All Saints' Patronal Festival:

A WORD FROM THE RECTOR

My dear friends,

For some time now, the parish finances have been giving us considerable worry, and I commend to your careful consideration the special article in this issue of "The Chronicle" on the gap between our offertories and expenses, and the vast amount of maintenance work in which we have been necessarily involved in keeping the property of All Saints' in proper order.

You will read how we have spent over \$23,400 on essential maintenance and replacement work on the Church, Halls, Rectory, and grounds. You will also read how our expenditure in the last ten years has been \$27,400 higher than our regular parish income—only through the annual Fetes have we been able to balance the books.

Great improvements have been made, but much remains to be done. External painting must be performed each five years or so, much has been spent on continuously maintaining our Church roof, but we must face up to the inevitable replacement of slates, by copper sheeting, and we must also provide while we can against further falls in collections due to further moves of parishioners from the parish. A Trust Fund linked with our 1970 Centenary has been proposed to hold these funds for the future.

I therefore ask you to do whatever you can to help our Fete effort. Many of our folk have been working unceasingly throughout the year, and if you would like to add your support, we will gladly find you a job.

Last year's Fete raised almost \$3,000. We have had particularly heavy expenses in the last 12 months, and seek your help in equalling or even attaining a higher figure this year.

ALL SAINTS' FINANCES

Problems of Balancing Our Budget

An analysis of church finances for the ten years ended 31st March, 1968 has revealed a progressive retrogression of our income as compared with a continued rise in the costs of our essential services. Offertories of \$6,305 in 1958-59 fell by 15.9% to \$5,302 in 1967-68, while District Visitors' collections fell by 50.6% from \$861 to \$425 in the same period.

Against an average annual expenditure of \$9,633, our average income was only \$6,893, so that we had an average deficiency on general accounts for this ten year period of \$2,740 per annum.

Except for special receipts of uncertain and non-recurring nature, which over the period aggregated \$31,053, or 31% of our total income, operations of the general fund to 31st March, 1968 would have resulted in an overall deficiency of \$27,392 instead of the small surplus of \$3,657. The major portion of these special receipts, viz \$21,940 was derived from our annual fetes.

Costs of essential repairs, maintenance and renewal of church property during the years 1959-1968 totalled \$23,433, a figure that would have been exceedingly greater but for the large amount of voluntary labour that was forthcoming to complete the major portion of these works, and for which no payment was required.

Painting of the exterior and interior of the Church and parish hall in 1962-63 cost some \$6,000, whilst \$2,020 was spent in 1965 on restoring the pipe organ.

Since 31st March, 1968, renewal, sanding, and polishing of the last section of the main floor of the church and the chancel have been completed. The original floor saw service for close on 100 years and complete renewal of all sections had become a necessity. The total cost of this particular work which was started in 1965, was \$2,707.

The extent of the additions, renewals, and renovations undertaken during the years 1959-68 will be apparent from perusal of the lists of works that follow. In some instances, the memorials were partly financed from church funds where donations did not cover the actual costs.

LATEST FETE NEWS

All Set for Saturday, 16th November

This year, we are hoping to pass last year's total takings of \$2,960, and if possible, to reach the record figure of \$3,117 set in 1965. Main aim of the Fete this year is to bridge the gap between the Church's annual income and expenditure, caused by the loss of parishioners from the district and the consequent fall in offertories. It is also hoped to get funds for a trust fund to meet future large costs such as replacement of the church roof.

We have been truly blessed in every Fete that has been held over the last 12 years, and with your co-operation, we look forward with great confidence to achieving our aims this time. Please do whatever you can to help, support the various stalls and entertainments, and by your attendance, help make this another happy prosperous day for All Saints' and yourselves.

Regretably, there are workers from past years who will not be with us this year. They must be replaced, however, if we are to maintain our figures and keep the Church going, and we appeal especially to folk in the following categories to come forward and help fill the gaps in our ranks:

- parishioners not active in former years;
- those who attended but do not serve on a stall;
- those who are new to the parish.

Professor James Bell to Perform

There will be laughs galore when Professor James Bell presents his free Magic Show and Puppet Theatre at 2.30 p.m. and 3.30 p.m. The Prof. comes from Channel 7, and will be bringing with him such well known characters as Donald Duck and Mickey Mouse.

We specially selected Professor Bell with a view to attracting to the Fete a larger crowd of youngsters and their parents to patronise our stalls.

Other Great Attractions:

- Merry-go-Round and Train rides all day.
- Bankstown Caledonian Pipe Band will march and play from 2 p.m. - 5 p.m.
- Burwood Police Boys' Band will play in the morning.
- Hoopla and other games of skill: lots of prizes.
- All attending, including workers, are eligible to sign the visitors' book and have a chance of winning the two big poultry dinners and grocery hampers.

LATEST FETE NEWS

Here is the latest news from stallholders:

● **Refreshments:** Any donations of sandwich fillings such as butter, eggs, spaghetti, baked beans, salmon, cakes, scones and biscuits would be very much appreciated. Mrs. Champion would be grateful if intending donors could let her know a few days before the Fete, as this will greatly assist in obtaining the remainder of the provisions needed.

● **Vegetables:** The proceeds from the Car Drive will be used to buy a large stock of fresh vegetables direct from the Chinese gardens at Arncliffe on the morning of the Fete. At this time of the year, they usually have lettuce, spinach, rhubarb, beetroot, carrots, shallots, celery, potatoes and pumpkin. Additional gifts of home grown fruit and vegetables from parishioners would be most welcome, and could be left at the Hall on Friday night or at the stall on Saturday morning.

● **White Elephant:** This is the famous stall that is able to sell what other people don't want, and which has achieved remarkable sales figures in past years by disposing of items donated by parishioners. This year, not one but two marquees outside the front of the Parish Hall will be crammed full of wonderful bargains. Even if you cannot help any other stall with a donation, there must be something at your home that you no longer need, or which is in the way. Just contact Mrs. Humphreys or any Y.C.I. Member, or leave your name at the Rectory, and collection will be arranged.

● **Toys:** Manned by the Fellowship, this stall will have a wide range of stock for kiddies of all ages. The young folk have been working throughout the year and look forward to your support.

● **Groceries:** The Sunday School enrolment has decreased this year, and some problems have been experienced in securing as big a stock as last year so that any further donations will be gratefully received. The scholars are now conducting a drive for packet and bottled groceries—gifts may be sent along to Sunday School with the children, or left at the stall on the Friday night or Saturday morning. Every little helps.

● Mrs. I. Clark extends her sincere thanks to all who have helped her with donations of wool, etc, for her Fancy Work Stall. Mrs. Clark adds that she now has enough wool for this year's effort.

Books, Books, Books: A beautiful collection of books will go on sale at this year's Fete. Books for the Intellectual, a wide variety of magazines, including current issues of "Life", "Woman" and "Home Journal" etc. Come early for our bigger and better display.
