

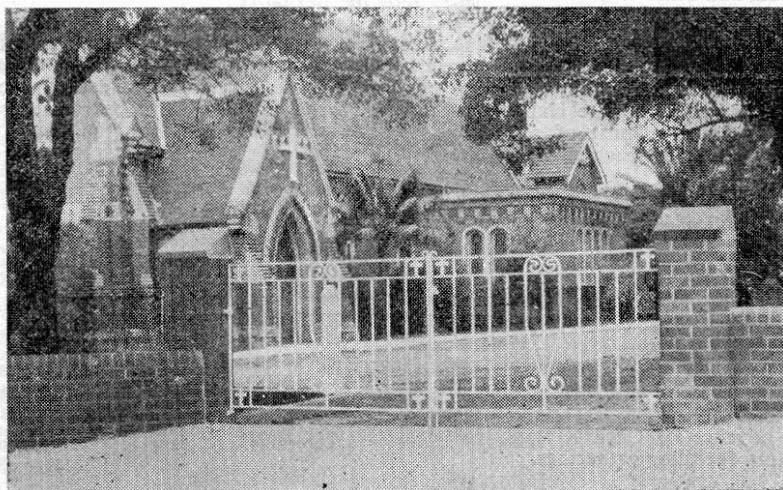

RECTOR'S NOTES

My dear Friends,

Well, we surely have a super-abundance of 'headaches' in our community. On every side we hear of industrial confrontation. First it is one industry and then another. Indeed, it seemed to reach a stage where folk appeared to have become insensitised to such onslaughts.

There does appear to be a hopeful sign around, however. At last one can hear the beginnings of re-action. Here and there, at long last, voices are being raised against the anarchy which has blighted our society for so long.

I am continually being told of one or another prominent industrial unionist admitting to the aim of disrupting relationships so that the present state of law and order and democracy will be destroyed. This policy has even finally worked itself down to the younger age groups and we are reading of phenomenal growth in lawlessness among children. It is reaching the stage where it is becoming of grave concern to sociologists — but surely it is the natural outcome of the attitudes of their elders.

The Bible warns that when we sow the wind we will reap the whirlwind. The anarchy we've been meeting is an anti-God spirit and can only bring great trouble and bitter fruit to our country.

I find myself longing for a strengthening of the re-action that is now beginning to be heard. There is a real need for a renewal of concern for others. We've had a glut of self-interest. Sir Robert Menzies certainly sounded a much-needed and appropriate challenge to us all recently. We need to be re-captured by the Calvary Spirit of self-giving, self-sacrificing service. May the Spirit of Jesus motivate us each and everyone —

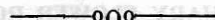

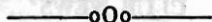
Hold God in your heart

**"THE CHAPEL ON THE CLIFFS"**

The Chapel of St. George the Martyr is situated on the cliffs of South Head dominating the entrance to Sydney Harbour. It serves as "a conspicuous and timeless memorial to all men of the Royal Australian Navy who lost their lives in active service in two World Wars and in the Korean War. The foundation-stone was laid on April 30, 1960, by a young man, a ward of Legacy, who remains anonymous.

Like every sanctuary where the faith is set forth and where our own faith is renewed, this Chapel has its centre, the Holy Table. Behind it extending the entire width of the building, an immense window of glare-resisting glass frames-up a magnificent seascape which includes the wide harbour-entrance and a wide sweep of open ocean.

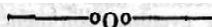
The altar consists of a variety of stones from historic and famous cathedrals and chapels all over the world. They are symbolic of the universality of the Christian faith.

The Chapel is a place of memory and of worship, rising from the very soil of Australia with stone quarried nearby, and within, furnished and enriched by wood and stone and other gifts from many lands and holy places.

In its location and its use of various symbols, the Chapel reminds us of the close association of Christ and the sailor, of the sea with the spread of the Gospel. The carved dolphins which form the base of the altar candlesticks represent the sacred fish symbol of Christ the Saviour. In combination with the anchor as seen in the carved panel of the Dedication Stone, it is the symbol of hope."

It is not how much we have, but more important, how we use it. Everybody has some talent, some skill which can be developed and made useful. Of course, frequently our friends seem to have all the talents and ourselves — not many. But if we examine ourselves, we can find many talents that God has given us. All we need is to develop them. Don't be envious and jealous of your friends' talent, rather be proud of your own and praise God by using it.

Money, the tangible result of our work, is the most misunderstood aspect of stewardship — management and the use of our talents and time, all God-given gifts indicate the depth of our commitment. We respond to these freely given gifts by giving faith, and love. We love God by realising the greatness of His love for us, and show our appreciation by being good stewards. So you see, although money is important, sometimes we place too much emphasis on it and not enough on the other important things that we use of God.

God has given us tongues to speak, ears to hear, and intelligence to understand, how to be Christian Stewards. Stewardship continues to play the most important role in our lives.

Everybody depends upon Christian-Management to make their lives more fruitful and happy. The Christian Steward does not stop at just doing the job. The extra part that he does, after he has completed his duty, is the part that makes him a Christian Steward — "He went above and beyond the call of duty".

Christian Stewardship is a full-time job. It demands our very best! Yet even this is not enough. How little we think of how much we receive, but even less do we think of how little we give. God is lavish in His giving to us; likewise we should put no limits on our response to His love.

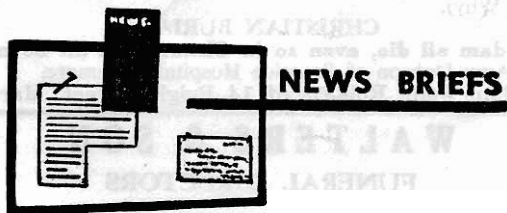
