

THE RECTOR'S LETTER

My Dear People,

By the time you read this, the greeting "Happy New Year" will already be old hat. But it is towards a Happy New Year for us all that I write to you today.

The onset of a new year always brings a feeling of high hopes and at the same time asks some large questions. Man always looks for the best, but what will the new year bring? The news on the radio and in letters from overseas seems to support an air of foreboding, what with the supposed leading nations of the world in such internal moral difficulties, as well as external economic and political difficulties. And now with the young of the world turning their backs on much of what was our "secure and orderly world", tearing down even the oldest and most loved institutions, and turning their backs on the Church, although we should like to see better days, we will not really be surprised at anything that happens now.

These are tumultuous times and every single idea, ideal, and philosophy is being put to the final test, the test of workability regardless of popularity. Mankind is striving to find a way to live with himself on this ever shrinking globe. Ideas which do not really work will be quickly cast aside and man will look farther and farther afield to find his new course through life.

The Christian Faith, of course, believes that while we still have not fully learned how to put it into practice, the Christian way of self-sacrificing love is still the basis for the only right way forward for mankind. All men desire freedom, but freedom without love is anarchy. Whatever hope man has of achieving world-wide freedom depends on our learning how to give up that freedom for the good of all men. Freedom misunderstood sends man out on an independent and unincumbered course in life, and consequently headlong on to a collision course with his fellow men. Conflict follows, and that illusive "freedom" becomes bondage to war and hate.

Freedom properly understood means being willing to co-exist with other people, to co-operate in life. In order to do this, man must have an idea of his personal freedom which includes the personal freedom of every other human being upon earth. Man must adopt real human love, a lively concern for the well-being of others, all others, in every aspect of their situations, if he is going to be able to find this path of happy co-existence.

Man must learn to adjust his idea of freedom so that he does not deny freedom to any other person. You are surely able to see what this must mean in a crowded world. A higher and higher idea of love is absolutely required. It might be well if we were to stop using the word "freedom" altogether, because it is so misleading, and substitute the word "love". Love is the only true freedom. If all mankind would make human brotherly love its goal, instead of independent freedom, there might be real hope for "Peace on Earth, Goodwill towards Men".

Freedom pulls people apart; love pulls them together. Freedom asks only what is in it for me? Love asks what is in it for us?

And isn't this just exactly what Jesus Our Lord has been saying for nearly 2,000 years? "Love Thy Neighbour as Thyself." St. John says, interpreting our Lord's meaning, "Love doeth his neighbour no harm" NO HARM, neither physical, nor spiritual, nor psychological, nor sociological harm. Man's first consideration must be his neighbour's well-being in all these aspects of life.

Therefore, man must REPENT of his satanic demand for freedom,

threw it out, and accept the Gospel of Love, seeking from now on not his own selfish hopes, but the fulfilment of the hope of the human race. Change is hard, especially after we have got used to "our way of doing things", but change we must, or we will be buried in the dust raised by a world that is going on.

So in 1972, let us keep our torch burning brightly for Christ and His love. Let us forget self and work for the race. Let us sacrifice as He did in the preservation of His truth, and perhaps this dark world may yet see His Light.

OUR THANKS FOR THE HARVEST

Services on 13th February



Special services to mark the Harvest Thanksgiving Festival will be held on Quinquagesima Sunday, 13th February. These will be bright services with many harvest hymns and the Church will be decorated appropriately for the occasion. We hope all parishioners will bring along gifts of groceries, fruit, vegetables, etc. to add to the atmosphere of the Harvest.

All these gifts will be forwarded to the "Eversleigh" Home of Peace Hospital in Addison Road, where they will be put to very good use. This is a Church of England hospital performing a wonderful work amongst incurably ill patients in the closing stages of life, and it greatly deserves our support.

Services will be Holy Communion at 8 a.m. and 11 a.m. and Evensong at 7 p.m. The Kindergarten and Sunday School children will present their gifts during normal lesson hour which begins at 9.45 a.m.

LENT AND EASTER

Ash Wednesday:

A special service to mark the commencement of Lent will be held at All Saints' at 7.30 p.m. on Ash Wednesday, 16th February. The Rector hopes that all parishioners will make a special effort to attend this important service.

Good Friday:

This year, Good Friday falls on 31st March. Times of our services will be published in the March "Chronicle". In addition, there will be the annual Diocesan Service of Witness in Hyde Park, commencing at 3.30 p.m. The Archbishop will give the address, and the musical team, The Ramblers, will lead the singing.

Easter Day:

Easter Day will fall on Sunday, 2nd April. Of it, the Prayer Book says, "AND NOTE that every parishioner shall communicate at least three times a year, of which Easter shall be one".

The times of our Easter Day services will be listed in the next "Chronicle".

Your Lenten Sacrifice:

It is easy to have the best of intentions about making some sacrifice this Lent as part of our personal preparation for Easter. But it is also easy to let this matter slip your mind. We can assist you to make this sacrifice and at the same time further the work of the Church in a wider field by giving you an A.B.M. box or envelope in which you can put your savings this Lent.

The girls and boys of the Sunday School all use them: we do trust that the other members of the parish will all follow their good example. Ask the Church Officers for whatever you require, the box or the envelope.

We wish to extend our deepest sympathy to the family of the late Mr. C. A. Cheetham, who died in a motor accident on 19th December. Mr. Cheetham gave valuable help with the cricket and baseball team we had a few years ago, and his family is closely connected with our Sunday School. We also regret to report the passing of Nurse Tasma Jackson, a former parishioner and Guild member, who died at the Home of Peace, and of the Rev. Percival Moore, a former Assistant Minister of All Saints', whose grandchildren attend our Kindergarten.

We are pleased to see Mrs. Robertson back at All Saints' and trust she will have continued good health. Mr. Millarey is picking up well after a spell in hospital, while our best wishes go to Mr. George Barron, who has had to undergo a serious eye operation.

CHURCH NEWS

Bible Study Group:

The Rector wishes to hear from members of the parish who would like to join a Bible Study group. He has received suggestions from several parishioners that such a group be formed. The aim is to have a modern intelligent inquiry into the history and up-to-date use of the Bible, and its application to the modern world. The time, day, and place of meeting would be determined by those interested, who are asked to contact the Rector as soon as possible.

Private Communion:

The Rector is glad to take the Lord's Supper to "shut-ins" and to the bedsides of sick folk. He asks only that requests be made direct to him, so that firm appointments as to place and time can be arranged. It is also desired that such requests be made by either the participant, or someone in the home or immediate family.

Confirmation, 1972:

The Diocesan list for 1972 has allocated Sunday, 11th June, as our Confirmation date, so classes will have to start much earlier than in the past. The Rector proposes to begin on Wednesday, 1st March, at 7.30 p.m., and asks all prospective candidates to get in touch with him quickly. The Right Rev. H. G. S. Begbie will be the confirming Bishop.

Weekly Envelopes:

If you've not previously used the weekly envelopes for your offerings, we suggest you join now, and so help us receive a regular weekly income for the Church. Sets may be obtained from the Church Officers at any Service. Existing subscribers may collect their envelopes from the rear of the Church.

Rector's Holiday:

Our sincere appreciation is expressed to the Rev. Ralph Ogden, B.A., Th.L., for conducting our Services, for the messages he preached to us, and for his other work in the Parish during the Rector's holidays last month.

District Visitors:

We urgently need one or two ladies to take over vacant areas within the parish. The work involves a monthly visit as a representative

of All Saints', including leaving a "Chronicle" and receiving subscriptions to Church funds. Mr. E. Quelch would be very happy to hear from any folk who can assist.

KNOW YOUR PARISH

Do you really know what goes to make up the various organisations at All Saints? Indoor Bowls Club:

The Indoor Bowls Club was originally formed in 1959, with Bert Hall as President and Bert Shaw as Secretary. The Parish Council advanced the cost of the equipment, and was repaid by the Club from members' subscriptions. The number of men attending ranged from 12 to 20, with three mats in use most evenings. Our membership was so good that we were able to take part in the Men's Fours Competition without any shortage of players.

Subsequently, a Ladies' Club was formed and flourished for a time. Eventually, the Men's Club was so reduced in numbers that it was suggested that the two clubs amalgamate. This was eventually approved jointly by both groups and for a few years, the Club flourished again. During this time, the Club Presidents were Charlie Whiting and Jack Gorman, with Frank Hearn as Secretary and Treasurer. Later, Mrs. Ivy Clark became Treasurer, and other ladies were appointed to the Club and Selection Committee. Mr. B. Sayers is currently President.

The trend to diminished numbers continues and we are now down to four ladies and six men. However, our finances are healthy and we have been able to maintain our donations towards lighting expenses, support the Sunday School, assist with the new Church flooring, and donate money to the Austcare fund.

The bowls season is now beginning and interest and support from any members of the parish will be much appreciated. Come and enjoy yourselves, and at the same time assist in maintaining interest in this Club.

We play in the Parish Hall each Wednesday at 7.30 p.m. and if you haven't played before, we will be happy to tell you about the finer points of the game.

Senior Parishioners' Club:


Many thanks to all the kind folk who helped to make our Christmas Party so successful.
