THE RECTOR'S LETTER.

All Saints' Rectory,
1st April, 1935.

Dear People of All Saints'

Harvest, always a popular Festival, was no less so this year, and we record with gratitude a great day of real thanksgiving on Quinquagesima Sunday. Our Church was beautifully decorated, the Services inspiring, and appropriate music was well rendered by the Choir. Many thanks to EVERYONE who assisted by their gifts and service to make the Festival such a happy one, including the girls and boys of the Sunday School, who presented their gifts at Children's Service. All the gifts were sent to the Home of Peace; a letter of appreciation from the Matron appears elsewhere in this issue. It was a real pleasure to me to have my old friend, Bishop Dixon, as the special preacher at Evensong, as it was also to have another old friend in Bishop Cranswick, on March 17th. We thank them both for their timely and helpful addresses.

Time slips away so quickly that it is hard to realise we are already half way through the Season of Lent, and in a fortnight's time our thoughts will be directed to Holy Week and the commemoration of the Great Sacrifice. I trust you will do your utmost to keep Holy Week (which commences on Palm Sunday, April 14) free from social engagements, so that you may be able to come together for prayer and meditation upon the fact that the Cross is the centre of our religion; it shows what love can do and be, it wins where no force, no display of power could ever do. God was in Christ winning the world to Himself by love alone.

There will, of course, be no meetings of the clubs during Holy Week. Members of the various societies are invited to attend service, especially upon the evening of their regular club night. We hope the young people of the parish will realise that the keeping of Holy Week concerns them just as much as the more senior parishioners.

Then there is the question of Good Friday. How will YOU observe it? Again and again we find it necessary to remind people that Good Friday is a holiday because our Lord died on that day, and for no other reason whatsoever. We call it Good Friday because it was Good for us. What happened on that day shows us what God is like, and the way He works; it brings those who accept that wondrous love and try to live by love, back to God, and literally makes men afresh in the image of God, in the sense that love is both their objective and their manner of life, and they find a power, not their own, but God's, which frees them from selfishness and sin, and enables them to serve their fellow-men. Your Church invites you to spend this Holy Day quietly and thoughtfully in an united act of penitence and thanksgiving.

But the Cross to Christians is not simply an instrument of torture. If the Crucifixion were the last word about Jesus there would be no Gospel. We must keep steadily in our minds the fact that the Resurrection is the completion of Calvary. That which seemed at the time to the disciples to be the end of all their hope was suddenly found to be really God's method of showing men what His love was like and that even death itself has no power over love.

As you all know, the Prayer Book directs that every member of the Church of England shall communicate on Easter Day as a special confession of faith in the Risen and Living Lord. But it is also required that we do not come unprepared. Holy Communion is not a performance to be gone through. It is a communion between your Saviour and yourself, an expression of companionship and friendship. The best preparation for Easter is a sincere observance of Lent, Holy Week and Good Friday, so that we may really enter into Communion with our Risen Lord on Easter Morn, and know something of the Power of the Resurrection, which must not be limited to the hope of a future world only, but which has and ought to have a very vital effect upon our lives here and now. The disciples were changed men not because of what might happen to them in a future life, but because they really believed that God had raised Jesus their Saviour and Friend to be still their living Helper and Companion.

There will be three Celebrations of Holy Communion on Easter Day—seven o'clock, a quarter past eight, and at the eleven o'clock service. I ask

that all parishioners will study closely the times and particulars of the various services set out on page 4 of this issue.

Will you please return your Lenten Boxes or Envelopes on Easter Day, together with your Easter Offerings. If you propose being absent from home at Easter, will you please arrange to send your box along by some friend?

We shall be grateful for gifts of white flowers for the Easter Festival.

The Choir.—The annual meeting was held on Thursday, March 14th. Mr. Moon occupied the chair. The following officers were elected: Hon. secretary and treasurer, Mr. W. F. Morgan; cassock and surplice committee, Miss Howard, Miss Ritchie, Mr. Hammond, and Mr. Marshall; alms-dish bearer, Mr. W. Stephenson; to represent the Choir on "Mile of Pennies" scheme, Miss M. Brown and Mr. Marshall; social committee, Miss C. Hawse, Miss T. Belfield, Mr. W. Sopwith, and Mr. L. Browne. The former secretary, Mr. H. T. Browne, is leaving on a business trip to Japan and America; we all wish him a successful trip, and a safe return. The Choir has raised £17 14s. 4d. during the year 1934-35 towards its quota for the Parish Hall Fund: Sacred recital £3 15s. 5d., Donation (Mrs. Cox) £1 1s., Concert £9 4s. 6d., Choir members' contributions £3 16s. 5d. We wish to thank all parishioners who contributed to and supported the Choir's efforts. In addition the sum of £5 5s. 3d. was raised by the sale of "Buy a Motor" tickets, towards replacing the organ motor which was stolen.—W. F. Morgan, hon. secretary.

Women's Guild.—The Guild held its annual meeting on Thursday, 14th March. There was a very good attendance of members. The secretary read a report of the year's activities, and the treasurer's statement showed that between £80 and £90 had been disbursed during the year for parish and outside interests. Mrs. Hordern's resignation as president, owing to health reasons and removal from the district, was received with great regret on all sides, although we are very pleased to have her as one of our vice-presidents, and to know that she will still have the interest of the Guild (of which she has been the backbone for so many years) at heart. The members were also very sorry to accept Miss Chippendall's resignation as vice-president of the Guild, and her timely advice and helpfulness will be much missed. Miss Chippendall is the much-loved president of the Girls' Club, and is doing a splendid work amongst the senior girls of the parish, and as we are hoping this year for all the societies in the parish to co-ordinate their activities to a much greater extent, we feel that we have not lost Miss Chippendall completely from the Guild. Miss Adams has accepted the joint offices of president and organising secretary, and Miss Brown has consented to fill the vacancy of vice-president. Miss Eve (vice-president), Mrs. Gray (hon. secretary), and Miss Watson (treasurer) were all re-elected unopposed.

The Guild arranged a motor-drive to the C. of E. Homes at Carlingford on Saturday afternoon, 23rd March, which proved very enjoyable. We had

The addresses are given by Bishop Kirkby, the Coadjutor Bishop of Sydney (Rector), who earnestly invites all Church of England people to come.
