## THE RECTOR'S LETTER

All Saints' Rectory,  
29th April, 1950.

Dear People of All Saints',

After many weeks of uncertain weather we were fortunate in having a fine day for the Easter Festival. The Church was beautifully decorated, thanks to Miss Howard and her helpers, and to those who sent additional flowers, including Mr. and Mrs. T. H. Bosward, from whose garden lovely white dahlias have been supplied for some weeks prior to the Festival. The Choir rendered the loyal and acceptable service we have become accustomed to expect. We were glad to have the assistance of the Chairman of the Australian Board of Missions (Archdeacon C. S. Robertson), who also conducted the very helpful Three Hours' Service on Good Friday, and was the occasional preacher at Mattins on Easter Day. We are very thankful for the inspiring Festival services, and grateful to all who helped to make them so.

Within the Season of Easter came Anzac Day, with its message of Remembrance. We remember with pride and thankfulness; but it is not enough to hold a memorial service once a year. We must, by our way of life, by our striving to uphold the things in whose defence they died, prove that we always remember them. If we fail, then they, the great host of the Mighty Dead, will become the Forgotten Army—of two world wars. Surely Remembrance, to be of any real value, must include a determination to be worthy of the sacrifices made for us; and also a sense of responsibility to those whom war blinded, maimed, and incapacitated. The inscription on an English war memorial has the right message:

"Pass not this stone in sorrow, but in pride,  
And strive to live as nobly as they died."

It is gratifying to report that the Churchwardens' Statement at our Annual Vestry Meeting on April 26th revealed another satisfactory financial year. We welcome the same Wardens as last year: Mr. L. C. Calver and Mr. A. J. Harris being unanimously re-elected People's Wardens, and Mr. E. C. King graciously accepted my nomination as Rector's Warden. We regret that, owing to indifferent health, Mr. W. Webster decided not to seek nomination to the Parish Council. We place on record our appreciation of his long association with All Saints' Church. Mr. R. F. Atkinson was elected in his stead, together with Messrs. J. M. Boyle, H. G. Brodie, D. Cooke, W. J. Cooke, D. B. Hunter, H. F. Jones, N. Scott, W. Sopwith, Jnr.; whilst Mr. A. E. Carruthers, Mr. A. H. Thomas, and Colonel C. H. Granville have accepted my nomination to the Council. Messrs. E. C. King, L. C. Calver, D. B. Hunter, J. M. Boyle and W. J. Cooke were re-elected Parish Representatives under "The Presentation and Exchange Ordinance, 1933." Upon their responsibility will fall in the event of this Parish falling vacant during the next 12 months. Mr. W. Sopwith and Mr. S. L. Derrett were re-elected Honorary Auditors. Unfortunately, we lack the space to publish the encouraging reports presented by the secretaries of the various parochial organisations. I am happy to say our gifts for the extension of Christ's Kingdom (both for Home Missions and Missions Overseas) have been well maintained, in some cases increased.

We record our sincere thanks to all the people of this parish both within and without its various organisations, who have so willingly supported all efforts made during the past financial year for the building of God's Kingdom and the welfare of our Church and Parish. We can never regard what we have been enabled to do together with any degree of complacency. We pray that wherein we have failed, we may learn from our failures; and wherein we have been blessed with success, we may be encouraged to go forward to even greater things.

At the present time we are hearing much about the menace of Marxian Communism. The Archbishop of York writes: "Marxian Communism must be defeated not only by argument and condemnation, but by showing that injustice and poverty can be removed by better methods than those of violence and revolution. Christian love for all men, as children of the same Father, should prove a more inspiring motive for the creation of a new universal order of justice and fellowship, than the motives of hate and anger.

"The Church is not afraid of the challenge of Marxian Communism, it knows it cannot succeed, for it ignores both God and the true nature of man. It is building its house on sand which will be swept away by the tempest. But the Church has no right to look forward to this day, unless it is doing all in its power to hasten the coming of the time when human rights will be recognised throughout the world, and when peace and justice will be firmly established."

#### MATTERS MAINLY PAROCHIAL

**Ascension, Whitsunday and Trinity.**—We remind you of the approach of these three Festivals—Ascension Day, May 18th; Whitsunday, May 28th, and Trinity Sunday, June 4th. On Ascension Day there will be Celebrations of Holy Communion at 7.30 and 10.30 a.m., and Evening Prayer at 7.45 p.m. We hope you will try to attend at least one of these services. On Whitsunday celebrations at 8 and 11 a.m., and on Trinity Sunday at 8 a.m.

**Mothers' Day.**—Sunday, May 14th, will be observed as Mothers' Day; and we hope to keep it in a practical way, by having special offerings for the "Food for Britain Fund." We feel that when we come to Church on Mothers' Day to thank God for one's own mother, we can best express our gratitude for her love and devotion by helping the mothers overseas. We are frequently hearing how much these food parcels from Australia mean to them, and how grateful they are to receive them. Our gifts will be in money, as we believe that is the best way to assist the fund. The Church flowers will again be given and arranged by the members of the Wedlock family in memory of their mother.

**Lenten Offerings.**—We sincerely thank you for your ready response to the appeal for increased Lenten Offerings for the Missionary work of the Church to help the Societies meet the greatly increased costs of maintaining and extending the work. So far, we have received £23/19/8 for A.B.M. and £19/17/10 for C.M.S. These amounts, plus the Children's Lenten Offering of £22 for A.B.M., made a total of £65/17/6.

**Women's Guild.**—On Thursday, 13th April, a short business meeting was held, followed by a Bible Study by the Rector, and which was appreciated by those present. The second meeting for April was transferred to 26th so that members could attend the Vestry meeting. Meetings for May are: Thursday, 11th: A Card Evening in the Guild Room at 8 p.m. Admission, 2/-. Thursday, 25th: A display by members of the Physical Culture Class in the Parish Hall at 8 p.m. Admission, silver coin. This outstanding result is made possible by the regular gifts of many parishioners, plus an immense amount of steady, patient service so willingly rendered by the Visitors throughout the year. Whilst recognising that the money is most helpful to those who have the responsibility of parish finance, we do not compute the District Visitors' work in terms of money only. Their work includes keeping in touch with all parishioners, welcoming newcomers, reporting promptly cases of sickness and trouble to the Rector, and generally rendering most valuable service. We thank those who have come to our aid, Miss Allen, Mrs. McLean, Mrs. Brennan and Miss Hayes, the latter doing three districts, and on one occasion, four! **We need three more visitors.** It would be a great pity to see this invaluable work (built up over a period of years) lapse through lack of helpers.

**Team-work.**—It is now nearly eighteen months since we had the assistance of a Verger. We record our appreciation of the willing co-operation of members of the Parish Council, Choir, Fellowship and Sunday School Staff, who have assisted the Rector and Wardens in the performance of Verger's duties on Sundays and on other occasions as required. Choir-members have recently formed themselves into a Sanctuary Guild, responsible for the Church brasses; their work has already been admired. Many of the "team" are young people, imbued with a spirit of service which is good to see. We also thank Mrs. Morris who, year by year, supplies perfectly-made laurel wreaths for our memorials and pulpit on Anzac and Remembrance Sundays.

**A.B.M.**—The Sydney Women's Auxiliary of the Australian Board of Missions will hold its Ascensiontide Rally on Friday, May 19th, at 2.30 p.m., in The Bible House, 95 Bathurst Street, Sydney. The speaker will be the Rev. Norman Cooke, recently appointed A.B.M. Secretary for N.S.W. We hope Petersham will be well represented at this meeting.

**Japan.**—We had the privilege of having the Rev. Frank Coaldrake at All Saints' on Palm Sunday morning, and together with him we welcomed the Rev. Norman Cooke.

The following information (supplied by the A.B.M.) concerning Mr. Coaldrake's work is informative and interesting:—

The Rev. FRANK COALDRAKE, of Odawara, was formally inducted on the Feast of the Annunciation, 1949, into his new position on the Izu Peninsula. His parish covers an area of 500 square miles and has a population of over a quarter of a million. Describing it he says, "It is the hub of the diocese, but is very mountainous, inaccessible country with only poor communications with the outside world. The people live in scattered farming and fishing villages. We have just ten Church members. Izu is to be our centre. From it we will conduct a campaign of evangelisation in the villages gradually spreading out into the country. My assistant, the Rev. M. Iida, lives in Numazu and will work the other side of the peninsula. The gift of a jeep from the Board of Missions in October, 1947, made a wonderful difference to me. For work in the peninsula a vehicle is indispensable. The parcels which have come monthly to the Diocesan Clergy have been received with profound gratitude.

"In April at Kyoto there was a large gathering from all over Japan to celebrate the 90th Anniversary of the coming of the first Anglican missionary to Japan. The Bishop Williams' Centenary will be celebrated in due course and it was decided at this Kyoto meeting to make a special campaign of evangelism during the intervening years. I find no difficulty in digging up an audience to listen to the preaching of the love of God in Christ Jesus. If I stop anywhere within sound of a dozen houses and lift up my voice to announce 'From now on I am going to speak about the Religion of Jesus Christ,' there will be a group of 40 or 50 people standing listening within five minutes. At the end I always pass out cards with our names and addresses and a note about writing to us if they want to hear more. There is a steady return of cards asking for instruction and it is our increasing responsibility to handle this."

**The Church in New Guinea.**—The sum of £3,600 has been contributed in the last three years by the Papuan Christians for the Papuan Church



Fund. Their aim is to raise the sum of £20,000 to be used as an Endowment Fund, the interest of which will be devoted to the payment of the stipends and wages of Papuan Clergy, teachers, and other Church workers and for evangelistic work in the diocese. The Sacred Synod of the Church in New Guinea has called upon each adult Christian to give a minimum donation of 5/- a year to this fund and parents to contribute 2/- for each child of school age. It has urged all Christians to contribute generously through the Church collections on the first Sunday of each month, through gifts of food given to the mission's store, and by voluntary labour. In this way the natives themselves can greatly help to cut down the present heavy expenses of the mission in cost of rice and non-native foods and in labour and make the mission better able to carry on and extend its work in New Guinea. The Sacred Synod has also suggested that each village should have a community garden which they would cultivate for the benefit of the mission, in which all would take their share of voluntary work. All the produce would be for the mission station. The value of this food which is brought to the mission's store would be credited to the Papuan Church Fund.
