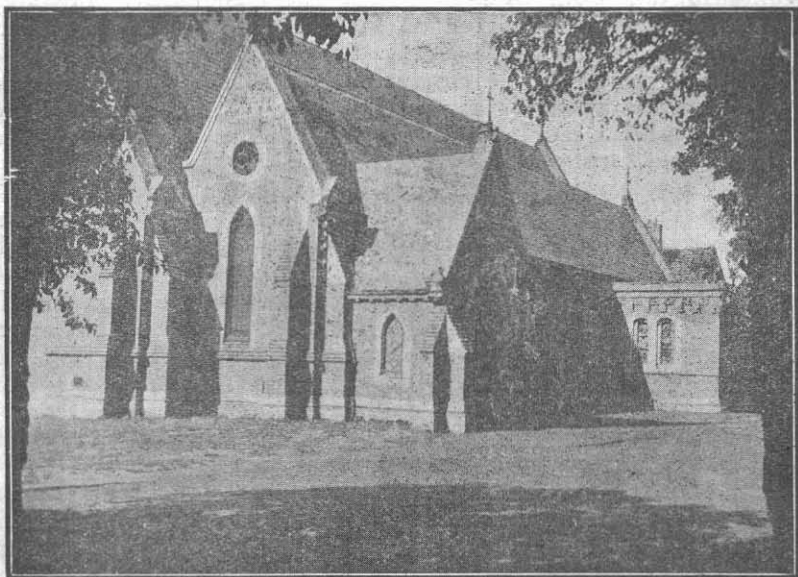

RECTOR'S LETTER.

My Dear Friends,

THE EASTER SERVICES.

The enjoyment of the Easter season was somewhat marred by the inclement weather that then prevailed. At All Saints' we experienced a very wonderful time both on Good Friday and Easter Day. In spite of the incessant rain which fell on the former day, there were most excellent attendances at the services, whilst on Easter Day we were remarkably inspired by the crowds in evidence. The Easter communicants numbered 60 more than last year; but I am far from satisfied with the number who take part in this great "Love feast" of our Lord. Instead of 350 persons making their communion on Easter Day, I would like to see double that number at least. I estimate that in church on that Sunday there were twelve hundred persons at church, so the proportion of communicants is not high.

THE CHURCH AND THE CINEMA.

On Good Friday night a cinema film on "The Life of Christ" was used in church. I was not greatly impressed with parts of it, especially where we witnessed impersonation of our Lord, but I recognised in the film an honest and reverent attempt to portray Christ's passion. Much has been said and written regarding the motion picture in the church, how, edited and directed by religious minds, it can be made a powerful aid to our Christian propaganda, and I am induced by my own conclusions regarding its influence to propose that we frankly discuss the pros and cons of its use in connection with All Saints'. We must make the Church efficient, positive, competent and constructive if she is to quicken the imagination and dispel the apathy of people to spiritual facts. The times are materialistic and men's imagination is largely coloured and limited by the world he sees and the occupation he follows. Masses of people do not possess an imagination which admits, includes, and is dominated by the thought of God and the larger world we cannot see. How can we secure the presence of this wider and bolder imagination? Perhaps pictures will be a help; I believe they will. Enquiry brings to light the fact that there is much suitable material for our use in connection with the churches, and I am asking our Easter Vestry Meeting to freely discuss the whole question.

SUNDAY PALM MUSIC.

The choir excelled itself on Palm Sunday night by its sympathetic interpretation of the cantata, "Olivet to Calvary". Many have expressed their great pleasure and profit from the rendering, and we shall look forward to similar efforts in the future.

Feelings of wealth possessed us as we used our new carpets for the first time on Easter Sunday. It makes a fine improvement to the appearance of the church and gives a "comfy" feeling as one walks upon it.

Dave Hunter's sermon was fine—he must certainly give us more of his thoughts and testimony. The singing was voluminous and hearty, and the whole of the arrangements were admirably conducted. Some of our readers miss a great deal by staying away from church.

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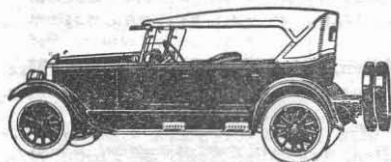

ALL SAINTS' S.F.C.

Report—Season 1926-27.

All Saints' has its Baseball Club, Cricket Club, Tennis Club and a number of other organised bodies, but there is one organised body which, I think, the parishioners know very little about; that body is All Saints' Soccer Football Club, which has been in vogue for about six years; and the following report of the club will show that this body of young men is a body which the parishioners should be proud to have representing the parish in the Protestant Churches Soccer Football Association.

During last year the club lost the services of two of its most esteemed members in the persons of Mr. T. Brown and N. Oliver. Mr. Brown was secretary of the club in its childhood days, and it is because of his great work, coupled with the assistance of the club's general secretary and absolutely essential personage, Mr. Stephenson, that we are now so well organised. These two men laid the foundation of the club, and we have only to follow the examples shown by Mr. Brown and Mr. Stephenson to reach the heights of our ambition.

ALL SAINTS' WOMEN'S GUILD.

Annual Report, 1926-1927.

It gives me much pleasure to present our second annual statement and one which we can regard as rather creditable.

We entered our New Year 1926 with a credit balance of £8, and finalise our financial year with a credit balance of £14, though our expenditure was more than double the amount of last year.

Our first meeting of the year was held at the Rectory, when the members were afterwards entertained by our patron. We were then all looking forward to the red-letter day of opening of Parish Hall.

The covering of the guild-room with linoleum was our first thoughts. The Girls' Club sent along their donation of £2, and, with the help of guild members and evenings held at the homes of Mesdames King, Werner, and Watson, all helped to swell the funds. We were proud to see the room covered before the opening of the hall. The president's gift of a table cloth completed opening of the hall, and the happy reunion will be long remembered.

Our Quarterly Rallies.—In May the Rev. Paul Nagano gave an interesting address on Japan. In August the rector of All Souls', Leichhardt, came to us; the members of Petersham Prayer Union also came at the invitation of the guild and were later welcomed in the Parish Hall by Mrs. Hordern. In November Mrs. Holt gave a fine address, and at the March rally we closed the year with a gathering of over a hundred in church, when Mrs. Burns, of Africa, spoke to us. These quarterly services are the foundation of the guild and are enjoyed by all.

During the winter months the social committee arranged two socials. The fine musical programme at each was appreciated by all. Our thanks are greatly due to Mrs. Kennedy, Mrs. Browne and Miss Chippindall for their splendid assistance at these socials.

In June we passed for payment the second instalment of £25 towards the Parish Hall Fund. In August Miss Ada Hogg represented the guild at St. Margaret's Hostel fete, when the guild provided the cake stall. In September we were represented at C.M.S. fete at the Town Hall, when we provided a third of the refreshment stall and gave £3/3/- as our share of the expenses; six members of the guild gave their services in the kitchen; and we thank Miss Trusty for her ready response for help from the Girls' Club. She brought five girls to wait on tables, provided flowers, and her girls carried out their duties admirably.

The afternoon with Miss Pounall, of China, and her talk on the awakening of China, also the Bible reading by Mrs. Hall, were both helpful and refreshing.

The Guild Sewing Circle organised by Mesdames Bazeley and Toms met on alternate Thursdays, and the result of their work was shown at the fete. I must not forget the rector's birthday party, for which the guild provided refreshments.

At our December meeting, before going into recess, the rector brought before us the appeal for help towards a wireless set for the Home of Peace, and with the help of friends £5/10/- was handed to the rector the following week.

At the February re-opening after Xmas recess we considered means and ways of replacing the carpet in the church, as it had been passed at the December meeting we would endeavour to concentrate our efforts on the interior of the church in the coming year, and hoped to have the new carpet for Easter. The guild concert for the Carpet Fund was arranged at this meeting, and we must thank the members and excellent concert committee who were responsible for its success.

In entering another year I trust that God will bless the efforts put forward by the guild for His service.

THE GIRLS' FELLOWSHIP.

Report for the Year ending 2nd May, 1927.

The Girls' Fellowship commenced its activities by a social held on 4th May, 1926. The object of this social was to gather together any girls between the ages of 13 and 19 years.

It was decided at the first official meeting, which was held on 11th May, 1926, that a committee of 10 be appointed, five members to be selected by the rector and five by the girls. This election duly took place, and from the committee thus selected Miss E. Miller was elected president, and I. Ashwood and H. Regnis hon. treas. and hon. sec. respectively.

A banking account was opened on behalf of the fellowship, in the names of the treasurer and secretary.

A motion was passed that the entry fee for the fellowship should be 1/- and the quarterly subscription 1/-, payable in advance.

As the girls were in favour of a physical culture course, Miss Bostock was engaged and took charge of this class for six months, after which Miss

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MacRoberts gave instruction. A fee of 3d. per night was made to help defray expenses.

A concert was given at the termination of the first quarter, and £13 was realised, £7/10/- of which was handed over to the rector for inclusion in the quarterly offering of the church.
