THE RECTOR'S LETTER

All Saints' Rectory.

16th June, 1948.

Dear People of All Saints',

It is not possible to find words which will adequately express my deep gratitude to you for your prayers, your sympathy, and the many and varying acts of kindness so generously shown to my dear sister during her last illness, and to me since she passed away in the early hours of St. Barnabas' Day (June 11th). I can but hope you will know that, underlying these inadequate words, there is a very real appreciation of your thoughtfulness, which has helped us more than you can ever know.

To realise that some of you had come together (at very short notice), in the Chapel for prayer and intercession (kindly led by Miss Young, Warden of the House of the Epiphany), was a real source of strength in those few days before the end.

In the church, which my sister loved, and in the calm of a beautiful morning of winter sunshine, the last service was conducted by our good friend, Bishop G. H. Cranswick, assisted by the Revds. R. J. Hewett and F. S. Rogers. None of us will ever forget the Bishop's uplifting and comforting address, when he spoke of her life of service, from the words of St. Mark xiv. 8: "She hath done what she could." Indeed, the whole service, the large number of parishioners and friends (including some from St. Barnabas', Chatswood), and the wealth of lovely flowers, were a tribute to the place she made (and, I feel, will keep) in the hearts of those who knew her.

If I might mention the way in which we may best remember her, it would be that we should embody in our lives the ideal of **Service**, which was so prominent in hers; and to remember it was from worship she drew her inspiration to serve. I'm sure the hardest days during her illness were the Sundays; she felt so keenly being debarred from the fellowship of the services of the church; and on Sunday evenings she frequently said how much she missed meeting and chatting with her friends after service.

In thanking you **ALL** for your many acts of sympathetic helpfulness, I would particularly mention Dr. J. E. V. Barling, our doctor and good friend for many years, who has been a "tower of strength" to us both; Dr. C. E. Vickery (who kindly came during our own doctor's temporary absence in Melbourne); Sisters M. Griffith, N. Elliott, and Mrs. A. V. Hatters (of the House of the Epiphany), who, with Nurse Allen, willingly gave of their nursing skill, and shared with Mrs. Gill the loving care so devotedly given.

Someone has suggested that the best memorial to the memory of my sister would be the continuation of that additional £100 for the Missionary work of the Church, in which over the five years past, she has been the moving spirit. If this could be done, I am sure she would love it above all things.

Many tasks for which she so ably took responsibility will now devolve upon me. Whilst I know I shall be given strength to do them, I realise I cannot hope to take over her work without your help. I feel, however, that I may confidently look to you to rally round and willingly give the additional assistance I shall need.

Next month we shall be observing the 45th Anniversary of the Consecration of our Parish Church. Will you begin **NOW** to get in touch with former parishioners, inviting them to join with us in the special services which will be arranged for the Consecration Festival on **15th August**. As part of this Festival we hope to have our Annual Parish Tea on Wednesday, 18th August, and we shall be glad to hear from parishioners willing to donate a table or a portion thereof; also from those who can assist by acting as hostesses at the Tea. Once again we ask the co-operation of all our people in upholding the standard of All Saints' Parish Tea, and making it the successful social fellowship it has been for so many years.


We would remind you that on our Festival Sunday—15th August—the boxes now in use will be returned and presented. A special envelope will be issued with the August "Chronicle" for the use of those who have no box.

The Churchwardens hope that all parishioners, young and old, will respond to this appeal, and that the leaders of all organisations will place before their members the need for support, either individually or collectively. Last year's response was good: let us make it even better this year!

The letter concerning the Parish War Memorial will, I hope, go out with this "Chronicle." I commend it to your generous support. If it is not possible for you to respond to it at once, will you make a promise to give before October 31? In this issue, also, we publish the names appearing on our Prayer List during the War years, which we ask you to check for errors or omissions before the names can be handed in for The Book of Remembrance, which is to be incorporated in the Memorial.

In view of the absence of His Grace, the Archbishop, and Bishop Hilliard (who are attending the Lambeth Conference), the Archbishop has asked that as many Confirmations as possible be postponed until 1949. There will, therefore, be no Confirmation at All Saints' this year.

A Tribute to Her Memory

It is almost always true, that where there is similarity of interest, those members of a family who remain single should inevitably become closer to each other than those who marry and set up their own homes. Such was the case with my beloved sister and myself. One of my parishioners expressed it perfectly when she wrote "you and she have always been such pals."

My sister and I had been together so long, sharing each other's life so happily and to such a degree, that only those who have known this close brother-sister relationship will really understand it.

She was a public school teacher, who taught not just to prepare children for examinations, but to prepare them for life; never losing an opportunity of trying to mould the characters of those entrusted to her. She knew the solid truth of

Ian Hay's dedication in his "Lighter Side of School Life," where he wrote: "To the members of the most responsible, the least advertised, the worst paid, and the most richly rewarded profession in the world", and she knew also that to be a successful teacher, to look back on years given to planting and watering the seeds of character in young minds, to know that by and by there will be scores of men and women in the world in whose best equipment you have had a share, is a truer and more lasting success than any other the world has to offer. A teacher who now has girls in sixth class whom my sister taught years ago in third, says: "Their faces light up at the mention of her name," and that her influence is still felt throughout the school.

Ethel Vivian Adams was essentially a home-maker, who would have made a home of almost any place, no matter how poorly equipped it might be. She had a great love for beautiful things, especially for the beauty of nature; and we all know the particular artistic "flair" she had for the arrangement of flowers, both in church and out of it. She had remarkably clever fingers, and many of you know how she delighted in making beautiful things. Above all, she had a great love for Christ and His Church, and the Missionary Cause was very dear to her heart. It was mainly due to her keenness and enthusiasm (backed up by the many who responded to her leadership) that an additional amount of over £545 was raised in this parish for the Australian Board of Missions and the Church Army during the past five years. How often, in thinking of the many opportunities and challenges of our modern world, she longed to be younger, and able to do MORE!

She was a most capable organiser; and her work amongst her beloved Women's Guild was one of the most outstanding features of her life of service in this parish.

I trust you will not think that I have said too much about my dear sister. There are, I know, countless other beautiful characters, and many may rightly think that their own loved ones are not less worthy of commemoration. But I would ask that what I have written be taken as a reverent tribute to her and to all beautiful character. At a time when much of our literature is peculiarly blind to the glory and excellence of human nature at its best, I do not think I can be blamed for making known what I have seen of the beauty of holiness, and for recording (as so many people by thought, word and deed have proved to me) how many kindly natures there are in the world, swift to recognise and love that beauty when they see it in another.

"Make her to be numbered with Thy Saints: in glory everlasting."

PROPOSED STONE OF REMEMBRANCE.

Proposed Stone of Remembrance

Dear Parishioners and Friends,

After much regrettable delay, the Faculty for our Parish War Memorial has been approved.

As you have already been told, it is to take the form of a *Stone of Remembrance*, to be erected (with suitable treatment of the adjacent walls) in the north-west corner of our Church, which faces the southern, or main entrance. Although it is not possible to give an exact picture of the proposed Memorial, the above sketch will give you some idea of it.

The names of those from our Parish who paid the Supreme Sacrifice will be sand-blasted on the clear plate-glass which surmounts the Stone, which will be electrically lighted from beneath, as desired. The proposed Stone will be of grey granite, all polished, and the adjacent walls will also be of grey granite, all axed. In the west wall there will be placed a Book of Remembrance, which will contain the names of ALL those from All Saints' Petersham who served in the Second World War, 1939-1945.

We do not wish to omit any name which should be included, or to include any name which you may prefer omitted; so a list of those names which appeared on our Prayer List is made available, which you may check for errors or omissions.

Knowing the devotion of those who served, and how uncomplainingly they took up the burden laid upon their

generation; remembering also that some of them did not return to the land they loved; we feel we can confidently appeal to you all for *direct giving* to the Memorial Fund; as the nature of the appeal demands that we shall give what we can, without recourse to special entertainments to obtain the necessary funds.

We aim at approximately £400 to do the work effectively, and we ask you to use the form on the last page of this letter, when making a gift or a promise, striking out the clause which does not apply. We would like to see the Memorial unveiled and dedicated on October 31st — the day before All Saints' Day, 1948.

We believe the Stone of Remembrance will be an appropriate and dignified memorial, reminding us of what we owe to those who served in World War II; and that it will stand as a monument, ever recalling the need for us (and for those who come after) to live worthy of the sacrifices made for us; and to do our part to help the peoples of the world to forsake violence and injustice, and to live together in righteousness and peace.
