THE RECTOR'S LETTER.

All Saints' Rectory,
28th October, 1940.

Dear People of All Saints'

I am sure the simple and beautiful Confirmation Service will ever remain in the memory of the thirty-five candidates to whom the Sacred Rite was administered yesterday by the Bishop Coadjutor of Sydney (the Right Reverend C. Venn Pilcher), in the presence of a very large number of their parents, godparents and friends. The Bishop's most helpful and inspiring address was based on the words from the tenth chapter of St. Matthew's Gospel, verse eight: "Freely ye have received, freely give." I expect the confirmees have already marked this text in their Bibles, in the manner suggested to them in the preparation classes.

I do most earnestly commend these young people who stand at the commencement of their full membership of the Church to your unceasing prayer and care. This is a matter of most terrible urgency in these days, when we are called upon to live in a time when our enemies make no secret whatever of their purpose to destroy the Christian Faith. If you doubt that statement, read a little five-penny publication (procurable at any booksellers) entitled, "Cross into Swastika," which will afford you convincing evidence of its truth. Surely Australian people do not realise what they are up against, or we would not have the amazing spectacle of thousands of our people enjoying all the freedom which has come to

them through the Christian Faith, without one thought of the Founder of that Faith, or of His Church, which is His army, organised and pledged to challenge evil, both public and private, and to stand up against anything which hinders the building of His Kingdom.

It is all very well to rail against the leaders and peoples of other nations and their rejection of God, but what has not yet been recognised in Australia is that Christianity may die out not only through deliberate repression, but also, and far more probably, **through neglect**. If we think at all, we must see that Justice, Truth and Charity and the values of a liberal civilisation are bound up with our Christian inheritance, and it is quite obvious that where Christianity is repudiated, all that makes life worth living goes down with it.


The things which are done by all grades of society on Sundays (which might quite easily be arranged on other days), and which people seem to "get away with," without one protest from the Church, is positively amazing; and it is no wonder that the conception of a Christian as a mild and harmless person is the popular one. What a caricature of the follower of Christ! His early followers were **dangerous** men, concerning whom it was said, "They have turned the world upside down!" It is the glory of our Christian heritage that men and women who have been touched by Christ's spirit have suffered gladly imprisonment, persecution, wounds, even death itself, because they have stood forth for truth and righteousness, and because they have been a menace to the complacency of the society in which they lived.

The young people of to-day have to go out and live their lives amongst thousands of their fellow Australians who live entirely for self and neglect utterly God's Day, God's House, and God's Book. Whether the Confirmees remain faithful to their vows will depend largely upon the measure of sincerity and earnestness which they brought to their preparation for Confirmation; but it will also depend, far more than you perhaps realise, upon the **example** of their parents and elders. Parents, what kind of a lead are you giving your boy, your girl, in these critical days?

We welcome and congratulate Mr. W. J. Cooke upon his election, on 9th October, as People's Warden in place of Mr. Rankin. It is good to find one of the younger men assuming the responsibility of this office, and we feel that Mr. Cooke will bring to it that ability and keenness which marks all his work.

By the time you read this letter we shall be keeping our Patronal Festival, but there will still be time to remind you of the Choir Festival and recital of English Church music on Wednesday, 6th November, and to ask that whilst the Choir does its part in the Chancel, you will do your part by filling the nave!

In a letter to the Rector, Miss Milner Stephen writes: "I enjoyed my luncheon time with you all so much, and it was quite an inspiration to find a Parish with such a fine gathering of its Church women—everything had been so carefully arranged, and therefore, it went so well."

Cathedral Festival.—His Grace The Archbishop writes: "I shall be so glad if you will make the Cathedral Festival (November 24-30) known through your Parish Magazine. This is the annual opportunity for all parishes in the Diocese to rally round the Cathedral. As you will see, a varied programme has been arranged, and many good causes will benefit. We shall be so glad to welcome you and your parishioners at any of these gatherings, and the Precentor will be happy to supply you with any tickets which you can use."

We commend the Cathedral Festival to our parishioners, and would ask them to consult the programme posted in the Church porch for detailed arrangements.

"More Churches for Greater Sydney."—His Grace The Archbishop's appeal for £25,000 to establish 50 new Churches has already been launched. In response to his request to make the need known to our parishioners through the medium of the parish paper, we publish in full His Grace's introductory letter to the booklet published, and which may be seen in the Church porch. The Archbishop writes, "If each parish could aim at contributing on an average £20 before the end of December, that would enable this great need in its most urgent aspects to be met without too great delay." We shall be pleased to forward any donations to the "More Churches Fund." The following is a copy of The Archbishop's appeal to the people of the Diocese:

"A careful survey of the Diocese reveals that in the suburbs of Sydney there is an urgent need for about fifty Churches. In assessing the need of Church effort in various centres enquiry has been made, as a guide, whether the State has found it necessary to build a Public School or establish a Railway Station; how far the community is from the nearest Anglican Church, and how many Church of England families are in residence. Few of the localities we have in mind contain well-to-do families. Most of them are rising areas where the houses are largely being built and paid for by people anxious to have eventually homes of their own. This effort taxes their resources. It is for them this appeal is particularly made. Unless provision is made for worship and fellowship and Sunday School instruction, spiritual values will be lost sight of, and a community indifferent to such values will grow up. We ought to provide in each place a building as a centre of spiritual influence, even though, as a beginning, it may be on a small scale. As spiritual life develops the people and their religious leaders may be trusted to provide more adequate facilities. To this end an attractive design for a building, which will cost only £300 in weather-board or £600 in brick, and which can be the first portion of a larger Church building, has been designed. I confidently appeal to Church people individually and as parishes to co-operate in building more Churches in the less affluent quarters of Greater Sydney in these days when our population is normally so rapidly increasing, and especially in view of the possible recurrence of what happened in this Diocese during and immediately after the last War—an abnormal influx of the Church population during such a period. While we are striving in the War to defend and maintain the freedom for which Christianity stands, we must take care not to lose Christianity itself in the Home base. We must work and give for the Faith, as well as for the Freedom it proclaims and ensures. When it is remembered that the Anglican population represents nearly 50 per cent. of the

whole, it will be realized what an enormous influence for good we shall exert upon the community if we do our work faithfully and well, and, on the other hand, how serious will be our responsibility if we fail. I feel sure that Church people who can help have only to be apprised of these facts and of our endeavour to meet the situation to evoke from them a willing and effective response. With confidence, therefore, I make this appeal to the Diocese."
