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

Scripture distribution shows an even trend, with some improvement in sales of all varieties, including videos and comics for children. Free Bibles are distributed to those who cannot afford them, e.g. to those in prisons, and to students at theological colleges. A new translation, Contemporary English Version, is now available. This is a very simple language and is very easy for people to follow who have no knowledge of Christian terminology. So far,

we have only the New Testament, but it is expected that the whole Bible will be available by 1996.

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NOTINGS FROM ACWC REPRESENTATIVE

Last year, there were many natural disasters worldwide - one of which was the Mt Pinatubo volcanic eruption.



As the emotion and publicity immediately following the eruption dies away, we tend to push it to the back of our minds.

At the Conference in Bangkok last October, Gloria Gaa was asked if the Philippines could be an alternative venue for the 1994 Assembly. She said they could not accept this responsibility as the Government believes it will be many years before the country recovers from the devastation caused by lava and ash and there will be still a long way to go in 1994.

In spite of the problems in the Philippines, Gloria brought a cheque with her to give to the representatives from Bangladesh towards their cyclone relief.

Mr Sun and the two elderly Bible women and the caretaker remembered me. What memories came flooding

in as I recalled the times when I preached in that church; the last time was in 1950, when a cadre got up and told the congregation not to pay attention to what I had said - they were going to give people good things to enjoy now and the next generation would not know anything about Christianity because children would be taught there is no God - a prophesy which has been reversed as far as the Gospel is concerned. How amazed I was when I was taken to King Memorial Middle School, where I taught English and Scripture during the 3½ years I was in Shaoxing; although no one at the school knew we were coming, within a few minutes of arrival we were warmly welcomed by the Chairman of the School Board, then the Principal and his Deputy and other teachers came and greeted us with joyous enthusiasm. They took us to see the plaque which read that the church there had been opened in 1828 and Rev. R. Palmer, a CMS missionary. The Chairman of the Board said they were preparing to celebrate the 90th anniversary of the school in 1994, and invited us to come back for it. I was also asked to write about my association with the school for the history book they are preparing for 90th anniversary. It seemed incredible that a former foreign teacher would be so graciously received. The school is now a Teacher Training College with many more buildings than in 1951.

A visit to our former home brought back many memories; it is now in a very dilapidated condition, housing three families.
