My Dear Friends,

To everyone who gave and worked I want to express my sincere thanks.

The Sunday School picnic was held on Saturday, 26th November, and was another very happy function. The weather was good and the two double decker buses were loaded with happy children and parents who returned from Watson's Bay saying the proverbial "A good time was had by all."
