are able to attend. It is certainly instructive reading.

The new General Secretary of Asian Church Women's Conference, the Rev. Lee Moon Sook spoke at the conference. Since taking office the Asian region has been faced with crisis situations in a number of countries. From Australia Moon Sook was continuing to Lebanon where she will attend a meeting of the International Committee of Fellowship of the Least Coin.

Hearing of *Tutti* one evening was truly enlightening. This organisation works with and for young people who have disabilities and whose ambition is to find employment in the performing and visual arts. Up to forty are undergoing full time professional training to equip them for a career, while others are members of programs to enable them to perform in a range of concert and theatre events through a socially inclusive choral program. Two young women performed for us.

At Rostrevor College, a Christian Brothers boys' school, an Indigenous Sports Academy operates for students from Year 7 and at present has 43 students. The stated aim is to give a good all round education so that the boys will have the courage to walk in two cultures. Academic and practical subjects which prepare for business, commerce, art, engineering, building, conservation and land management are offered. A course appropriate to girls is under way at Loreto in Adelaide.

Four members of Conference, Donna Bryan (Vic, ACWC), Angela Devlin (ACT), Fran Moss (Qld) and Marion McCall (SA), formed a panel, and in a good humoured way gave an insight into their lives. Marion McCall is a real high-flyer and has her pilot's licence. It was informative and good fun. Continuing the fun theme, we shared our general ignorance at a trivia night. A bus trip took us to the Colonel Light statue for a view over Adelaide city before visiting Hahndorf. At the formal dinner a group of three – Mum and two daughters – sang for us.

We welcomed the incoming National Executive from Western Australia, whose theme is "Our Choice is Love" and wish them well, offering our support for the next two years, after which time we will be called to follow on.

We continue to ask why is Government still trying to return to Malaysian Asylum Policy when the High Court ruled it illegal. On-shore processing should be a means of addressing the needs without punishment. It is the smuggler who should be punished. There is a need to overhaul the Justice system. Every state is different for prison and corrective services and indigenous people are more numerous than others.

Health reforms are being encouraged to allow aged to stay in their homes. This is now complicated by some Councils trying to force elderly out of their homes to acquire them for families because of housing shortages.

Trafficking of Women. Did you see Four Corners and following Reports on the Sex Trade in Australia? Yes, it is happening here.

Now that Parliament has returned be aware of any matters that require our input as Christian Women—e.g. Same Sex Marriage and the Anti-Gambling Bill; Anti Death Penalty Proposals to encourage all countries to adopt this stance unanimously.

Why did Parliament go ahead with Carbon Tax? Survey Reports 17% YES, 63% NO 20% UNDECIDED Surely no Mandate Why put on a tax and then offer refunds to those who have to pay?

CARAMEL WALNUT SLICE

125G Melted Margarine
1 cup SR Flour

BASE:
Stir flour, sugar and coconut together with the melted margarine.
Press into a greased slice tin lined with baking paper
Bake in mod oven (180) for 10-15 minutes until golden.
Cool slightly.

TOPPING:
1 cup brown sugar
180gm. Butter
180gm. Walnuts (crush slightly with palm of hand)
1 teaspoon vanilla
2 tablespoons honey
1/4 teas. Salt

Put into saucepan and stir until the butter melts.
Simmer for 10 minutes, stirring often.
Add walnuts and vanilla. Put onto slice and bake until it looks firm (10-15 minutes).
Cut slice while still warm (NOT HOT) into small pieces (it is very



DREAM BARS

4 oz Melted Margarine
1/2 cup coconut
1/2 cup brown sugar
1 cup S.R. flour

Mix all together (add extra flour until mixture is firm)
Press into slice tin lined in Glad Bake also grease pan.
Cook 15 minutes on Medium heat (180)



FILLING:

2 eggs
Vanilla essence (1/2 teaspoon)
1 cup coconut
1 1/2 cups brown sugar

Mix all together then add 1/2 cup Walnut pieces (lightly crush with hand before adding). Put on top of slice and cook until brown (approx. 20 minutes)
Turn oven to 150 if cooking too quickly.
Dust with icing sugar while hot

COCONUT SLICE (Using the same Base from the above recipe)

Cover the base with any kind of jam
Mix together 2 eggs, 1 cup coconut, 1 cup sugar, vanilla and spread over the base and cook for 20 mins (180)
