— HOLY WEEK. —

In this sacred week we commemorate the sorrows that wrought our salvation and the triumph that issued from them in the victory over the Cross and the Grave. If we would enter more fully into the "mind of Christ" we should make this week a time of self-denial and self examination; we should *watch* with Him and *pray*. The Services will be as follows:—

All Saints' Church DAILY at 11—Mattins, Ante-Communion, and
Devotional Reading. 7.45—Evensong, Address.

WEDNESDAY at 7.45—SPECIAL SERVICE: Preparation for Holy Communion

— GOOD FRIDAY. —

For most people this day will be marked by cessation of their ordinary work as on Sunday. Why is this Friday thus observed? Surely for this reason, and this alone, that the Crucifixion of our Lord and Saviour may be kept in remembrance by the observance of this day! and, shall we keep it as a day of mere pleasure, enjoyment and recreation? If the day is regarded at all, it should be "regarded unto 'The Lord,'" and used as a time of drawing closer to Him by meditation upon His Love and upon our sins that crucified Him! How will you use the day: Can you not make a special effort to attend some of the Services?—which will be as follows:—

All Saints' Church. 9 a.m.—Litany.

11 a.m.—Mattins, Ante-Communion and Sermon.

2-3 p.m.—One Hour's Service: "The Seven Sayings on the Cross."

3.15 p.m.—Service for the Young.

7.30 p.m.—Evensong. "The Story of the Cross," combined Choirs.

Mission Church. 11 a.m.—Mattins, Ante-Communion and Sermon.

All the offertories on Good Friday will be devoted to the Australian Board of Missions for New Guinea and the Aborigines.

— EASTER DAY. —

Easter Day is the great festival of the Resurrection: the greatest of all the festivals of the Church, as it commemorates a fact that is a very foundation truth of our Christianity. Surely our services should be especially joyful and triumphant, and that not merely in the character of words and tunes we use, but in the hearts of the worshippers themselves. This is the one day that our Prayer Book mentions as *the day* on which *all* Christians who come to the Holy Communion ought to *join together* in the great "sacrifice of praise and thanksgiving." The Services will be as follows:—

All Saints' Church. 6.30 a.m.—Holy Communion.

7.30 a.m.—Holy Communion.

11 a.m.—Mattins, Holy Communion and Sermon.

3.15 p.m.—Children's Choral Flower and Gift Service.

7.30 p.m.—Full Choral Evensong with Sermon.

Mission Church. 11 a.m.—Mattins, Holy Communion and Sermon.

3.15 p.m.—Children's Service. 7.30 p.m.—Evensong with Sermon.

Vestry Meetings.—The Parish Church Vestry Meeting will be held in the School Hall at 8 p.m. on Monday 24th April. The Mission Church Vestry Meeting will be held in the Vestry of the Mission Church at 8 p.m. on Tuesday 25th April. We hope to see a large number of men at both meetings when the accounts for the past year will be presented by the Wardens, and Officers for the ensuing year will be elected.

The Wardens are thankful to state that the response to their appeal has completely allayed their anxiety as to the estimated deficit in their accounts.

Ter-Centenary of the Authorised Version of the Bible.—

The Annual Meeting of the Petersham Branch of the British and Foreign Bible Society was held in All Saints' School Hall on Monday evening 20th March. The Rev. H. S. Begbie, Rector of All Souls, Leichhardt, presided. In connection with the meeting, the Celebration of the Three-hundredth Anniversary of the Issue of the Authorised Version of the Bible in 1611 was referred to. Mr. H. K. Gordon, Assistant-Secretary of the N. S. W. Auxiliary of the B. & F. B. Society, gave an interesting lantern-lecture on "The Bible in China and Korea." A collection was made for the Society.

C. E. M. S.—The last meeting of the Parochial Branch of the Men's Society was fairly well attended, and preliminary to the Devotional part of the meeting several matters of interest were discussed; and especially the importance of a better observance of Holy Week and Good Friday. Important questions were foreshadowed for settlement at the Annual Meeting in May. As the next regular night of meeting falls on the Monday in Holy Week it was agreed that members would endeavour to attend the Church Services to be held from 7.45 to 8.15 as part of the Society's meeting.

Young Churchmen's Institute.—About six months ago a meeting of young men connected with both our Churches in this Parish was held for the purpose of considering the advisability of forming an organisation for the young men in connection with the Church; there was a large gathering present, and it was decided to postpone the formation of a fully-organised institute until it had been ascertained how far it would likely be successful in the Parish. An interim society was then formed, which has been meeting twice a month in the School Hall and has latterly been known as the Young Men's Union. The whole matter was considered at a meeting on the 27th of February when it was decided to form the Union into a Young Churchmen's Institute on the lines approved and recommended by the Diocesan Synod, and the constitution and by-laws suggested by the Synod Committee were in the main adopted. We hope to see a large increase in the membership roll as the Institute becomes known; members of the Church of England above the age of 16 years are eligible for membership; and one of the rules requires members to be regular attendants at Church on Sunday. The subscription is 1/6 per quarter. Mr. T. H. Bosward, 15 Searle Street, Petersham, is the Honorary Secretary. Meetings will be held on the 1st and 3rd Mondays of each month. At the meeting on April 3 there will be a debate on "White Australia," and young men are invited to attend, and join the Institute.

Mothers Union.—At last meeting there was a fair gathering of members, when an address was given by Mrs. Radford. The next meeting will be held in the School Hall at 3 p.m. on Tuesday 4th April.
