

From your Minister's Desk



My dear Friends,

The month of May by time honoured custom now always brings an emphasis on the theme of 'home'. This is because of Mother's Day. We can't think of 'mother' without thinking of 'home' also. There is no doubt that very high among the list of blessings that 'mother' represents comes that lovely and sustaining concept of 'home'.

Oh yes, we know that tragically that concept is being lost by a growing section of the community. Quite recently it was my sad experience to know a young man who in deciding to move away — hundreds of miles away — didn't bother to contact mother to say farewell. He did bid father goodbye. On enquiry I discovered that his mother had left the family years back — pursuing her 'women's independence'. As a result that young man has grown through the tumultuous teen years without a 'home' — though he has always lived in houses. There is an instability in that young man's life, which is a reflection of the instability and brittleness of such a large section of our society today. We have had our attention directed again to the implications of 'family and home' by a new discussion of the impact of the TV programme "Roots". Obviously 'family and home' are first priorities among the needs of new and developing lives. We allow attacks upon them to our own posterity's grave misfortune. The erosion of their significance brings an inheritance of ill that destroys civilisations.

The home is the vital unit of society. God so ordained and planned and patterned it. On 'home and family' depend business, church, schools, government and the nation itself.

It is because of this that the establishing of a good or great family is the most important, far-reaching accomplishment of life.

If any woman or any man is searching for some great contribution to make to the welfare of mankind, none could be greater than the establishing and maintaining of a good family and home. Especially one that can be described as a Christian home — that is, one dedicated to the realisation of God's plan and purpose. Or course it's a mistaken idea that this is solely and wholly the job of mother. The all important 'emotional climate' of the home is set by both parents. And this is the factor that determines whether children will grow up to be well-adjusted individuals, or maladjusted problem-laden teenagers and adults. It is what, more than any other influence, shapes their entire lives.

Those of us who realise this truth also are aware that we don't have that much time. The formative years pass so quickly. We are also very much aware in these days of the strength of the "other" unsettling and unhappy negative influences bearing upon our young people.

While, this month, we are expressing gratitude for the good things we have gained from our mothers, maybe we'll also desire to dedicate our energies and hopes to the enriching of the homes and families through which we are passing on hopes and values to those following us. To help make this real for you and yours, you might like to use in

your home the simple outline of Dedication included in this issue of the Chronicle. May I suggest that you use it as a family act — and make it a time of establishing, or re-vitalising, the practice of family devotions. For don't forget that this is God's will for His people, check Deuteronomy 6: 6 - 7. He had placed the Bible in our hands, not only as a road map to point us to heaven, but as a manual of behaviour while we are on our way there! NEW PRIMATE ELECTED

The Archbishop of Sydney, The Most Rev. Sir Marcus Loane was elected Primate of the Church of England in Australia on April 3rd.

He is the first ever Australian-born Primate of the Anglican Church in this country.

Born in Waratah, Tasmania, Sir Marcus was educated at the Kings School, Parramatta, and the University of Sydney. He entered Moore College and upon graduating, served in turn as tutor, Vice-Principal and finally Principal between the years 1935-58, except for a period of Army chaplaining in New Guinea in 1942-44.

He is a prolific author — his main area of interest being biographies of personalities connected with the Reformation in England. His latest book — *The God Who Acts* — studies in the Acts of the Apostles, will be released shortly.

Sir Marcus was made an Assistant Bishop in the Diocese of Sydney in 1958, and succeeded as Archbishop ten years later.

At a Press Conference, held shortly after his election, the new Primate made some comments which are relevant to the witness of the Church in suburbs like Petersham.

Asked if it was true that the Church was on the whole "losing ground" in the modern world, Sir Marcus pointed to the progress and development of the Church's witness in Sydney's inner-city over the past ten years. He said that due to a missionary effort by the Church as a whole, several congregations which seemed to have all but died out had been re-established, and were beginning to be a vibrant witness within their community.

He went on to say that perhaps the time had come for the Church to turn its attention and creativity to the next ring of suburbs in urban Sydney, where the influx of many non-English speaking people had greatly reduced the number of Anglicans.

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NEWS FROM BEYOND THE PARISH

WINTER APPEAL

May 14th is the launching date for the Archbishop of Sydney's Winter Appeal. The main projects for the Appeal in 1978 are continued funding of the Camperdown Family Centre which has helped over 60 families in need since its inception last May, a detached youth work programme, aimed at helping troubled and unemployed young people in the Mascot-Eastlakes area, and the Appeal will also provide funds for welfare grants through Rectors and the Anglican Counselling Service.

SUNDAY RETAIL TRADING

The Social Issues Committee of the Anglican Diocese of Sydney has issued a statement on the proposed extension of shopping hours to include Sundays. Here is an extract from the statement:

"The Church re-affirms that it believes the fourth commandment enshrines a basic rule for the happiness and prosperity of all; the fact the Commandment dates back some 3,500 years does not invalidate it. It is wise social legislation which we neglect at our peril . . .

Quite apart from the economic dubiousness of the proposal, more is at stake than the convenience of a minority of shoppers and the profits of some companies. Every change of this nature has social consequences, and the community pays with increased stress on individuals and families, necessitating often medical and social welfare expenditure."

KNOW YOUR GOD

The living God.

The God of the Bible is pre-eminently a God to be reckoned with. He is active, dynamic and irresistible. And his dynamic activity is not confined to the cosmic dimensions of a vast universe — that would be a relatively comfortable thought. But God is not comfortable. He is active no less in day-to-day human affairs, the petty concerns of microscopic man. He is relentlessly uncomfortably present in the sordid business of commerce and war, of loving, living and dying. He is 'the Transcendental interferer'.

Life, in the Bible, means something vibrant and dynamic. It involves action. To speak of God as the living God is to make the daring claim that God is actively present here and now, a force to be reckoned with. If He is not that, then whether or not He exists is an academic question with which the Bible is not concerned; at least He would not be **living**, and that is what matters. If He were not living, He could not be God, in any sense that would mean anything to the men of the Bible.
