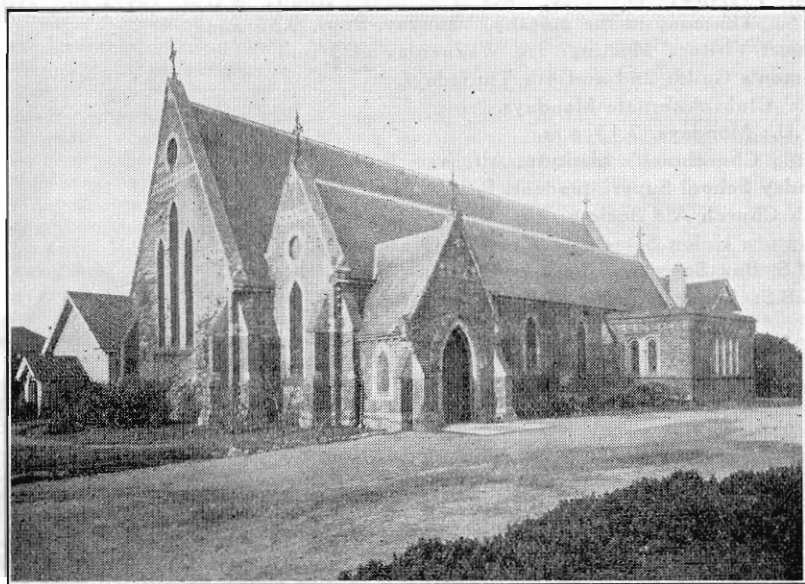

THE RECTOR'S LETTER.

All Saints' Rectory,

Dear People of All Saints',—

20th June, 1938.

When we read our July "Chronicle" we realise it is time to prepare in earnest for our Consecration Festival in August. I hope you will commence now to get in touch with former parishioners, and invite them to keep August 21st free, so that they may be able to observe that day as a "Back-to-All-Saints" Sunday; for we hope then to commemorate the 36th Anniversary of the Consecration of our Parish Church. We plan also to have the usual Tea-meeting and Reunion of parishioners past and present, on Thursday, August 25th. This is just a preliminary intimation of our plans for the Festival; full details will be given in the August "Chronicle."

Upon our Festival Sunday—August 21—the boxes we are using, in lieu of a fete, will be called in and presented. Boxholders are reminded that from the issue of this paper there will remain but seven clear weeks in which to fill up any stray corners there may be! If you are amongst those who could not assist by taking a box, we will provide you with a special envelope (in next month's "Chronicle") in which you will please place your offerings. If we are to realise our objective—£200—we shall need the co-operation of all parishioners

In response to enquiries regarding Confirmation, preparation classes will commence during the first week in August. I would once again earnestly plead with the parents and friends of our young people, that they will give them every encouragement in this most important matter. Obviously, you cannot decide the question of Confirmation for them, but you can, by your interest in them and in their problems, be a tremendous help to them at this formative stage of their lives. It is possible, on the other hand, by your apathy and lack of interest in the religious life of your young people, to give them the idea that Confirmation does not matter one way or the other, and thus, perhaps unintentionally, take upon yourself the solemn responsibility of preventing a decision being made for Christ and His Church. I would that more parents and godparents would remember the last thing said to them at the Font when they brought the children for baptism: "Ye are to take care that this child be brought to the Bishop **TO BE CONFIRMED BY HIM**" I would be pleased to hear from adult parishioners who would like to present themselves for Confirmation.

So soon as the temperature drops to thirty-eight or forty-two, we notice a corresponding drop in Church attendances. Whilst admitting that there are some to whom extremely cold conditions might be definitely dangerous, there are numbers of other strong, healthy Australians who ought not to be affected by them. Of course, it requires more effort of will to be a regular communicant at the Early Celebrations during the cold weather, but we earnestly ask, and indeed expect, the younger people to make that effort.

Absences from service owing to adverse weather conditions prompt me to draw attention, once more, to the value of the Envelope System of Offer-tories, whereby you put by your offering each week, and your Church does not suffer financially through your absence. Over and over again we have proved the worth of this system; and it could be even more successful if more parishioners would adopt it. A new quarter is now commencing, and it would be a good opportunity to hand in your name as one willing to use this method of giving.

The interchange of pulpits arranged by the Ministers' Fraternal on Whit-sunday Evening, met with much approval from the congregations concerned. We were pleased to welcome the Revd. Joshua Robertson of the Petersham Baptist Church to All Saints', and thank him for his most helpful message. I, myself, had a very sincere and hearty welcome to the Petersham Congregational Church, and thoroughly enjoyed the service there. Believing that these gestures of Christian Fellowship will make for greater unity amongst the people of all denominations, and will help us all, as builders of God's

Kingdom, we have agreed to another interchange on Advent Sunday Evening, November 27th.

I would draw your attention to the Marsden Commemoration mentioned elsewhere in this issue, and trust our people will give it their utmost support.

Mr. Pattison will be in charge of the parish during my absence on holidays, and will be assisted by visiting clergy on Sundays. Should there be any cases of **extreme urgency**, and Mr. Pattison not be immediately available, the Rectors of adjacent parishes have kindly consented to act, if called upon to do so.

THE RECTOR'S LETTER TO THE SENIOR GIRLS AND BOYS.

Dear Girls and Boys,—

The time has come round again for me to write a special letter to those who have attained the age of fourteen, in order that I might direct your thoughts towards Confirmation. I hope to commence Preparation Classes for Girls on Tuesday, August 2, and for Boys on Thursday, August 4. Between this and then, I want you to think over this most important question.

No one can decide the matter **FOR** you. Whilst parents and friends may (and I hope, will) advise you, the desire for Confirmation must come from **YOU**, if it is to be of any real value in your life.

Unless you are thoroughly in earnest about it, I would rather you did not present yourselves for Confirmation. I have seen so many young people who just came along for Confirmation and then gradually drifted away from the Church, attending Holy Communion perhaps at Christmas and Easter and, some of them, not even then. Obviously, they could not have been really serious about the vows they made at Confirmation, or they would not have joined the great army of "drifters."

Growing up invariably brings with it responsibilities, and the problem of making decisions. You are faced with a choice between two ways of life—between life for God and life for self. If you choose the former you will find you have chosen the harder way which will need a constant effort of will to put your choice into practice. Your Church knows all about the difficulties of choosing the unselfish way, and after your Confirmation admits you to Holy Communion so that you may obtain more strength and courage for the difficult task which faces you.

Confirmation is not a prize for specially good people. It is a gift of help for those who feel they are not good enough. Neither is it a guarantee that you will be much better after it; nor is it a kind of insurance policy against evil. Like all gifts, it depends upon **how much you make use of it**. After all, it must be plain that no one else can give you his religion. He can tell you about it, and advise you, but it is not yours until you **use it**, and claim it as your own. Three good reasons why you should be confirmed are these: (1) To claim Christianity as your own religion; (2) to claim the gift God has to give you at Confirmation; (3) to claim the privilege of becoming a full member of the Christian Church.

The Archbishop desires that all candidates should be not less than fourteen years of age, but if your fourteenth birthday falls on or before October 30 (the day of the Confirmation Service), you will be eligible to attend the classes. It is necessary that you should be able to say when and where you were baptised. Please obtain this information and bring it to your first preparation class.

If you decide to attend preparation classes—as I hope many of you will—you must attend **Regularly**. Intending candidates should hand their names and addresses to Mr. Pattison or to me before July 31.

May God the Holy Spirit especially guide you in making your decision.

It was a very great pleasure to have her with us because, as the Rector in his opening remarks, said: "We shall always look on Mrs. Hordern as a very real part of All Saints'." The Y.P.U., which is developing into a splendid little band of workers, provided an enjoyable programme, which was arranged by the Misses Belfield and Carolus, the Assistant Leaders of the Y.P.U. Miscellaneous articles, and cakes, jams and sweets were for sale, and, with the exception of some cakes, nothing cost more than one shilling. Our very good friend, Miss Jean Hordern, had a stall of hand-painted china, all her own work, and handed in a cheque for £3 as her donation towards the evening. The Marsden Commemoration.—You will have already noticed the posters in the Church porches concerning the Marsden Commemoration, to be held in the Sydney Town Hall on Tuesday, Wednesday, Thursday and Friday, 19th-22nd July.

The General Secretary of the Church Missionary Society writes:

"The Commemoration should be a great stimulus to all Church people, and should certainly encourage clergy in the missionary message they are preaching.

"The presence of Bishop Bennett of New Zealand (the Maori Bishop) and his Maori Choir should prove very interesting. With the colourful display of the Church Missionary Society's medical and educational work, and also the picturesque background of the various courts, showing work in other lands, the Commemoration should prove of great educational value.

"The admission will be Sixpence (irrespective of age), and we hope by this means many folk will be able to attend."
