THE RECTOR'S LETTER

R.M.S. "Otranto,"

At Sea (nearing Colombo),
17th October, 1951.

Dear People of All Saints',

It is not convenient to have a Celebration of Holy Communion while the ship is in port; and, as we are due in Colombo to-morrow (St. Luke's Day), we have observed the Festival this morning with a Communion Service at seven o'clock. As we approach the day when we are bidden to remember "the Physician whose praise is in the Gospel," we recall with thanksgiving all that St. Luke's life, character and special gifts have meant to the Church throughout the ages. How much poorer should we have been without Saint Luke's Gospel! At this time we remember, also with thanksgiving, all those concerned in, and connected with the ministry of healing—doctors, nurses, ambulance workers; all hospitals (especially those in our own parish and diocese), medical missions and those who endeavour to relieve the physical and mental suffering of the world.

This time last year we were thinking about the Confirmation Service which took place at the end of October. You may remember I wrote at the time: "The testing time for these young people commences now; but the **real test** will be apparent not so much now, when they are keen and enthusiastic, but this time next year. . . ." It will be interesting to discover how many of them have remained loyal to their Confirmation vows. There will be, I hope, a Confirmation of All Saints' next year, but I cannot give any date until my return.

It was with very mixed feelings that we watched the words, "Port of London Authority" becoming dimmer and dimmer and, finally, fading away altogether at Tilbury Docks on the afternoon of the Feast of St. Michael and All Angels. We made our Communion that morning at Lambeth; in the absence of the Archbishop of Canterbury, our friend, Bishop H. L. Gwyer (formerly Bishop of the Diocese of George, South Africa) was the Celebrant. As we watched England slowly fading into the distance, we realised that we shall probably not see "this dear, dear land" and our good friends in it again. I cannot imagine anyone who has visited England and Scotland **not** wanting to go again; and although our chances of returning seem remote, we have already begun to speak of "next time!" "Hope springs eternal in the human breast!" This is, I think, ample commentary upon our appreciation of the beauty of England and Scotland and upon the kindness of their people, for whom we shall always have the greatest admiration.

We have a Church of Scotland minister aboard, bound for Knox Church, Dunedin; and a Methodist who is going to Melbourne; but I am the only Anglican priest, and I am, therefore, responsible for all Communion Services, which are held in the ship's lounge each Sunday morning and upon Saints' Days at seven o'clock. We have combined in conducting a Children's Service in the Children's Nursery each Sunday at ten, in which we are assisted by two Church of England sisters who are going to Australia. The Captain's Service each Sunday morning is held in the lounge and is very well attended.

After Colombo comes the longest stretch of ocean, 3,130 nautical miles. If we get as good weather as we have had so far, we shall be singularly fortunate.

By the time you read this our Patronal Festival will be over. It should not be necessary to **ask** All Saints' people to attend service at least once on the Sunday falling nearest All Saints' Day, i.e., November 4. We should be between Melbourne and Sydney that Sunday, being due to arrive in Sydney the following day. I hope to take all services on Sunday, November 11, which is within the Octave of our Patronal Festival and is also Remembrance Sunday. At this distance I don't know which Sunday has been chosen for the Children's Festival; but if it be November 18, I shall look forward to being with the girls and boys at their own Special Festival Service.

There will be a day of continuous prayer for the Missionary Work of the Church on St. Andrew's Day, Friday, November 30, commencing with a


Celebration of Holy Communion at 7.30 a.m., and concluding with Evening Prayer at 5.30 p.m. I shall ask you to put your name down for the period you will be available, so that the continuity of prayer may be maintained throughout the day.

I am very grateful to Mr. and Mrs. Price for "holding the fort" all these months, and I join with you in appreciation of their ministry. I am grateful also to all those who willingly shouldered additional responsibilities and extra work during my absence. I am sorry to learn there has been much sickness in the parish during the winter months; and I offer my sincerest sympathy to all who have suffered bereavement.

We look forward to reunion with our parishioners and friends; and we pray that all we do together in these anxious and difficult days may tend to God's Glory and the Building of His Kingdom in the parish in which He has placed us. A parish, after all, is just a small section of a larger community: the Church is, and always must be, the centre of our parish life. Being made up of human beings, the Church is not, and probably never will be, here on earth, a perfect society; but its failures are failures of its members, including you and me. It is so very easy to find fault with "the Church"; but ought we not rather to find fault with ourselves for our own failure to live up to, and to spread to all departments of life, the ideals and spirit of Jesus Christ, which we should never have known but for the life and work of the Church?

With renewed thanks to every one, who, in any way, has contributed to the life and work of All Saints', Petersham, during its Rector's absence, and with good wishes to you ALL, in which my wife joins,

MATTERS MAINLY PAROCHIAL

Farewell.—The function arranged by the Ladies' Guild to bid farewell to the Rev. and Mrs. W. T. Price was a happy event. All Saints' Parish Hall presented a very pleasing picture as one entered. The platform was beautifully decorated, and the small tables round the hall added to the attractiveness of the interior. The Church officers, with the President of the Guild (Miss Mottram) and the Secretary (Miss Lucas), received the guests. As the Rev. and Mrs. Price entered, the assembled parishioners (about 175) rose and sang "For they are jolly good fellows." Mrs. Spencer and Mr. Max Price, daughter and son of Rev. Price, were of the party. Mr. A. J. Harris, Minister's Warden, was a splendid chairman. Several musical items were rendered with Mrs. Day as a very proficient accompanist. The chairman in his address spoke in glowing terms of the work of Mr. Price in the parish and especially of the able manner in which he conducted the services of the Church. He was followed by Mr. L. C. Calver, People's Warden and Church Secretary, who also paid tribute to Mr. Price's ministry which, he stated, maintained the best traditions of All Saints' Church. Miss Mottram then presented Mr. Price with a cheque from the parishioners, and Mrs. Price received a beautiful sheaf of flowers, presented by Miss Lucas. A basket of sweets, artistically arranged by Mrs. Morris and Mrs. Yarrington, were also presented to Mrs. Price by little Miss Harris. Mrs. Price, in well-chosen words, thanked the ladies for their gifts and expressed her pleasure in seeing so many of the parishioners present. Mr. Price said how much they both appreciated the kind words spoken and the gifts so generously bestowed. "It is good to see such a gathering as this at our farewell and to realize that you have appreciated our ministry among you. It has been a great delight to me to conduct the services Sunday after Sunday in your beautiful Church and to have the privilege of speaking to you in the Name of our Great Master, and to visit the sick and aged in the parish and minister to them," said Mr. Price. Supper was served and the singing of "Auld Lang Syne" and the National Anthem brought the meeting to a close.

THE HOME MISSION SOCIETY "A Boy's Problems"

"You will never do any good with this boy," said a Children's Court magistrate one morning to a worker of the Home Mission Society. "There's no good in him at all."

Yes, this boy was a really tough case in every way. His home background was sordid, his way of life even at 16 years of age was bad, really bad.

He was taken into the Society's Charlton Memorial Home at Glebe Point and there he was taught a new way of life under real "home" conditions. It was not an easy road, but there he learned to know and trust the Saviour—he became a new creature indeed.

The H.M.S. in every way tries to be a missionary society in the Homeland for spreading the Gospel. Not only is its work carried on through the Children's Court, but also by the Parish Nurses, who visit hundreds of lonely sick folk in congested areas, by the Family Service Centre, which seeks to help in all kinds of family difficulties and problems. In the poorer parishes, in hospitals, in special places like Herne Bay Housing Estate, Hawkesbury River, Lord Howe Island, Norfolk Island and in many other places the work goes on.

On Sunday, 2nd DECEMBER NEXT (the first Sunday in Advent), the offertories taken in our Church will be for the Home Mission Society.

At the last annual meeting of the Society, His Grace the Archbishop urged Church people to help the Society to wipe off its debit balance of some £1,600. This debit is now nearly £1,900 and the Society is depending on Church people for their continued help, without which the work can't continue.

If ten people in each parish give an extra £1 each this Advent the Society's present difficulties will be solved.

Please pray, work and give for this splendid work of practical Christianity, especially helping on SUNDAY, 2nd DECEMBER.
