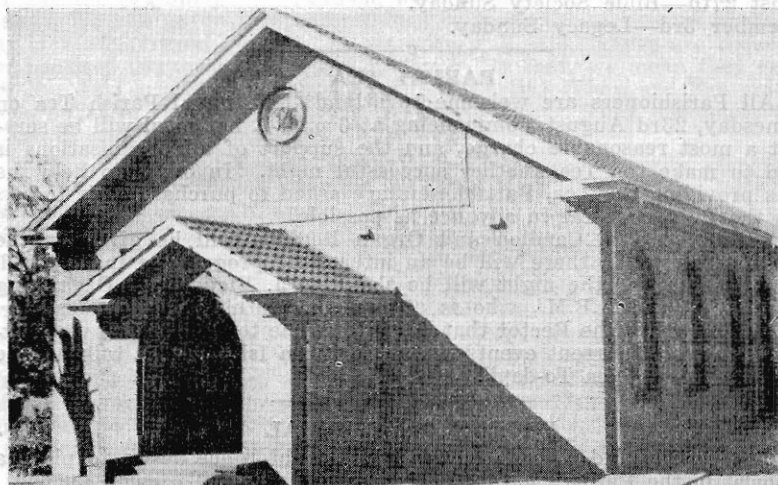

"OVER THE FENCE"**Baptism—Continued from July Issue**

The conception many people have of Baptism to-day is far from New Testament teaching. It is by this Sacrament that one becomes a member of the Church, that is Christ's Body, the Universal Church, or Catholic Church. It is the initiatory rite into the true Christian Church.

Membership in a society implies responsibility and certain obligations. It is the same when we are baptised. To wait until we feel good enough would mean that we would never be baptised Christians. In the first prayer in the service of "Public Baptism of Infants", the Minister prays "We beseech thee, for thine infinite mercies, that thou wilt mercifully look upon this child; wash him and sanctify him with the Holy Ghost; that he, being delivered from thy wrath may be received into the ark of Christ's Church."

In the second prayer, he prays, "Receive him, O Lord, as thou hast promised by thy well-beloved son, saying ask, and ye shall have; seek, and ye shall find; knock, and it shall be opened unto you."

God receives us with all our faults and sins, forgiving us for Christ's sake, who died for us. In the special Gospel taken from St. Mark, we read how Christ welcomed little children unto him and was displeased with those who tried to keep them away.

In the next prayer offered in the service, the priest says, "Almighty and everlasting God, heavenly Father, we give thee humble thanks, for that thou hast vouchsafed to call us to the knowledge of thy grace and faith in Thee: Increase this knowledge and confirm this faith in us evermore."

So then this service is not an end to our Christian experience—but simply the beginning. By Baptism, we are put in the way of God's blessings. We can go on to greater things or make the sacrament ineffective by lack of spiritual growth. It has been well said, "there are thousands of baptised pagans in the world to-day." By that, we mean they refuse to live as Christians—doing the will of Christ. They are like soldiers who enlist in the Army but who refuse to fight. They dishonour their Captain and His cause.

The vows are taken by the parents (who are primarily responsible for the child's spiritual welfare) and the Godparents. The latter act if the parents die, go insane, or are neglectful of their duty to the child. Godparents should be chosen for their spirituality, not their monetary resources. If you study the vows, you will realise they should not be taken lightly.

The prayer after the actual baptism reads "We receive this child into the congregation of Christ's flock and do sign him with the sign of the Cross, in token that hereafter he shall not be ashamed to confess the faith of Christ crucified, and manfully to fight under his banner against sin, the world, and the devil, and to continue Christ's faithful soldier and servant unto his life's end." Notice the words "shall not be ashamed to confess" and "continue Christ's unto his life's end."

This is only possible when parents and Godparents do their duty as summed up in the final charge, "ye shall call upon him to hear sermons . . . that this child may be virtuously brought up . . . daily proceeding in all virtue and godliness of living".

Confirmation is the next step to be taken by those who are well instructed.

The alms-dish has been given in memory of the late Mr. E. C. King, Hon. Treasurer of All Saints' for many years, and a Church Warden for forty years.

The porch has been erected in memory of the late Rev. P. J. Bazeley, Rector of this Church from 1924 to 1931, during whose Ministry at Petersham the Parish Hall was designed and erected. Until now, there has not been a Memorial to the late Mr. Bazeley at All Saints' Church.

BILLY GRAHAM CRUSADE—FOLLOW-UP

At the invitation of the United Churches Evangelistic Crusades (formerly the Billy Graham Crusade Committee), the Reverend Leighton Ford and the Reverend Joe Blinco, two of Dr. Graham's associates who assisted him during the Crusade of 1959, will be returning to Australia to conduct a series of "Follow-up" Crusades throughout various states of the Commonwealth from 1st October to 10th December, 1961.

It is proposed that Crusades of a brief duration will be held in the Capital cities of Canberra, Sydney, Brisbane, Melbourne, Adelaide and Hobart, with a series of shorter Crusades in country cities and towns which felt the impact of the landline relays during the last Crusade.

The two Evangelists and members of their teams will be officially welcomed upon their arrival in Australia at a great rally to be held in Rushcutter's Bay Stadium on Wednesday, 27th September at 7.30 p.m. before separating to undertake their evangelistic work. The Sydney meetings with Rev. Leighton Ford will be held from Saturday, 28th October to Sunday, 5th November in the Stadium, with seating capacity for 10,000 people. The Committee is planning for a big open-air gathering in one of the large sports arenas for the final Sunday afternoon of the Sydney Crusade.

Mr. Ford is an ordained member of the Presbyterian Church of U.S.A. and is Dr. Graham's brother-in-law. Mr. Blincoe is a British Methodist Minister.

All of the Meetings will be conducted on a united basis co-operating with local Churches and Ministers' Fraternal.

● **Special Film Series:** The Rector has arranged for a sequence of interesting films depicting the Old Testament to be shown at the Monthly Social Hours over the next few months. Episode One was shown in July, and dealt with the days of Abraham. This month, we will see "Jacob, Bearer of Promise", and the next two months will show Joseph, first as a young man, and in the second episode, as Ruler of Egypt. ● **More Painting:** It is good to be able to report more painting progress each month. As well as a considerable part of the outside of the Rectory, the interior of the main Parish Hall was repainted during July.
