THE RECTOR'S LETTER

All Saints' Rectory,
26th January, 1949.

Dear People of All Saints',

For most of you the end of the holiday period is rapidly approaching, and all parish organisations are resuming their activities. We hope we may have all present members with us again this year, and we hope many other parishioners will join them. To all who feel the need of fellowship, a hearty welcome is extended to join our Guilds, Clubs and Societies, which would be greatly strengthened in their plans for this year's work by the addition of new members.

Before another "Chronicle" can be in your hands the Season of Lent will have commenced—March 2nd being Ash Wednesday. Lent, with its insistent call to self-denial, is never a very popular season, but it is a most essential part of Christian life. It is strange how crooked our thinking is, on this great matter of self-denial. Men will deny themselves almost anything, endure anything, face privation, danger and death at the whim of a dictator, or even to climb a mountain or discover a new piece of country. And when they do these things, we rarely think them mad; indeed, we usually think them heroic, and very often they are. But if it is suggested that time or pleasure should be given up for the greater thing, the thing that our Lord did in His testing time in the wilderness, then it is thought almost fanatical, and people speak darkly of religious mania. Even an hour in church is too long for the majority, the vast majority; yet they can spend three hours or more in the picture show. Truly, we are very material little creatures; we find spiritual discipline very irksome. But there is no other way to happiness and security than the way Jesus Christ took. Here in this Lenten story, which is the Gospel for the First Sunday in Lent, is the thing our world needs more than anything else, the thing we **ALL** need: to face God, to face life, to find out what it means to be children of God. For we can see now quite clearly that unless men think things out afresh, unless they force themselves to understand God's purpose and follow it, our whole civilisation will crash hopelessly. Out there in the desert He discovered God's purpose for us. He brought life into the light, so that we, if we take the trouble, can see plainly what it means.

Each one endeavouring to be loyal to Christ and His Church will make his or her own rules for the proper observance of the Lenten Season. Particularly would I suggest that we give more time to our private prayer, Bible-reading, and worship, allowing nothing to interfere with our attendance at Holy Communion and the other services of the Church. Opportunities are given you for meditation and worship at the mid-week services as well as those held on Sundays. Let us remember that above the call of the Church is the call of Christ Himself, Who said: "If anyone wishes to follow me, let him deny himself . . ."


As our custom is at All Saints', all Lenten self-denial offerings will be used for the extension of Christ's Kingdom through the two great Missionary Societies of our Church—the Australian Board of Missions and the Church Missionary Society. Lenten boxes and envelopes will be ready on the Sunday before Ash Wednesday, that is, on February 27th.

This date prompts me to ask for your interest in, and support of, our Harvest Thanksgiving Services, which will be held on Quinquagesima Sunday—February 27. As you know, all Harvest Festival Gifts are sent, after the Festival, to The Home of Peace, which continues its devoted ministry to the sick and suffering, and merits all the help we can possibly give.

This is the first opportunity we have had of thanking Mrs. T. H. Bosward and Miss E. Olofsson, who decorated the Church so artistically for the Christmas Festival.

Please note the Archbishop's message, which follows this letter, and endeavour to be present on Sunday, March 6th.

A MESSAGE FROM THE ARCHBISHOP

At the request of the Diocesan Synod I have set apart the First Sunday in Lent, 6th March, as a Special Day of Prayer and Humiliation, in view of the grave condition that is manifested in world affairs. The threat to world peace, the increasing industrial unrest, the growing laxity in relation to moral standards; these things arise from the fact of our failure to relate our whole life to the holy and loving will of God, and to our failure to recognise that man's life cannot be lived in safety and peace without our constantly seeking that spiritual energy which we so greatly need, and which God is so ready to bestow upon all who faithfully call upon Him.

May I express the hope that every member of the Church will make a special effort to attend Divine Service on this Day of Prayer, and join with the congregations in our Churches in imploring God to be gracious unto us in our hour of need.—HOWARD SYDNEY.

MATTERS MAINLY PAROCHIAL

Ash Wednesday.—On the first day of Lent—March 2nd—there will be Celebrations of Holy Communion at 7 a.m. and 10.30 a.m., and Evening Prayer at 7.45 p.m. The Rector hopes that all parishioners will attend at least one of the services on Ash Wednesday. Each Wednesday in Lent there will be Celebrations of Holy Communion at 10.30 a.m., and Evening Prayer with Intercessions at 7.45 p.m.

A.B.M. Rally to Farewell Bishop Cranswick.—The Australian Board of Missions will hold a rally of Church people at the Chapter House, Sydney, on Wednesday, 23rd February, at 7.45 p.m., when farewell will be said to Bishop Cranswick, who is retiring from the Chairmanship of the Board.

The speakers will be the Primate, who will preside, and the Bishops of Newcastle and Armidale, Bishop Cranswick, together with Mr. Harold Morgan, Deputy Chairman of the N.S.W. Executive.

Missionary Films. United Action.—The State Branch of the National Missionary Council has decided upon a campaign for 1949 to give better publicity to what is being done in the various Mission Fields.

The major Missionary bodies have agreed to lend a film depicting some parts of their work and these films will be shown at four gatherings during 1949. The Anglican Church is represented on the Council by an equal number of members from A.B.M. and C.M.S. The first of these film exhibitions will take place in the Chapter House of St. Andrew's Cathedral, on Friday, 18th February, at 8 p.m.

The films to be shown on that occasion will be provided by the Presbyterian and Methodist Churches, and will illustrate the Missionary work of these Churches in India and Arnhem Land. A film of the Royal Wedding of Tonga will be shown. Tickets will be sold for 1/6. Sixpence of this sum (for every one sold) will be retained by the Missionary Organisation selling the ticket to be used for its own work.

Films of Anglican Missions will be shown at later exhibitions.

Papua's Call.—From the memoirs of our Hon. Secretary for Tasmania (Miss D. Henslowe). "At Gona (Canon Benson's Station) the people have been asking for Sisters to replace May Hayman and Mavis Parkinson, who were martyred by the Japanese. Crowds were on the beach as Miss Kekwick and I were lifted ashore from Canon Benson's canoe, and I wondered why our welcome was so great—women ran forward and stroked our arms and patted us, all saying, 'Sisters come, Sisters come.' Then we realised that they thought that at last Sisters had come to stay. Canon Benson explained to them that we were only visiting, and they made pathetic noises of disappointment, and I felt bitterly ashamed to know that at present there is no nurse and no teacher to send to them. If only we could send the personnel needed to Papua!" If only! Can you answer the call?

The Christmas Party.—A spirit of happy fellowship pervaded the Combined Christmas Party on December 15th. It is not possible to mention **all** who helped to make it such a happy evening; but we would thank those who entertained us; the members of the Women's Guild and Y.M. Carruthers, Miss Elvy Olofsson, and their team of willing helpers, who put in a lot of preliminary good work and made the Hall look most attractive. We thank **ALL** who contributed to the success of the evening.
