RECTOR'S LETTER

My Dear Friends,

Our Annual Fete has now been held, and what a wonderful success it was. On the day of the Fete we counted £570 and more money has come in since. Everyone worked with a grand spirit of making it a success and our efforts were greatly rewarded. I said in the last "Chronicle" that I hoped we would be able to pay off £500 of the debt on the Parish Hall and this week when the Parish Council met they did that. This means a saving of £30 per year in interest. There is now just under £500 still owing on the Hall. What a wonderful thing it would be if in 1959 we could completely remove the debt. To all who worked so wonderfully for the stocking of the stalls and to all who brought or helped in any way, I offer my sincerest thanks.

A new Brochure has been printed dealing with Parish affairs and the progress made, and copies of this will be distributed by the canvasser* who are now making visits in various parts of the parish. A number who promised to contribute weekly sums to our general funds have not sent in anything during the year. Canvassers are concerned with these cases first and then hope to get new contributors.

Sets of envelopes cost money and for people to take these and make no use of them means they are a liability to us. In several cases adults have said they sent envelopes to Sunday School by children, and in some cases we have not received them. Please be careful who you send your envelopes by. Children sometimes are tempted to think they can do things and no one will know. There is a letter box in the front door of the Rectory where many adults place their envelopes and safety is assured to all placed there. It is embarrassing to all when the envelopes are not received. Please remember that even if a note is placed in one envelope to cover a period, ALL EMPTY ENVELOPES should be sent in to cover that period. Some seem to think we do not need all the envelopes, but we do to keep our books in order....Quite a few adults lose their envelopes. Please make use of the wall holder and hang it up in a safe place, then you will know by the date on each envelope whether you are ahead or behind with them. I am satisfied that the Weekly Contribution Scheme is the only way to keep the Church solvent. It is businesslike, Christian and in keeping with Holy Scripture, 1 Cor. 16-2. In trouble we soon fly to the Church for help, but three quarters of those who call themselves Christians give no regular support to the Church.

Some people help the Church in various ways. I want to pay tribute to the voluntary work which has been done around the Church property in the last three years. One silent worker is Mr. Garnett who from time to time comes in and cuts all the Church lawns. He came in just before the Fete and made all the lawns look very nice. Mr. Garnett cuts lawns as a business, but never charges the Church. Thank you Mr. Garnett.

For some time I have been more than greatly concerned with providing more spiritual help for the children and so I have asked Miss J. Napier who is the Scripture Union Secretary, to organise with the help of others, a Junior Christian Endeavour branch. This will be for boys and girls of nine to twelve years of age. They will meet on the first Sunday afternoon in February at 2.30 in the Parish Hall. As an ex-Endeavour member I must confess to owing a great debt to the Society.

A kindly gesture, much appreciated by us all, was recently made by one of our Churchmen and his wife who wished to remain anonymous, in meeting the interest on the Parish Hall for the year, amounting to £50. Such thoughtful acts greatly encourage us and we thank them for their kindness.

Christmas will soon be with us again. I will welcome information about any desiring Holy Communion in their homes. This is a very busy season but any desiring private Communion may have same by letting me know as soon as possible. District Visitors do a wonderful work and often supply me with names but occasionally some folk are overlooked. The great need in this very busy parish is for more District Visitors, some visit nearly 200 homes per month. I wish I could get more who would offer to do a small number. It means distributing the "Chronicle" and finding out how the people are in health, etc. Most people welcome such visits.

During January my wife and I will be away but the Rev. and Mrs. Harold Scott, of Ballan, Victoria, will be in residence at the Rectory. I feel sure that Mr. and Mrs. Scott will enjoy the fellowship here at Petersham. Mr. Scott will take the Sunday Services on January 4th, 11th and 18th, and will be available for such other urgent calls as may arise, such as funerals, etc.

May I take this opportunity on behalf of my wife and myself of wishing you all a very Happy Christmas and a Prosperous New Year.

The Senior Parishioners Club will hold their first Christmas Party on Saturday, 20th December at 2 p.m. Will all members please attend?


Many thanks to Mr. and Mrs. B. Tant and Miss Winters for their generous donations towards our Christmas Appeal.
