THE RECTOR'S LETTER.

All Saints' Rectory.

Feast of St. Andrew, 1942.

Dear People of All Saints':


Writing on St. Andrew's Day I am reminded that Andrew was the first Christian missionary—the first one to bring someone to Christ. It is a significant fact that wherever Andrew appears in the Gospel story, he is busy introducing someone else to Jesus. He first brought his own brother, Simon Peter; without Andrew there might never have been a Peter in Christian history at all. When those Greek strangers asked Philip for an introduction to his Master, it was to Andrew that Philip turned for advice, and he brought them to Jesus. Not only is Andrew the Patron Saint of Scotland; he is the Patron Saint of all missionary workers throughout the world. I am reminded, too, that that is still the disciple's calling—to bring someone else to Christ. As our Lord called those fishermen from their work on the Lake of Galilee to follow Him into the unknown, so I am sure He calls us in these anxious and troubled days, which are also days of opportunity, to become fishers of men as they were. Year after year Advent comes with its urgent summons to the church (that is, to you and to me) to "wake up"—to pledge ourselves afresh to the service of God and resolve to do our utmost to respond to His call. One of the essential needs of to-day is that Christian men and women should be ready and willing to confess their Faith before all men, and so bear witness for Christ. The easy-going kind of Christianity is of very little use in dealing with the problems which confront the Church to-day, and which will have to be faced if the Church is to survive. It's quite useless to bemoan the fact that people do not attend Church as they used to do, unless we are prepared to do something about it. So many Christians are so very satisfied with things as they are. We have a well organised Church which somebody, somehow, has built up, and we can enjoy its services, if and when we feel disposed, which, with many people, is not very often: but beyond that, we just don't want to be bothered; and, of course, this indifference gets us nowhere at all. Most of us in our material life are keen enough on progress, but somehow that eagerness just fades away to nothing when great spiritual issues are involved. The rapid growth of materialism is not likely to be checked even by this present awful conflict; in fact, it is becoming more and more intensified, and the Christian Church is called upon to make at least some sort of a stand for God and righteousness. The urgency of the Advent challenge is doubly real to-day, calling us back to the Source of our strength, and showing us the clamant need to ask ourselves, in all sincerity, what our own personal response is to be.

I commend to your personal interest and to your prayers those young people who, through Confirmation, are about to enter their full church-life. It must be very difficult to be loyal when you are, perhaps, the only member of a family who is interested in the Church and the things for which it stands. A little practical interest (provided it be tactful and not of the "fussy" variety!) shown by a friendly parishioner can often be of untold help and value to a younger communicant.

In one sense it seems almost impossible to give you the old conventional greeting "A Happy Christmas" without a feeling of unreality. It will be a very sad Christmas for many; many a home-circle is broken and many will not dare to think too much of the contrast to-day with those peaceful festivals of the years that now seem so far away. Yet, in another sense, one does realise that there is an abiding inward joy which cannot be denied us, because the **real meaning** of Christmas is inward and spiritual and must never be identified **only** with outward and visible signs. After all, we in Australia have much for which we ought to be thankful, and the general situation is certainly more hopeful than it was twelve months ago. So, even if the festivities be fewer, and the presents be smaller, or even if we have to dispense with them entirely, let not the absence of material things take from you the inward joy of Christmas. May the old,

old, wish, "A Happy Christmas" convey to you and yours that inward happiness which the world has neither the power to give nor to take away.
