ROYAL COMMISSION ON OFF-COURSE BETTING

For many years, certain interests have been urging the Government to legalise off-the-course betting. The specious plea has been advanced that if this evil is legalised, the new law can then be effectively enforced, and the Government will get extra revenue, as will, of course, the people who are planning to get the new licences. If the police do not enforce the law now, why should they succeed in doing so when a new Act of Parliament is passed. Does anyone seriously imagine that the small backroom S.P. "operators" will rush to become legal, simply because a new law is passed? The fact is that the volume of gambling will increase—especially among housewives and young people—if S.P. is legalised. The law CAN be enforced now if the authorities want the Police to enforce it.

But for the strenuous endeavours of the N.S.W. Council of Churches, the State Government would have legalised off-the-course betting early last year. The Council's vigorous campaign convinced the Government that such an anti-social move would be resolutely resisted and the proposal was dropped for the time being.

Now, elections over, a Royal Commission has been set up on off-the-course betting. The Council of Churches has been so active in exposing the evils which would ensue from legalised S.P. that it is bound to make its representations before the Royal Commission, and its Legal and other expenses will amount to £2,000.

Five organisations with a financial interest in racing are also appearing, and the Council is appealing to Christian people for this sum. Equally, the Rector would like to hear from any parishioners who prefer the existing hours.

The matter is at present only at the stage of seeking opinions, and no decisions have been made to alter the present times of our Services.

FROM OUR KOREAN CORRESPONDENT

The following are extracts from a letter received by the Rector from David Cobbett, now Archdeacon of the southern provinces of Korea. He is well remembered as Assistant Minister at All Saints' last year, and his letter contains a thrilling account of work that Archdeacon Cobbett is doing in this war-torn country. The need for finance is urgent and the Rector will gladly accept offerings from parishioners and organisations to forward to Korea. The letter begins:

"After a very long journey in two ships, with a rather slow and very rough time between Hong Kong and Formosa, when the ship actually made no speed at all because of the frightful sea, we eventually reached Pusan on 1st December. When we were allowed on shore, we found that many folk from the Church, including many dear old ladies had been waiting for longer than five hours! We hired an ox cart to take our luggage while we walked along with the church folk, for actually the church and house are only a few minutes walk from the wharf.

As far as the life and work and worship of the Church is concerned, I have always noticed that church folk are very diligent and faithful even in the most severe weather. There was great suffering during these cold months. The Government has really done a great job clearing the streets of hundreds and hundreds of beggars, but the trouble has been to know where to put them, how to set them to work, how to feed them and how to keep them warm. The local authorities here rounded up 500 of them.

There is a purpose and hope alive in the members of my congregation here. At the beginning of this year, we renewed our very simple Korean-style Stewardship Campaign and the Christians promised to raise 14,0000 Hwan every week by direct giving. This is a lot from a small group, as they are mainly very poor, for example, only about six or eight of them have a decent job; and 14,000 Hwan would be five pounds per week. We have promised to send three-quarters of this money to the Diocesan office towards our self-support programme. Meantime, although the paint is peeling and dropping from the walls of the Church, the actual building is sound and solid. All financial decisions are made by the church committee, and this year for the second year in succession the congregation elected a lady Church-warden. This is really something for the Orient where women are supposed to keep silent and unseen. . . .

For a long time I have wished that our church could undertake something to help in the making of jobs. Just a month ago, a tiny piece of land was acquired on one of the hillsides, a large ex-army tent was bought, the coal brickette machine, and the powdered coal. Our little coal brickette factory is now in production, employing the large number of three men. . . . but its a beginning. . . .

You may be wondering about the Sewing School. We were flooded with entries, mostly from dozens and dozens of very poor, jobless girls and we accepted as many as we could. The Sewing teacher is shortly to be Baptised, and she has made it quite clear to the girls that they ought to be in Church on Sundays. We are hoping to find a female Social Worker (Korean) who can meet these girls in their homes and encourage them in matters of health, food preparation, baby care, etc. . . .

We of the Anglican Parish hope to start a Housing Co-operative in the near future. We plan a big meeting, at which two leaders of the

Co-operative movement, both Koreans, are coming to talk to our people. A friend of mine assures me that in the future, if these Co-operatives grow amongst members of the Church congregations, it will mean that the financial leaders of the country will be Christians. It is very urgent to help our people to save even out of the little they have, so doing away with the grinding poverty and often near starvation that dog their tracks year by year. You will realise that being a Missionary in Korea to-day involves a little more than taking services and Bible Classes on Sundays.

As another venture into the dark unknown, we rented two floors of a building as a Students' Study Centre. We bought some chairs and light shades, were given some tables by an American family (who had to sell all their U.S. possessions to get here) and on the opening night, we had at least 60 students. The Centre is now open from 9 a.m. to 9.30 p.m.; students bring their own books and just sit down and study, read, or do their homework. It is the only place of its kind in the city of Pusan, a city of 1,300,000 people, and there was just enough money to provide chairs for 40 students. The rest have to stand up! . . .

Our Kindergarten School is now under way with 64 children daily. How long we will all be able to fit into the Church building here is a mystery. We will have to hold three Communion Services here before long; our immediate problem is how to handle the large number of people who want to be prepared for Baptism. The opportunities at the moment are wonderful indeed."

Can you help David Cobbett's cause. The Rector would like to raise fifty pounds to send to him, and any donation, no matter how big or how small, will be very gratefully received.

This month, we hear from Mrs. Dot Shaw, Honorary Secretary of the Senior Parishioners' Club; who tells us about this organisation.

Senior Parishioners' Club:

We have just entered upon our fifth year.

In April, 1958, this Club started in the Parish Hall with eleven members. Every Thursday afternoon since, (with the exception of Christmas Week and Holy Week) we have met together at 2 p.m. for a happy social afternoon.

Our full membership is now 60 people (both Ladies and Gentlemen attend) and each week we average 45 to 50, all of whom have an enjoyable time. Numerous types of games are played and lots of small prizes are given away each week.

The Club members raised sufficient money to purchase ten Laminex folding tables which we make good use of. At the present time, we are negotiating to buy an electric heater for our Club use. We sincerely thank Mrs. L. Teale for her generous donation towards this much needed commodity.

During the years, we have purchased good crockery and are able to serve very pleasing afternoon teas. We sincerely invite anyone who is interested in this Club to visit us at any time; it is not necessary for visitors to come regularly. Just pop in for afternoon tea and a chat, and one of our Ladies will be only too willing to explain to you our activities and the wonderful amenities available.

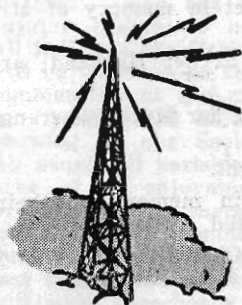
We have found that many of our members are folk who live alone and seek companionship. If you are one of these people, or if you know anyone in this position, we invite you to join us, or get in touch with the Rector. If you wish, we will call personally and give any information required.

Ask any members of the Senior Parishioners' Club just how much the Club means to them personally. I know what the answer will be.

Apart from our Social activities, we decided several years ago to hold sales of second-hand clothing. The entire proceeds from these Sales go to Church repairs and improvements. We depend on our parishioners to keep their used clothing, blankets, curtains, rugs, table-centres, table cloths etc., for us—we will be holding another sale later this year. During the past twelve months, £226 was raised in this manner, so please give all those clean unwanted garments to your own Parish Church. We can sell anything at all that is clean and in reasonably good condition.

In conclusion, I want to say many thanks to Mrs. I. Clarke and Mrs. J. Wilson for their valuable assistance in helping with the organising of the Club. As a team, we spend quite a lot of time each week looking after the interests of the Club and visiting our sick members.

We also thank our Rector, the Rev. T. E. Champion, for his interest in our Club, for his valuable advice on all matters relating to our work, and for much personal help.

FUNDS AVAILABLE

With the knowledge and interest of the Standing Committee of the Diocese, a Building Society Group has been formed, to be known as the Broughton Co-operative Building Societies.

The chief aim is to provide finance to enable young married couples who attend their parish church to obtain suitable and cheap finance in order to buy their own home.

The Society is restricted to loans not exceeding £3,250, and to homes which are either about to be built or else have been recently built and not yet occupied.

● **"WITH HIS HELP":** This is the title of the movie selected for showing at our Social Hour after Evensong on Sunday, 22nd July. As usual, all parishioners are invited to stay for the film, and to partake of an enjoyable supper, which on this occasion will be kindly provided by the members of Young Marrieds' and Friends' Club.

● **A Civic Ceremony** will be held in Martin Place on Friday, 13th July, to mark "National Aborigines' Day, 1962".
