THE RECTOR'S LETTER

All Saints' Rectory,
30th October, 1950.

Dear People of All Saints',

We were thankful to know that Bishop Pilcher has been restored to health after his recent illness, and was able to be with us for our Confirmation Service. Once again we had an impressive Confirmation, in which the Choir's rendering of Foster's appropriate anthem, "O for a Closer Walk with God" (sung at the Bishop's request), helped to create an atmosphere of worship and devotion in an already beautiful service, which, we feel sure, the Confirmees will ever remember with deep thanksgiving.

The testing time for these young people commences now; but the **real test** will be apparent, not so much now, when they are keen and enthusiastic, but, say, this time next year. When we look through our Confirmation Register to see how many of the 1950 candidates are still regular Communicants, and have remained loyal to their Confirmation Vow, we can begin to assess the value they place upon their Confirmation. We commend them to you, hoping that you will remember them in your prayers, and that, where it is possible, you will get to know them and help them in every possible way to keep the promises they have made.

The Christian way of life to which we are called is no easy thing—it is a constant struggle which challenges the best that is in us. In an indifferent and even hostile world the youth of the church to-day will come into conflict with the spirit forces of evil, as they go forth to bear their witness. But God does not expect us to fight in our own strength. True discipleship begins by trusting Christ for life and strength: in the Holy Communion Service He not only provides an eternal reminder of His love, but also promises a means of grace, a chain of friendship by which our characters can be linked up with, and strengthened and refreshed by Him.


The visit of The Archbishop of Canterbury—the first visit of an Archbishop of Canterbury to Sydney—is an unique event in the history of our Australian Church. Our Archbishop writes: "I hope members of the Church will turn out in large numbers to greet the Archbishop of Canterbury on his arrival from Canberra. . . ." On Friday, 17th November, the Archbishop and Mrs. Fisher, accompanied by the Chaplain, will leave Haigh Street at 4 p.m. escorted by the youth of the Church. They will proceed along Park Street to the Town Hall, and thence to the George Street entrance to the Cathedral.

The Archbishop will give an address in the Town Hall on Monday evening, November 20th, at 7.45. Tickets for reserved seats, at five shillings each, can be obtained at Nicholson's or Paling's. A Women's Rally to welcome Mrs. Fisher will be held on Wednesday afternoon, November 21st, in the Town Hall, at 2 p.m. Tickets for seats (2/- each) may be obtained at the Mothers' Union Headquarters in the Lower Chapter House.

There will be a day of continuous prayer for the Missionary Work of the Church on St. Andrew's Day, Thursday, November 30th, commencing with a celebration of Holy Communion at 7.30 a.m., and concluding with evening prayer at 5.30 p.m. If you would like to join in this Day of Prayer, please put your name down for the period you will be available, so that the continuity of prayer may be maintained throughout the day.

We again commend to your interest and support the great Centenary Rally of the Australian Board of Missions to be held in the Sydney Town Hall on **Tuesday, November 14th**, at 7.45 p.m. His Grace the Archbishop of New Zealand, and several Missionary Bishops will be present. We must do our utmost to fill the Town Hall that evening.

HOLY COMMUNION AND THE RECENTLY CONFIRMED

One of the things we particularly stressed in our Preparation Classes was the importance of **REGULAR** attendance at Holy Communion. If ever you find yourself tempted to become slack and irregular, take your Prayer Book and read again the Second Exhortation in the Communion Service, which is based on our Lord's parable of The Great Supper in St. Luke's Gospel, chapter fourteen, verses sixteen to twenty-five. This Exhortation contains much valuable teaching, and in addition, is a very lovely piece of English prose.

The fact that the first Sunday in each month has been suggested as "Your Day," does **not** mean that you may come **only** on that Sunday. You are welcome to come as frequently as you wish; and you should be present on the Great Festivals of the Church year (Christmas, Easter, Ascension, Whitsunday and Trinity), also on Saints' Days, if possible. The assignment of a certain Sunday each month is to remind you that **you should never allow your attendance at Holy Communion to become less frequent than once a month.**

The text the Bishop gave you (Ephesians VI. 10) contains appropriately the opening words of the Epistle for the Twenty-first Sunday after Trinity—(which is the Sunday you were Confirmed). "Be strong in the Lord and in the power of His might." Read this Epistle frequently: it is the picture St. Paul gives us of the Christian's conflict and the Christian's armour. For this conflict we need to pray daily, "Strengthen me, O Lord, with the power of Thy Holy Spirit, that I may continue Thine forever, and daily increase in Thy heavenly grace more and more. . . ." There is no discharge in this war against evil. As Dr. Page's beautiful hymn, which you sang at your Confirmation (to the fine tune composed by the Bishop, who confirmed you) says:

"He, His mighty arm extending,
Still hath power from sin to save,
Though thy warfare hath no ending
But the grave."

MATTERS MAINLY PAROCHIAL

"Food for Britain Fund".—Several letters of thanks have been received for the food parcels sent from this parish. Lack of space precludes the publication of them all, but the following is portion of a letter received from the Rev. A. L. Whitehorn, Vicar of Holy Trinity Church, Springfield, Chelmsford, which is indicative of the deep appreciation with which our parcels were received:

"On Saturday morning, September 2nd, I received from you all six Australian Express Food Parcels, sent from a depot in England, Nesmill Ltd., Tutbury, Staffordshire. The gift came as a great surprise, and will be a wonderful Godsend and blessing to a number of sick and aged (very old) folks in this parish. Already I have given away to-day several tins of braised steak, dripping and sweets. In the parcels were four tins of meat, one tin of dripping, and one packet of sweets, and they all came excellently done up and in order. How can I thank each and all of you for these six fine parcels! I shall distribute them very carefully, for this is a parish having many single old folk—either living by themselves—or two old people living

together. Their rations, therefore, like meat, sugar, tea, cheese and bacon, eggs and fats are very small and meagre, and sometimes not at all sufficient for one or two to live on. The larger the family the easier it is to make the rations go round; but it is the 'ones' and 'twos' that are badly hit, especially when they are very old. So in the name of my many parishioners like this, who will greatly benefit by these gifts of yours, I do say 'many, many thanks,' and may God bless your kindness and you yourselves. . . ." (The above was held over from last issue through lack of space.—Editor.)

Will you pray that they may grow in grace daily and that our Lord Jesus Christ will be to them a vital reality.
