"BREAK DOWN THE BARRIERS"

Barriers in any shape or form always divide the people. In this International Year of Disabled Persons, Australians will be working to promote equality and better understanding of problems faced by our disabled citizens.

Approximately one in ten Australians has a major disability preventing their effective entry into society. We have no conception of the difficulties experienced by so many folk or the courage needed to face each day. These people do not ask for sympathy, they only wish to be regarded as ordinary people with rights needing to be recognised. They need love and friendship, and contact with the world around them, and of course they need a Saviour.

What then are the barriers I hear you ask?, the Church does not discriminate we welcome all..... Look again at your Church my friend, does it have steps which can't be negotiated? Are the isles wide enough to take a wheelchair? Do you have toilets too small for use by folk with a handicap? Are there aids for the deaf? And do you include some of the children from that Home for Handicapped close by? Perhaps unthinking, we have put out a sign 'Not Welcome'.

Jesus did not bid us go and teach and make disciples only amongst the healthy folk, on the contrary He spent much of His time with the sick and badly disadvantaged, looking upon them with great compassion. Christ can still heal the broken hearted and give new life and courage to those in need.....but how will they hear without a preacher?

As christian women in our society to day, what can we do to help. The Bible Society has responded wonderfully with Braille Bibles and Scripture Cassettes and no doubt there are many very meaningful causes to which we could apply both time and talent. It would be good also if the women of our denominations could influence the local Churches to look at their buildings this year and see whether it would be possible to overcome some of these barriers, and earn the right to hang the Wheelchair Emblem of the Disabled Persons, inviting all who will to enter.

Jesus said, "Even as you have done it to one of these my bretheren, you have done it to me." Mat. 25 : 40.

This past year, while very busy, has also been a very exciting and happy one in so many ways. My personal thanks to all Executive and Council members for their untiring efforts and willing co-operation whenever called upon. I do believe that more Christian women are finding that sweet fellowship does exist across those denominational barriers, and A.C.W. has a continuing role to play.

May the God of all wisdom guide us through the coming year.

Scholars are an inspiration to all with whom they come in contact and they challenge A.C.W. members to widen their vision and to become more committed to praying for and giving, to supporting the cause of Christ in the developing countries.

Miss Dien Sumiyatiningsih from Indonesia has completed a Chaplaincy Training course at the Peter McCallum Institute in Melbourne. She has been given a Scholarship at Ridley College in Melbourne so that she may be able to complete her master in Theology degree. What a zealous person Dien is! Pray for her continued studies and for her witness among students and others.

What a joyous Rev. Mary Au some of us met in Sydney on her way back to Hong Kong after her studies in Wellington, N.Z.! She was delighted with the courses in Counselling etc. that she had undertaken. Mary has been appointed to take charge of the Parish of the Holy Spirit in Hong Kong, where there are many refugees from China. She is also youth officer for the Diocese, a full time task in itself. She is counting on our prayers.

On 27th February, 1981 we welcomed Miss Malini Weerasinghe to Sydney. After spending a happy weekend with Mr and Mrs Stanhope, on 1st March she moved into Deaconess House to undertake studies in Theology and Religious Education. Malini, a teacher, is keen to gain knowledge and experience, especially in the sphere of training Sunday School teachers.

The way in which members of N.S.W. A.C.W. have responded to supplying Malini with the many things she needed has been very pleasing, many thanks!

THE VISITING SCHOLARSHIP

It was a great pleasure to hear Mrs Rathie Selveratnam has been invited to visit the State Units. We are looking forward to having this gifted Asian Christian lady in N.S.W. in July. She brings a wealth of experience. She was Chairman of the first meeting of the International Women's World Day of Prayer Meeting held in Sweden in 1968.

Rathie was President of the Asian Church Women's Conference from 1966-1971. In 1980 she attended the Silver Jubilee Celebrations of F.L.C.

In September 1980 Mrs Selveratnam attended All Africa Consultation of Women Theologians, Partners in Community of Women and Men in Church and Society, which was held in Ibadan, Nigeria.

Pray for God's blessing that Mrs Selveratnam may be used to help many more Australian Christian women to catch further visions of extending the cause of Christ at home and abroad.

A.C.W. PROMOTION AND SPECIAL DAYS REPORT FOR 1980-1

As one reviews the past twelve months the work of Promotion and Special Days, the words of George MacDonald come to mind:- "Hold fast to God with one, hand, and open wide the other toward your neighbour: that is religion". There has been much evidence of 'many gifts - and One Spirit'.

Many thanks go to all enthusiastic Secretaries and Presidents who have caught the vision and who have promoted unity amongst the various women's groups in different areas. Venues have been arranged and services, creches and luncheons organised to make the World Community Day for 1980 the success it was. We thank God for His enablings, and the spirit of fellowship. Here are just a few of the many delightful quotes from the reports.- "The attendance the best for years",-"Excellent Order of Service"- "Meaningful and appropriate" - " Good to have hymns which were well known" etc.

A growing interest and enthusiasm is apparent in the branches. Community Day was held for the first time in seven new areas; viz: Penrith, Leura, Seven-Hills-Toongabbie, Sutherland Shire, Lambton and North Sydney. Material has been sent to various areas in the hope that "Guide Lines" will stimulate action in some areas where there are interested Christian women who desire to widen their horizons, among these being Forster, Grenfell, Lakemba and Dee Why. At Hornsby I met a number of ladies following the World Day of Prayer and discussed the aims of A.C.W.

Following the gathering at Armidale where some ninety five ladies had gathered they not only agreed to pray together, but also to work together. At a continuous luncheon following the service, when all ladies worked, an amount of \$600.00 was raised for Austcare. How delightful, congratulations!

At Bourke, two services were held, one at 10 a.m. and another at 7.30 p.m. when a member from each participating church gave a fifty word testimony-including the United Aborigines Mission.

It is of great interest to note that two of the latest groups to be formed organised creches in order to encourage the younger mothers to attend, one such was at the Sutherland Shire gathering where 72 were in attendance, and the other at Toongabbie where 60 ladies gathered. This is good thinking and organisation.

Fellowship Day service material is about to be dispatched-the theme being "Creative for Christ"-prepared by a group in the Northern Territory.

In June we were addressed by a Franciscan Missionary of Mary, Sister Barbara Hutchinson, whose topic was "Women in the Bible", thinking of the legal and social status of women from the Old and New Testaments. This stimulated much interest and followed through the recommendation from last National Committee Meeting, "The initiating of wide discussion regarding the Bible and the role of women". Another recommendation that we "gather resources relating to current community issues" is being fulfilled by the committee that was formed in June to co-ordinate thinking on issues of social responsibility. The core group of three ladies to set this in motion is Mrs McCann, Mrs Stevens and Mrs Hulme — Moir.

Four ladies attended the Young Women's Christian Association to meet the World President of the "Y". Five ladies also attended the Annual Meeting of the Y.W.C.A. which was 100 years old in Sydney and heard plans for redevelopment—an interesting report was brought to one meeting. Another affiliated organisation, The Woman's Christian Temperance Union, reported on their 99 years of work. To conclude our series a speaker from The Girl's Brigade brought enlightening information.

Five from N.S.W., with some from other states, journeyed from Alaska to Los Angeles meeting friends who had visited Sydney the previous year for the Consultation. Church Women United held the Ecumenical Assembly from 26—29th June in which Mesdames Dougherty, Stevens, Groat, Richardson and Deaconess Andrews participated. Their reports were presented at the August meeting.

We were thrilled when our member, Mrs H. Stevens, was invited by the Australian Government to be one of the 22 Australian women to attend the Forum in Copenhagen, in relation to the United Nations Mid-decade for Women Conference. Her talk following her return was most stimulating.

The Newcastle newsletter quarterly for members and others is published once a month. It is a source of information regarding the activities of A.C.W. N.S.W. as well as advertising social events, reports and other news which members are interested in.

There's still much to be done by each and every member by making known the name of A.C.W. Our name — AUSTRALIAN CHURCH WOMEN — is to be mentioned repeatedly so that other Christians will associate with recognition of its work.

National Council of Women meetings.

In June a number of members attended the Ecumenical Service in St. Andrews Cathedral. The Ecumenical Reflection Day at Cranbrook School was attended by five ladies in November. Miss Mitchell brought an interesting report of the meeting she was able to attend in connection with the European Conference in Edinburgh of the Women's World Day of Prayer — a wider view of the world organization. Mrs Lean being one of the privileged ones of our group to attend the Oberamgau Passion Play gave an interesting account. Mrs Oates brought a Christmas Devotional which was appreciated.

We welcomed Winifred Kiek Scholar Dien in April, some of us met Rev. Mary Au on her way home to Hong Kong and we look forward to meeting with Maline Weerasinghe and the first appointed Winifred Kiek Visiting Scholarship Holder, Mrs Rathie Selvaratnam, when she tours Australia.

To our hard-working and enthusiastic Secretary and President, a special word of thanks for all time, money and long distance covered in an endeavour to promote and encourage by means of visual aids and promoting the value of A.C.W. without any re-imburement except for the satisfaction of doing a good job faithfully and well.

To have worked with women of similar desires and aims has been a great privilege, and in W.A. Peterson's words I quote "Success is accepting the challenge of the difficult" and again in the inspiring words of Phillip Brooks: "Do not pray for tasks equal to your powers. Pray for powers equal to your tasks. Then the doing of your work shall be no miracle, but you shall be the miracle." A final prayer: "Give us faith for greater things". Amen.
