THE RECTOR'S LETTER.

All Saints' Rectory,

31st October, 1938.

Dear People of All Saints:

Yesterday the Bishop Coadjutor (the Right Reverend C. Venn Pilcher) administered the Sacred Rite of Confirmation to Forty-six candidates (forty-two from this parish, and four from other parishes) in the presence of a large congregation. The Bishop's address was based on St. Matthew, chapter 4, verse 19: "Follow Me and I will make you . . .," which verse I hope the Confirmees will mark in their Bibles in the manner I suggested.

I would most earnestly ask your prayers on behalf of these young people standing at the Commencement of their full Church life. Will you pray that by the power of the Holy Spirit they may be strengthened to keep the promises they made at their Confirmation? They need our prayers, specially in these days when so many people are living entirely for self, and it is so terribly easy for young people to drift almost imperceptibly into the company of those who seem quite content to accept all the good things this wonderful world offers, without ever giving one thought to the Giver.

Whether our young people drift away from Church influences, or whether they remain loyal, depends largely upon themselves—upon the measure of sincerity and earnestness they have put into their Confirmation preparation; but it will also depend, far more, perhaps, than you have ever realised, upon the **example** of their parents and elders. It speaks very well for those young people who **do** remain loyal to their Church, notwithstanding the indifference and apathy of their home folk; but how much happier life would be for them, if they had the support and co-operation which they have a right to expect from their parents. There are hundreds of parents who would not dream of neglecting their children's physical and mental development but who never give one thought to the child's spiritual development.

Growth is the main law of all life; in nature, in art, in science, and above all in our own individual personality. God reveals Himself to us in a different aspect at each stage of life, and, as we advance, He reveals

Himself more fully: in childhood as a loving Friend; in boyhood (or girlhood) as a Comrade in temptation; in youth as a pioneering Leader, calling us to new adventures of thought and service. We grow in character by sharing in Christ's spirit of unselfish service "more and more"—surely that is just the meaning of the prayer said by the Bishop over each Confirmation candidate: that he (or she) may "daily increase in thy Holy Spirit more and more."


We are not merely individuals, however, but members of a body, a society, called the Church. This too grows steadily, but it can do so only by our individual contribution. We should be proud to belong to an ever-growing Church (both past and present) throughout the world, with its heroes, leaders, thinkers and practical men; they need our co-operation. By taking our part regularly in Church worship, particularly in Holy Communion, and by the spirit of service to others in everyday life, we help our Church to grow, and we help to keep fresh and vital our own contact with the Spirit of Christ.

I suggest to those recently confirmed that we should meet once a month, on the **last Tuesday** if possible, and November the twenty-ninth will be the date of the first meeting. Those who were prepared by me for Confirmation in former years will be welcome too, together with any young people who are Communicants. If you will all come at a quarter-to-eight on the above date, I will explain my reasons for calling you together in this way.

I would remind you that Sunday, November 13 is Armistice Sunday, and the following Sunday has been appointed to be observed as Industrial Sunday. Special services will be held on both Sundays, and special hymns (appropriate to Peace and to Social and Industrial problems) are being printed for these occasions.

The interchange of pulpits on Whitsunday evening, which fell on June 5th last, proved so acceptable to all denominations, that the Ministers' Fraternal suggests a further interchange on the evening of the first Sunday in Advent, November 27. No details have yet been arranged, but the preacher's name will be announced in due course, and I trust All Saints' people will realise that the only way to welcome a visiting preacher is to be present at the service to hear him!

MATTERS MAINLY PAROCHIAL.

Women's Guild.—The Misses Eve are to be congratulated on the success of the concert they organised in aid of Guild funds. The programme was provided by members of the G.F.S. from Miller's Point, and was enjoyed by all present. The Guild is very grateful to the organisers and the G.F.S. members who gave so much of their time and their energy to bring the evening to so successful an issue. The sum of £7/10/- will be added to the Guild funds through this effort.

On Thursday, 27th October, the Guild held its Annual Grocery Gift Evening for the B.C.A. Sister Dowling, from Ceduna Hospital, was the speaker. She gave us a splendid address on the power and efficacy of prayer, manifested in the work at Ceduna. Through this meeting a box of groceries has been sent to B.C.A. from Guild members. Supper, arranged by Mrs. J. Gray, brought the evening to a close.

The month of November will be a busy one for Guild members. On Thursday, November 10, there will be a business meeting at 8 p.m., when every member is asked to be present. On Saturday, November 12, a car drive is being arranged for a visit to Hammondville. We would be pleased to hear from any of our friends who would loan car and driver for the outing. Cars will leave the church at 2 p.m. Then, on Wednesday, November 16, the Sydney Folk Song Choir is coming to give us a concert, when everyone is assured of a musical treat. Tickets are 1/- each, and we hope to have a "bumper" house for this event. Then last, but not least, the Guild is arranging a Market Afternoon for Thursday, 24th November, at 3 p.m. The Mayoress, Mrs. J. Johnstone, has kindly consented to perform the opening ceremony. There will be aprons, cakes, jams, etc., for sale. Musical and elocutionary items will be given during the afternoon, and a social and financial success is hoped for. After this function, the "rest of the month will be our own."

Quarterly Socials.—The second of these social evenings, arranged by Miss Adams, in aid of the Curate Fund, will be held on Thursday, 15th December, at 8 p.m., in the Parish Hall. Annual Demonstration, in the Sydney Town Hall, on Saturday afternoon, November 12, when members of our branch will portray women and children of modern China. Through the generosity of our deputy leaders, the Misses Belfield and Carolus, the members will have a beautiful banner to lead them in the procession. We are all looking forward to a wonderful afternoon. Parents are cordially invited to attend. The admission is free to all. A collection will be taken to defray expenses.

The Choir.—The Rector or Choirmaster would be glad to hear of any adults who may wish to join the Choir; there is a particular need of men with bass or baritone voices. Rehearsals are held each Thursday at 8 p.m.

A group of probationers is being formed of boys about 9 years of age, who will be required at present only to attend the Sunday morning practice and service.

If any parishioner would give a gramophone to the Choir, excellent use could be made of it in the training of the choristers. Many records are now obtainable in Sydney which were made for the purpose of choir instruction.

The marriage of Miss Connie Hawse and Mr. Les. Browne has taken two members of long standing from our midst. We wish them good luck

in their new sphere of life, and hope that they will remember us when they look at the cut-glass salad bowl which Choir members gave them for a wedding present.

On behalf of the Choir, I would like to thank Mesdames Gill and Handel for their kindness in making cassocks and surplices for the male members; this work was greatly appreciated.

Home Mission Society—Advent Offerings.—Offerings for the funds of the Home Mission Society will be made at the Church Services of this Parish on Advent Sunday, November 27th. The Bishop Coadjutor has arranged

for these offerings to be presented at a special service in the Cathedral on Wednesday, November 30th, St. Andrew's Day, commencing at 7.45 p.m.

Meriden, Strathfield.—The Principal has sent the Rector the following particulars regarding the Entrance Scholarship Examination. There may be girls in this Parish who would like to enter this church school.

An Entrance Scholarship, valued at £12 per annum, and tenable for three years, subject to recommendation by the Principal, is offered by the Council of the above School for 1939, for girls 13 years of age or under.

The Examination is to be held at the School on Monday, 14th November. Application form and full particulars from the Principal. Entries close on Thursday, 10th November. The subjects of examination are as for the Primary Final Examination—English, History, Geography, Arithmetic—with the addition of an easy paper on the Gospel Story. Candidates are requested to be at Meriden by 9.15 a.m. on Monday, 14th November.

Trinity Grammar School.—Scholarships are also available for boys. The Headmaster of Trinity writes as follows:—

"Two Scholarships are available for 1939—one a Full Scholarship, the other a Half Scholarship. Advertisements concerning these have appeared in the Education Gazette for September and October. It is possible that you may have, among your choir boys and the younger members of your congregation, boys whom the Scholarships might help.

"I should be very pleased if you would draw the attention of possible candidates to these by some notice in your church or hall, or by a paragraph in your Parish magazine.

"Candidates must be under 13 at the end of this year. The last day of entry is 11th November. Full particulars may be had on application to the Bursar."
