## THE RECTOR'S LETTER.

All Saints' Rectory,

26th March, 1936.

Dear People of All Saints',—

This letter will reach you some time during Holy Week and the Commemoration of the Great Sacrifice. I again ask that so far as it is possible you will keep that week free from Social engagements, so that you may be able to come together in prayer and meditation upon the fact that the Gospel of Christ was not only spoken, it was *lived*.

It would seem that men are endeavouring to take Good Friday from us, and are using the most sacred day in the whole year for a purpose which we cannot do other than deplore. It is necessary to remind people that the only reason why they get a holiday on Good Friday is because our Lord died for us on that day, and for **no other reason whatsoever**.

I have yet to learn any real reason for its observance in any other than a quiet and thoughtful manner, and no amount of argument can alter the origin of this Holy Day. You will have to pass through the "burning fiery furnace" of sarcasm if you stand for the proper observance of Good Friday, but I would remind you that compared with what our Lord suffered for us, this criticism is a very small thing.

There is an anonymous poem which states most clearly the mood with which many of us regard Christ crucified. It runs thus:—

'Go, sombre Christ, haul if thou wilt  
Thy Cross to thine own Calvary!  
When did I bid Thee suffer for my sake,  
To bind intolerable claims on me—  
Cease then to thrust thy tale of sorrow on my ears,  
Marring the music of my few short years.  
I will not listen to heroic things;  
We were not made to walk as priests and Kings."

I think we all talk like that sometimes. What is it to me if this Man chose to die for a dream? Why should we make it our concern? We "will not listen to heroic things"; we are not heroes, and we don't pretend to be heroes. We are just plain men and women, not particularly good, or strong, or brave.

I believe that attitude is very common in these modern days. We are ready enough to admire Christ and to praise Him—but to *follow* Him? No; that is asking too much of us; that's not our business. Is not that just what the priests said to Judas when, having realised what the Cross meant, he brought back the price of His betrayal. "What does that matter to us?" they said, "it is your affair, not ours." And for us, too, it is more convenient to think of the Cross as someone else's affair, not yours, not mine. Yet—

"Still as of old  
Man by himself is priced  
For thirty pieces Judas sold  
Himself, not Christ."

And when we shrink from the sight of Christ on the Cross, shutting our minds to the meaning of it, we may be richer by "thirty pieces of silver" measured by pleasure, by ease, by success in life. But by how much are we poorer?

I earnestly ask that you will accept your Church's invitation to spend Holy Week and Good Friday in a united act of penitence and thanksgiving, and thus prepare yourselves to enter into Communion with our Risen Lord on Easter morning.

There will be three Celebrations of Holy Communion on Easter Day—seven o'clock, quarter past eight, and at the eleven o'clock service.

Please return your Lenten Boxes and Envelopes on Easter Day together with your Easter offerings. If you anticipate being absent from the parish for Easter, you can help considerably by sending your Box by some friend.

We shall be grateful for gifts of white flowers for the Easter Festival; these should be left at the Rectory on Saturday morning, the 11th of April. With best wishes for a Holy, Happy Eastertide.

**Special Vouchers.**—The special vouchers, costing 10/- each, are now ready and may be obtained from the Rector. They entitle the purchaser to—

(1) A Congress Badge, entitling the holder to attend each of the eleven Sessions of the Congress; (2) a ticket for one entrance to the Missionary Exhibition in the Town Hall; (3) a ticket for one entrance to the Church History Museum; (4) a ticket for the Reception in the Sydney Town Hall on May 29th; (5) a ticket for a reserved seat at the Pageant; (6) a ticket for the Garden Party at Parramatta on June 6th.

By purchasing Special Vouchers, patrons of the Centenary Celebrations will effect an economy for themselves and render great assistance to the committee. The vouchers, for reasons of accommodation, are limited in number, and to avoid disappointment early application should be made to the Rector.

**Missionary Exhibition.**—A combined Missionary Exhibition will be held in the Sydney Town Hall on May 26 and 27, 1936 (afternoon and evening), and on Thursday, 28th (afternoon only).

The Australian Board of Missions and the Church Missionary Society, together with the British and Foreign Bible Society and the Society for the Propagation of Christian Knowledge, are preparing as far as possible to make the scenes of foreign lands live again in Australia.

Glimpses into the life and customs of Japan, China, India, Palestine, Africa, New Guinea, Melanesia and the Australian Aborigines, will be provided in various ways. In the Courts will be exhibited Curios of the different countries represented, and returned missionaries will explain them, and also deliver lectures from time to time during the Exhibition.

Among the visiting speakers will be The Metropolitan of India, the

Bishop of Jerusalem, Bishop Banerjee of Lahore (India), the Bishop of Aoteroa, N.Z., and the Bishop of Tokyo. The last three are natives of the countries they represent.

Medical scenes depicting work in mission hospitals and native villages will be staged, as well as other interesting items, such as Chinese feasts, etc.

Admission will be, Adults 1/-, Children 6d.

**Anzac Day.**—Holy Communion will be celebrated on St. Mark's Day, which is also Anzac Day, at 8 a.m. This day is something more than a holiday; it is a day sacred to Remembrance, and we should not forget why it is a public holiday.

**District Visitors.**—The work of this loyal band of Churchwomen again deserves special mention at the close of another financial year, during which they collected £218 for general Church funds, whilst distributing the monthly "Chronicle." We thank all those who, by the regularity of their gifts, made this possible. They have done invaluable work in helping to keep the Rector advised regarding cases of sickness, etc., of which he might otherwise be unaware.

**Kindergarten Fund.**—A generous offer of £50 from Miss E. M. Belfield has given us a start for our proposed Kindergarten Room, which we hope will become an accomplished fact this year. The former "Mile of Pennies" Box in the Church porch is now converted to a receptacle for your gifts, both large and small, for this Fund.

**Proposed Side Chapel.**—In November, 1934, I wrote concerning, and at the Vestry meeting last year plans for a proposed Memorial Side Chapel were exhibited, but that was as far as we got in the matter. You may remember that the plan was so arranged that a section, or "bay," of the screen could be donated by any family or person, and other memorials, it was suggested, could take the form of furnishings for the proposed chapel. The family and relatives of the late Mr. and Mrs. Bosward have decided to commence a fund for a side chapel, which will be a very fitting, useful, and beautiful memorial of their loved ones, whose association with All Saints' goes back so many years. The Rector is very grateful for this offer, and would like to hear from other families who might desire to join in this plan to perpetuate the memory of loved ones and to further enhance the beauty of our Church.
