THE RECTOR'S LETTER

All Saints' Rectory,

28th April, 1947.

Dear People of All Saints',

Although the Easter Festival seems quite a long time ago, this is the first opportunity we have had of recording our gratitude for the inspiring services of Easter Day, and of saying "Thank You" to all those who helped to make them so. The Church was beautifully decorated by Mrs. T. H. Bosward and her helpers; and once again we are indebted to Mr. and Mrs. Bosward for the profusion of lovely white dahlias (there must have been literally hundreds of them!) which bedecked the altar so appropriately for the "Queen of Festivals." The Choir rendered loyal and effective service throughout the day. We were glad to have the assistance of the Revds. A. E. Gardner and J. M. Thomas at the Celebrations, and we appreciate the visit of Bishop F. L. Ash, who preached at Evensong and made an appeal for the A.B.M. Centenary Fund. Subsequent to his visit, the Bishop sent the literature to which he referred, and it is now available.


The Churchwardens' statement at our Annual Vestry Meeting on 16th April reveals another satisfactory financial year. It contains details of a good deal of additional expenditure which should not recur this year. Mr. L. C. Calver and Mr. A. J. Harris were unanimously re-elected People's Wardens, and Mr. E. C. King again did me the honour of accepting nomination as Rector's Warden. With the addition of Mr. Ron McLean, who was elected to the vacancy on the Parish Council caused by Mr. C. E. Tanner's removal from the parish, we shall have the same "team" in office this year, my nominees being unchanged. Mr. S. L. Derrett and Mr. W. Sopwith, Jr., were re-elected Honorary Auditors, and the Parochial Nominators were also re-elected. Encouraging reports were received from the various parochial organisations, and I am happy to say that our gifts for the extension of Christ's Kingdom (both in our own land and overseas) are keeping up; for it has been well said, "A church which refuses to be missionary ceases to be Christian."

We wish to place on record our thanks to all the people of this parish, both within and without its various organisations, who have so willingly supported all efforts which have been made during the past financial year for the building of God's Kingdom and the welfare of the parish. We can never regard what we have been enabled to do together during the past year with any degree of self-complacency; as we reach another milestone in our Church's history, we remind ourselves that a milestone is **not** made for sitting on; its chief use is to show us how far we still have to go! We certainly have a long way to go before we can claim that this world is what God would have it be. The spirit of Comradeship, so outstanding a feature of the war years, is singularly lacking in civilian life. Lawlessness sweeps through this and other lands; nations are still suspicious of nations, desiring to be trusted, whilst apparently being unwilling to trust others. There is only **one** remedy for our difficulties, one solution to our problems, and that is the Christian religion permeating and dominating every department of life; for it not only holds up to us high ideals and lofty principles, but it gives us the power to attain them. Until we are willing to allow God to come into our plans, until we realise our dependence upon Him, instead of trying to run the world without Him, there cannot be anything ahead but confusion piled high upon confusion. "Many people suggest by their behaviour," says Evelyn Underhill, "that God is of far less importance than their bath, morning paper, or early cup of tea. The life of co-operation with Him must begin with a full and practical acceptance of the truth that God alone matters. . . . It means a discipline of thought and feeling, a more careful

use of such leisure as we have; and filling our minds with ideas that point the right way instead of suggestions which distract us from God and spiritual things."

The Revd. G. C. Glanville will be in charge of the parish during my absence. You will, I feel sure, rally round and assist him in every way you can; the most encouraging and helpful way would be by your regular attendance at the services.

MATTERS MAINLY PAROCHIAL

Ascension, Whitsunday, and Trinity.—We would remind you of the approach of these three Festivals—Ascension Day, 15th May; Whitsunday, 25th May; and Trinity Sunday on 1st June. On Ascension Day there will be Celebrations of Holy Communion at 7.30 and 10.30 a.m., and evening prayer at 7.45. We hope you will endeavour to be present at one of these services at least. The Bishop of Tasmania (the Right Reverend G. F. Cranswick) will preach at All Saints' at 11 a.m. on Whitsunday, 25th May.

Lenten Offerings.—We are encouraged by our people's response to the Lenten Appeal for the Missionary Work of the Church. £17/0/10 was received for A.B.M., and £20/14/5 for C.M.S. These amounts, together with the Children's Lenten Offering of £19 for A.B.M., make a total of £56/15/3.

Mothers' Day.—We purpose again to observe Mothers' Day in a practical manner by having special offerings for the "Food for Britain" Fund, thus doing something for the mothers in Britain who are having such a very difficult time. You will want to come to church to remember your own mother, and you could express your love for her in no better way than by helping the mothers overseas in this very practical way. Our gifts will be in money, as we believe that is the best way to assist the Fund. The Sunday is 11th May. The church decorations will again be in the capable hands of Mrs. Sworn, Mrs. Clifton Smith and the members of the Wedlock family in memory of their mother—Elizabeth Wedlock.

Parish Hall Fund.—The Boxes which we use each year (in lieu of a fete) for our Parish Hall Fund were made available on Easter Day, and will be recalled on the day of our Consecration Festival—17th August. Have you received your Box yet? This appeal concerns us **ALL**.

Women's Guild.—The Guild held a Social Evening on 10th April. Miss King Kemp paid us a visit and spoke on matters relating to the Annual A.B.M. Fete to be held next November. (The Guild for years past has been responsible for the Jam Stall at this Fete, but this year is working for a Novelty Stall instead. There must be numbers in our parish with clever fingers for this kind of work, and it would be such a help to receive gifts from them for our stall, especially as the Fete is to be held so close to the Christmas season, and novelties would command a ready sale. See what you can do for us, will you?) Over a cup of tea final arrangements were made for the Guild's Annual Luncheon held on 24th April. This function was, as in former years, a marked success. There was a splendid attendance. We had a gloriously fine day, after many rainy ones; as guest speaker we had Captain Cowland of the Church Army, who gave us a splendid address. He brought with him Sister Jones, who is an Australian aboriginal being trained by the Church Army. It was the first time that Sister had ever spoken in public, and she won all hearts. Her splendid diction, her humility,

but above all, her tremendous faith, will long be remembered by those who heard her. Then we had a very fine musical programme contributed by Mrs. Lyttle, Miss Steadman (vocalist) and Mr. Schofield (violinist). Mrs. Day and Miss Reed kindly acted as accompanists. (The greater part of the programme was kindly arranged by our organist, Mr. W. Rowland Eagar.) The decorations were again a feature, especially the stage, which was most attractively fixed by Mrs. Morris as a bush scene, with gunyah and aborigines making a very realistic picture. Last but not least the menu provided by the Guild groups, under the direction of Mesdames Reilly and Morris, and Miss D. P. Brown, left nothing to be desired. The Rector was in the chair, which gave great pleasure, as usually at this time of the year he is away on his holiday. A telegram, wishing us all the best, was received from Mrs. D. School funds benefited to the extent of £3/10/- as a result of the movies. We regret that Miss Belfield's ill health has continued and her fellow teachers wish her a complete and speedy recovery.

Y.C.I.—A meeting of this Institute was held on 28th March, when the 142nd issue of the "Manuscript Journal" was presented.
