



Christmas Services.—Both our Churches were appropriately decorated for the Festival of the Nativity of our Lord. At the Parish Church the young men of the Choir again constructed a Chancel Screen which was very effective. Owing to the longer holiday this year many more people were away from home for Christmas than is usually the case, thus considerably lessening the number of Communicants and reducing the amount of the offertory on Christmas Day and the Sunday following, as compared with former years.

Organ Recital.—On Monday evening in Christmas week a Recital of Christmas music was given by Mr. Lenton, the selections being largely from the "Messiah". The Choir rendered an appropriate Christmas Anthem, assisted by Mr. W. H. Lynch who also sang some Solos from the "Messiah" including: "Comfort, ye my people!", "Every valley shall be exalted" and "Thou didst not leave". The attendance was larger than usual, and the appropriate character of the Recital was much appreciated by those who were present.

St. Augustine's Church.—On Sunday 4th January special services were held in commemoration of the opening and dedication of the Church which took place on the Festival of the Epiphany, January 6, 1912. The Church was tastefully decorated, and the services, which were choral throughout the day, were well attended. The offertory, devoted to the reduction of the Building Debt, amounted to between £7 and £8.

Confirmation.—Lectures on the meaning of Confirmation and classes of preparation will shortly be commenced. The Clergy will be glad to receive the names of any who are desirous of attending. There may be some persons, more especially adults whether men or women, who desire to know more about the purpose and the benefits of Confirmation before deciding whether they will offer themselves to be presented to the Bishop for "the laying on of hands." Such persons will find that the earlier lectures of the course will provide what they desire in the way of information, and they are assured that they are at liberty to withdraw from the preparation should they not wish to be confirmed.

Apsley House School.—THE GARDEN FETE, on behalf of the Rectory Building Fund, to which reference was made in the October and November issues of the Parish Paper, was held on November 28 and 29 in the School and its grounds. Great preparation had been made by the Principals and scholars, and several parishioners responded to the suggestion that their contributions would be welcomed as a help to swell the financial result. But a great disappointment was awaiting those who had prepared with so much enthusiasm. Beyond the parents and friends of the scholars scarcely anyone attended, with the result that the hope of sending the Churchwardens a substantial help towards the annual liability of the Parish to the Diocesan Church Buildings Loan Fund, did not materialize. Under the circumstances it is surprising that so large a sum as £13-10-0 was forwarded to the Rector and Wardens as the result of the Bazaar. Those who worked hard for the success of the undertaking may rest assured that their work has not been in vain and that they have the warm thanks of those who are responsible for the financial side of the Church's interests.

All Saints' Day and Sunday Schools combined for the Annual Distribution of Prizes which took place at the Town Hall on Tuesday 16th December. The scholars of both schools were entertained at a substantial tea in the School Hall at 6.30, after which they adjourned to the Town Hall for the remainder of the evening. The scholars of the Day School gave some selections from the Cantatas which they had performed at the School Concert, and "Carbines", a well-known conjurer, proved a very popular side of the programme. The prizes were presented to the scholars by the three Churchwardens—the Day School, by Mr. E. C. King, the Girls' Sunday School, by Mr. Sherwin, and the Boys', by Mr. Cusiter. One most pleasing feature of the prize-giving was provided by the youths of the senior division who obtained prizes and, (though quite young men) were not afraid or ashamed of coming on the platform to receive them. In both the Girls' and Boys' Schools several scholars obtained the maximum number of marks for the year.

Miss Green wishes to thank those who again donated prizes for the Day School—The Rector and Mrs. Goddard (three, for Religious knowledge), A. E. Jaques Esq. (gold medal, for the Dux of the School), Mrs. Percy Hordern (two), Mrs. Seale (two), Mrs. Palmer, Mrs. Wills, Mrs. Shuttleworth, Mrs. J. J. Cohen, Miss A. R. Hogg and Miss Barnett.

A beautiful hand-bag and an address signed by a few of the scholars on behalf of the whole School was presented to Miss Green, and presentations were also made to Miss Leatheam (assistant teacher), and to Miss Harris who for several years has ably assisted with the School Concerts and the Floral Fête. The Town Hall was well filled with parents and friends of the scholars both of Sunday and Day Schools, who seemed to thoroughly enter into the spirit of the gathering, and expressed on every side their appreciation of this new departure.

Memorial to the Late Mr. F. W. Wippell.—At the desire of her late husband Mrs. Wippell has made a gift of £100 to the Rector and Wardens for some necessary improvement or addition to the Church, at the same time expressing the wish that the object chosen should "take such form as might perpetuate the memory of her late dear husband". A choice of objects was suggested to Mrs. Wippell and she decided upon the erection of handsome iron gates at the front entrance to the Church grounds

with stone pillars, and a section of the brick and iron fence on either side of the gates in Stanmore-road, to correspond with the general design of the fence which it was proposed to erect as a Jubilee Memorial. The Wardens and Council have gratefully accepted Mrs. Wippell's generous gift, and, at their meeting on January 6, appointed a committee of three gentlemen to co-operate with the Clergy and Wardens of All Saints' in collecting information and submitting a report with plans and estimates of the cost of completing the fence, to the next meeting of the Council. It is much hoped that this substantial help will re-awaken interest in the matter, and that the present unsightly ruin of a fence may yield place to what may be a credit to the Church and neighbourhood.

Church of England Men's Society.—At the last monthly meeting on Monday 8th December, Mr. W. E. Gates, a member of St. Andrew's Cathedral Branch of the C.E.M.S., gave a most instructive and interesting lecture on the places visited during his recent visit to Europe. His most entertaining account of his travels was illustrated by excellent views which he had taken en route, and afterwards converted into lantern slides. Mr. McKeown, of the Australian Board of Missions, brought his lantern and exhibited the pictures. Mr. Gates has promised to give us a further instalment of the story of his travels, early in the new year, and we safely predict that all who were present will take much care to come again the next time. Our thanks are acknowledged to these gentlemen for their welcome and helpful visit. The next meeting will be held on Monday 12th January in All Saints' School Hall when the Honorary Secretary will read a paper on Albert Maclaren, the pioneer Missionary of the Anglican Mission in New Guinea. All men will be cordially welcomed.

St. Augustine's Sunday School.—The Presentation of Prizes in connection with St. Augustine's Sunday School took place on Sunday afternoon 21st December. The prizes were given out by Rev. W. T. Prentice who spoke a few appropriate words to the children, and particularly impressed upon the scholars that they should value the self-denying work of their Superintendent and teachers. A number of parents and friends were present. Before the prize-giving took place the scholars presented about 200 gifts of toys and books which they had been asked to contribute toward the decoration of the Christmas-tree in connection with the Mission Zone treat to the poor children of the city, given on Christmas Eve in the Sydney Town Hall. The opportunity was taken in the Vestry after the prize-giving to present to Mr. J. F. Edwards a gold Maltese-Cross pendant suitably inscribed, as a token of appreciation of his work in connection with the Sunday School. The presentation was made by Mr. Prentice on behalf of the Clergy and teachers, and he spoke in terms of warm praise of Mr. Edwards's good work. Mr. Evans on behalf of the Churchwardens added suitable words of appreciation, and Mr. Edwards feelingly responded expressing his complete surprise, and warmly thanked those who had made him the much-valued gift.

Sydney Diocesan Magazine.—For many reasons it has been deemed advisable to discontinue the distribution of the Magazine by the District Visitors after this present number, and to adopt the plan followed by other parishes throughout the diocese of sending the Magazine by post from headquarters. The District Visitors will receive subscriptions, 1/3 per annum post-free, and will send the names on to the Diocesan Office.

Parochial Day School Concert.—On Tuesday evening 9th December the scholars of the Day School under the direction of the Head-mistress and her assistants gave their usual Concert in aid of the Prize and School Funds. The attendance was very gratifying and the scholars acquitted themselves with credit in the two Cantatas which they rendered. The junior pupils' performance of "Daisy Darling's Dream" was very taking and was much applauded.

All Saints' Choir Picnic.—On Saturday 6th December, the gentlemen and boys of the Choir, accompanied by the Rector and the Choir-master and Mr. Sherwin (representing the Churchwardens), went for an outing to Sans Souci. At the dinner the Rector was asked to present prizes, given by the Choir-master, to three of the Choristers for excellence in work and conduct. What with cricket, swimming and other recreation a very pleasant time was passed, and the return journey seemed to come all too soon.

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
