THE RECTOR'S LETTER.

All Saints' Rectory.

26th August, 1940.

Dear People of All Saints',

We are again able to record, with deep gratitude, that our Consecration Festival was very successful from every point of view. Notwithstanding a day of showers and unsettled weather, the Sunday services were very well attended and were most inspiring and helpful. A big factor in making them so, was the consistently good work of our choir members who, from the early choral celebration to the singing of the Te Deum at the close of the day as a final Act of Thanksgiving, maintained the high standard which we have come to expect of them. We are very grateful to the Rev. C. E. Hulley and the Rev. W. J. Siddens for their appropriate and thought-provoking addresses at the Communion Breakfast and at Evensong respectively; and we do not forget those good people who ministered to us in more material things by providing and serving an excellent breakfast, and we would like to say, in parenthesis, that the potatoes were most comforting on such a morning!

You will all, I am sure, be interested to know that the special appeal (in lieu of a fete) has so far been answered to the extent of £129/1/8 (£98/1/7 coming by way of the boxes, and £31/0/1 in envelopes). There are still 23 boxes outstanding, and possibly there are some parishioners who have not yet been able to return the special envelope issued in the August "Chronicle"; so the Churchwardens live in hopes of seeing the total mount still higher. In view of the many other appeals being made upon us all at this time, we cannot expect to attain to last year's total, but we must point out to any whom it may concern that it is essential that we should have a right perspective in the matter of giving to the work of the Church in war time. It is very necessary to put **first things first**, and to realise that Red Cross appeals, Comforts funds, Canteens for our Forces, urgent and necessary though they be, would never have existed but for the teaching of Christianity and the Church; the very liberties we enjoy, the things which make life worth living, and for which men are giving their lives—these have grown out of the Christian religion. So, when you come to think of it, to say you cannot do anything for your Church because you are helping the Red Cross is not very intelligent, is it? This is not a "grouch," but a simple, necessary reminder. The Wardens join with me in wholeheartedly thanking **all**, who by their co-operation, have enabled us to meet the liabilities of our Parish Hall debt for a fourth year, without recourse to the bazaar method.

The Festival Tea was once again a time of happy fellowship and re-union. We were pleased to have with us the Rev. G. P. M. and Mrs. Ware, the Rev. E. T. and Mrs. Montgomery, Mr. and Mrs. T. A. Willmott and Mr. and Mrs. A. E. Ward. Apologies were received from the Rev. D. and Mrs. Creighton, Rev. F. H. and Mrs. Meyer, and the Rev. H. J. and Mrs. Lofts.


At the short music recital preceding Evensong, Mr. Mason and Mr. Pickard were associated with Mr. Kerrigan, and afterwards in the Parish Hall, Miss Gwen Boyd, Mr. Mason and Mr. McKechnie ("Weirde") contributed to a short but most enjoyable programme, Mr. Pickard kindly acting as accompanist. We were privileged in having Mr. B. S. B. Stevens (former Premier of N.S.W.) as the principal speaker, and we are most grateful to him for his timely message. Mr. Willmott, whose association with this parish goes back 58 years, also brought us greetings, and after Mr. E. C. King had voiced the appreciation of the Wardens for the parishioners' response to the special appeal, our Festival Commemoration was brought to a happy conclusion.

As we come near to the close of the first year of war, our hearts go out to this tortured world, and we long for its deliverance. Particularly are we thinking just now of the people of the Motherland, and we think of them with great pride as we realise that they are in possession of some things that even bombs cannot shatter. The strain upon them must be terrific, and we need to pray more and more that they may have the courage to maintain their magnificent spirit. Opportunity is being afforded us again for a National Day of Humiliation and Prayer, on Sunday, September 8. I trust all our people will respond to His Majesty the King's request that his people throughout the Empire will come together for corporate prayer, and I also hope it may be a new beginning for those who have neglected corporate worship in the past. If we keep away from assembling ourselves with those of like faith, we rob ourselves of some things that are vital to our religion. Without the Church we cannot be the full Christians we ought to be, any more than we can be true individuals by becoming hermits.

In a recent Church "Standard," a pastoral letter from the Bishop of Wellington was published. In it the Bishop asks, "Is there not something infinitely stirring in the fact that we belong to a generation to which God has given the high honour of upholding all that He holds dear against the fury of the oppressor, that same honour which S. Paul recognised as having been given to the Church of his day when he wrote of the Philippians, 'To you it hath been granted in the behalf of Christ, not only to believe on Him, but also to suffer in his behalf.'"

Are we ready to accept that "high honour"?

Chinese Red Cross.—His Grace The Archbishop writes: "The Bishop of Hong Kong has written on behalf of the Foreign Auxilliary of the Chinese Red Cross, to say that their resources are now nearly exhausted since the Scandinavian countries, who were very generous helpers of medical relief in China, have become involved in the War.
