THE RECTOR'S LETTER.

All Saints' Rectory,
30th October, 1939.

Dear People of All Saints,

Yesterday the Bishop Coadjutor (the Right Reverend C. Venn Pilcher) administered the Sacred Rite of Confirmation to forty candidates, in the presence of a very large congregation. It was a beautiful, impressive Service, and one which will ever remain in the minds of all, but particularly those who were then admitted into full membership of the Church of England. The Bishop's inspiring address was based upon St. Paul's words to his friends in the Church at Philippi (Philippians 2:12, 13): "Work out your own salvation with fear and trembling: for it is God which worketh in you . . ." I hope the Confirmees will mark these verses in their Bibles, in the manner I suggested in the preparation classes.

I commend these young people, standing at the commencement of their full Church life, to your earnest prayer and care. Pray that they may have strength and courage to keep the promises they have made, and that they may ever be loyal to Christ and His Church. They do really need your prayers in days like these, when so many people by their actions, if not by their words, will give them the impression that attendance at Church is a matter of no importance at all. We may talk glibly enough of Germany and Russia and the way in which these nations have apparently forsaken God, but what about ourselves? What of the thousands and thousands of our own Australian nation who live entirely for self and neglect God utterly—His Day, His House, His Book? Each one of us is called in his day and generation to take his part on God's side and to play his part in God's warfare against evil. We can do this only insofar as we learn to share in God's will, and to further by active service God's purposes. That surely means that we must work together; for, as a Bishop of our Church has said, "God wants an army, and not a horde of sympathetic irregulars." Hence the necessity for the Church.

Whether our young people remain in that army, called the Church, or whether they find the influence of the "irregulars" too strong for them, and begin to drift from its ranks, depends very largely upon themselves—upon the measure of sincerity and earnestness which they brought to their

preparation for Confirmation, but it will also depend, perhaps more than you realise, upon the **example** of their parents and elders. I "take off my hat" to the many young people who **DO** remain loyal to their Church, notwithstanding the apathy and indifference they encounter in their homes. How much happier would their Church-life be, if they had the enthusiastic co-operation of their parents? Most parents are rightly concerned in matters pertaining to the physical and mental development of their children, but it would seem that comparatively few are really interested in their spiritual development.

Might not the Confirmation of this boy or this girl of yours, be a new beginning for any parents who have just drifted away from the Church's fellowship? It would be a great thing for those young people and for the Church if it could be so.

I would draw the attention of parents to the opportunities existing for scholarships at Trinity Grammar School for boys, and Meriden Grammar School for girls. There may be parents who would welcome this avenue of entrance for their boys or girls to these excellent Church of England Schools.

Approximately, another forty pounds would make it possible for us to commence our Kindergarten Room. The plans have been approved and passed by the Diocesan authorities, and the Petersham Council. I wonder would it be possible for us to have this new room before Christmas? "Do it **now**" would appear to be sound advice, in view of a possible rise in prices; so I would ask any who may not have already given, to help us make a start with this necessary work.

These are dangerous and menacing days in which we live, and no one can be complacent about the world situation. I have no doubt our faith will be tested in the days to come. Are we depressed because we are no longer **sure** that truth and righteousness and love will prevail against cruelty and hatred? If our faith is worth anything, we can live and work quietly and confidently, looking fearlessly at the worst, knowing that the best must prevail. We cannot do that without seeking a power that is not our own, but which comes to us through prayer, and a daily seeking to know God's will, and to do it.

St. Andrew's Tide Missionary Intercession.—Churchpeople are most earnestly invited to attend the Season of Prayer in St. Andrew's Cathedral, Sydney, on Wednesday, November 29, 1939, for the missionary work of the Church. There will be an administration of Holy Communion at 8 a.m., and half hourly sessions of prayer will begin at 10 a.m., concluding with Evening Prayer at 4 p.m. Subjects to be dealt with will range from the Madras Conference to all the overseas fields in which the Church labours, together with work amongst the aborigines. It will be a tremendous encouragement seeing many Churchpeople coming to the Cathedral on the day, and joining in the intercessions.

Trinity Grammar School—Scholarships, 1940.—The School Council has again made available two scholarships for boys not already in attendance at the school. These are open to boys who will be under 13 years of age on 31st December, 1939, and the papers will be of a standard similar to that of the Primary Final or High School Entrance Examinations. Entries close at the School on Friday, 10th November, and the Examination will be held on 24th November. Entry forms and full particulars may be obtained from the Bursar or the Headmaster at the School, Summer Hill.

During the past year Trinity has made exceptionally good progress, and there has been a steady increase of numbers under the new Headmaster, Mr. V. S. Murphy, M.A., a former Rhodes Scholar. The Preparatory School at Strathfield has developed soundly. In addition to the ordinary facilities for games, there has been installed fine playground equipment for the use of Junior boys.

In the Senior School at Summer Hill, many improvements have been made. At the beginning of the year the new Swimming Pool was completed. It is claimed that this pool is one of the finest school pools in Australia, equipped as it is with the most modern Filtration Plant and other devices to secure perfect cleanliness.

In scholarship and in games the school continues to achieve sound results. Following on the Athletic successes of last year, it has finished second in both Swimming and Football in the Associated Schools' Competitions and is at present leading in the Cricket. An interesting feature of its scholastic successes is that, in addition to the Intermediate and Leaving Examinations, one of its junior boys won one of the Naval College Scholarships last December, and is now doing well at Flinders.

Meriden C. of E. Grammar School—Entrance Scholarship.—An Entrance Scholarship, valued at £12 per annum, and tenable for three years subject to recommendation by the Principal, is offered by the Council of the above School for 1940, for girls 13 years of age or under.

The Examination is to be held at the School on Monday, 13th November.

Application Form and Full Particulars from the Principal. Entries close on Thursday, 9th November.

The subjects of examination are as for the Primary Final Examination, English, History, Geography, Arithmetic, with the addition of an easy paper on the Gospel Story.

Candidates are requested to be at Meriden by 9.15 a.m. on Monday, 13th November.
