RECTOR'S LETTER

My Dear Friends,

The New Year opens with the Epiphany season which this year will last until February 5. During this time the Church commemorates the visit of the wise men to the babe Jesus at Bethlehem, and the manifestation, or showing forth of Our Lord to the Gentiles. After the season of the Epiphany we have the Sundays called Septuagesima, Sexagesima, and Quinquagesima, which is the second section of the Church's year and is of course dependent on Easter. They come immediately before the penitential season of Lent. The theme of this season is Creation, Paradise, the Fall, the Flood, and the New Covenant. It has become the custom to hold our Harvest Festival on one of these Sundays. This year it will be held on Quinquagesima, February 20. I trust we shall send gifts of fruit and vegetables to the Church and that the services will be well attended.

We are reminded in all these observances how much God has done for us and how much we have failed Him. The season closes on the note of the New Covenant and of the gift of Love. That greatest of all gifts of how in Love, God sent our blessed Lord, the unspeakable sacrifice, for us men and our salvation. Then we come to the Lenten season; the dominate note of Lent is (1) Penitence, (2) Self-Discipline and Self Chastisement, (3) Special Devotion. I hope and pray that this Lent may be a solemn time of preparation for us all, so that we may come to full joy of Easter, knowing truly that the Lord is Risen indeed.

Special addresses will be given in Lent. On Wednesdays I hope to hold in the Church, "The Life of Our Lord from the Living Bible," a series of religious sound films depicting the Life and Ministry of Our Lord, and on Sunday evenings a series of addresses on "CHRIST & YOU." There will be also a celebration of Holy Communion each Wednesday in Lent at 7 a.m. and at 10 a.m. I do hope that every parishioner will endeavour to interest someone else in these services and bring them along so that our church life may be strengthened. May our study of God's Word make again a living church. If you have not been coming or have not been to church for years, don't be shy, come along we will be so glad to welcome you.

If humanity is to find meaning in life, then humanity must find God. God is found in Christ. Much of our difficulty today is that many only know the nature of God as outside us, and that is not to the full Gospel of Christ. He is human but more than human, He can save if we will only allow Him to. We must be pierced with a love from within, by a love that is more than our own love, then the wonder of the New Birth is ours. Such love is more than emotion, it carries with it its own insight, its own wisdom, it is a light we cannot quench, it is the Light that leads us into all truth. In the first chapter of John's Gospel we read, "In the beginning, there we find the reason for everything, everything was designed, planned, through Him, nothing was created without Him. What was created in Him was Life, and the light was the life of mankind. The light was always shining in the darkness, and the darkness cannot put it out. The real light, which gives light to everyone, was coming into the world. He was in the world, and the world was made through Him, but the world did not know it. He came unto His own, but His own did not receive Him, BUT to those who did receive Him, to THEM He gave the power to become the children of God, those that is who really believe in HIM, who receive their life not from man but from God." And the "reason for everything (God) became flesh, and dwelt among us." Friend do you know the meaning of Life, do you know Him whom to know is Eternal Life. We feel that as we study His Word together here we can introduce you to Him and that He will be with us in our Fellowship together.

CHURCH MUSIC

This year February marks the beginning of a very busy time for the choir—Easter being early leaves us with only a very short time to prepare music for the Harvest Festival, Lent, our Cantata for Passion Tide, and also the music for Easter.

The Harvest Festival this year will be on February 20, the Sunday before Lent. The Anthems for the day will be—"Morning Praise the Lord," by Maunder, and "The Evening Thou Visitest the Earth," by Green, plus the beautiful Harvest psalms, No. 104, "Praise the Lord O My Soul," and the 65th, "Thou O God Art Praised in Zion."

February 27, being the first Sunday in Lent, our thoughts turn to God's readiness to forgive the penitent and necessarily our hymns and anthems will be chosen to be in keeping with the Lenten Season. Another change during Lent will be the singing of the Benedicte in place of the Te deum, and the Jubilate in place of the Benedictus. It is interesting to note that the 1549 prayer book directed that it should be sung instead of the Te deum all through Lent, and whilst the 1552 prayer book gave no direction in this regard, it has now become the custom in many churches to make the change during Lent and Advent. Being a member of a church choir demands quite a lot of time, if a choirister be in earnest with his or her church work. All Saints' has a splendid body of singers in the choir, of which the parish can be justly proud. It is in particular a joy to see the excellent attendance at matins of the junior girls choir, who are looked after so ably by Miss Browning.

However, we do need more members for the choir, and the congregation can play an important part by encouraging anyone they hear of, who is church-minded, and who has a voice (no matter how small) to come and see your choirmaster, also encourage your children to come and sing with us.

Our Rector would like to see the choir stalls filled for both matins and evening. Will you help us?

On January 15 last, two of our most loyal choiristers became man and wife. We wish you, Erik and Joy, every happiness, and hope you will still be able to sing with us.
