THE RECTOR'S LETTER

All Saints' Rectory,
26th February, 1945.

Dear People of All Saints':

Notwithstanding the shortage of some things, we had an amazingly generous response for the Harvest Festival; in fact, the gifts were more numerous than ever, and the high standard of our Harvest offerings was particularly well maintained, both in quantity and quality. Thanks to Miss Adams, Mrs. Morris and their helpers, the Church was beautifully decorated for the Festival; Mrs. Morris again being able to procure wheat and corn which is so useful in adding the necessary harvest "touch." We are greatly indebted to ALL our parishioners and friends for their ready co-operation in making the day one of real Thanksgiving, which it undoubtedly was; bearing in mind the fact that it is still possible, in the sixth year of war, to have such services in Australia. We would specially mention the excellent response of the girls and boys of our Sunday School (in all departments, Senior, Primary and Kindergarten) who offered their gifts at a special Children's Service, and thus added very substantially to those already received. We have also to thank Mr. Harris and Mr. McFadyen for kindly transporting our Harvest Gifts to the Home of Peace, where they are so greatly appreciated, as you will see from the Matron's letter which we pass on to you in this issue.

As you are aware, our Lenten Self-denial offerings are always given to the two great missionary Societies of our Church—the Australian Board of Missions and the Church Missionary Society. Lenten boxes and envelopes were made available on the Sunday before Ash Wednesday, both in Church and Sunday School, and I trust we shall not go back in our gifts for the Extension of Christ's Kingdom this Lent, but rather that they may be increased. The responsibilities and opportunities facing the Missionary Societies are unparalleled in all history, and they constitute a definite challenge to all who call themselves Christian—they are your responsibilities, your opportunities, and mine. If you have not yet received your Lenten box or envelope, please ask for one when you come to Church, or ask your District Visitor to supply you with either.

We draw your attention to the services being arranged for Holy Week and Easter, and especially ask that you keep Holy Week (which commences on Palm Sunday, March 25) free from social engagements, that you may spend at least a part of each day in meditation and worship. There will, of course, be no meetings of clubs and societies during Holy Week, and members are invited to attend the services, particularly upon the Evening of their regular meeting. All our younger people will understand that the proper observance of this sacred week concerns them equally with the more senior parishioners.


Because men use the most sacred day in the whole year—Good Friday—for purposes which we cannot do other than deplore, and against which we should never cease to protest, it is necessary to draw attention to the fact that the **only reason** why Good Friday is a holiday is because our Lord was crucified for us and for all mankind on that day. Your Church makes ample provision for all parishioners to spend this sacred day quietly and thoughtfully in corporate acts of Penitence and Thankfulness. The times in which we live surely call for much more thoughtfulness than is evident at present. I believe we shall win the war against those powers which seek to plunge the world into Christless bondage and servitude; but our greatest battle is still to win, the battle to enthroned Christ, the battle to achieve a Christian civilization. We shall fail once again, as we have failed so many times before, if we underestimate the strength of the forces that are massed against the Christian idea. These are no times for indecision and compromise—on our decision as to what we are going to do

with Jesus Christ depends all our future happiness, and all the quality of our lives and service to this world. There is a "Wayside Pulpit" sign which reads: "This man postponed his decision to the eleventh hour, and died at 10.55." The season of Lent invites us to examine ourselves and find out just where we stand in this matter. Are we content to be amongst those who compromise, those who reverence Christ, who go to Him in trouble, but will not try to apply His mind and Law to their private lives, nor to the social, economic and international tragedies and injustices of to-day?

The best preparation for our Easter Communion is a proper observance of Holy Week and Good Friday, so that we may fully enter into fellowship with our Risen Lord and really know "the power of His Resurrection." May your Easter be a holy, and happy one, marked by a joy that the world can neither give nor take away.

Gifts of white flowers for the Easter Festival will be most acceptable, and should be left at the Church or Rectory not later than Saturday morning, March 31st.

Stainer's "Crucifixion."—This fine musical narrative of and meditation upon the sacred events of Calvary is still without rival in the affection of Church people. The choir will sing the "Crucifixion" on Wednesday evening, March 21, at 8 o'clock. The special soloists will be **Mr. Oliver King** (bass) and **Mr. Reg. Willoughby** (tenor). This solemn and beautiful music should not only attract many, but will carry into the hearts and minds of all, the eternal appeal and arresting challenge of the events of the first Good Friday.

C.E.N.E.F.—The first meeting of C.E.N.E.F. for 1945 was held in the Guild Room on February 1. It was reported by the Secretary that to date, forty canteen orders have been sent out. The Secretary would be grateful if parents would notify either the Rector, District visitors or herself as to any change of addresses. The sum of £5 was donated towards the Service Women's Hostel. In a letter received from Mrs. Mowll, she stressed the fact that more voluntary help is needed in the canteens and hostels. At the Cathedral hut, the hours are from 7 a.m. to 10 a.m.; 10 a.m. to 2 p.m.; or 2 p.m. to 6 p.m. On Saturday afternoon, April 14, a Market Day is being held in aid of the funds. The stalls will be well stocked, and the Physical Culture Class is providing the programme. Remember, Saturday, April 14!

Women's Guild.—The Guild resumed on Thursday, February 8, when a Gift Evening was held in aid of the Home of Peace. Deaconess Hall was the speaker who told us of the wonderful work done through the Home during the years, the result being really marvellous. We were also delighted to have Matron Claydon at our meeting, and thank both these ladies for giving up their valuable time to come and help us. The gifts were, with those from the Sunday School scholars and the Kindergarten, displayed in the Church at our Harvest Festival. They made a very brave showing. Never have we had such a response. From the first, on Saturday morning, when Mr. Ricketts arrived with his splendid donation of fruit and vegetables. I felt in my bones we were going to have a great day. And did we! I'll say. You people who were marked absent, don't know what you missed. I thought perhaps folks would like to know what we sent, so, when we were packing the goods I made a list. Here it is. The numbers indicate packets, etc.:—Breakfast foods, 25; jellies, 98; cornflour, 11; jams, 36; cocoa and coffee, 7; milk, 14; flour, 25lb. bag, 8 pkts.; eggs, 3 doz.; meat, 6; soups, sauces, tinned vegs., 11; custard powders, blanc mange, mixed fruits, puddings, junket, cheese, salt, kwic-bru, 18; squashes, etc., 45; cabbages, 11; celery, 15; pines, 8; rock melons, 4; tinned fruit, 3; 1 double case mixed vegs.; and 6 double cases fruit and three outsizes in loaves of bread.

On Thursday, February 22, the Guild met for a business meeting. Judging by the enthusiasm at the meeting, the Guild looks like having a good year. The chief business was the arrangement of the syllabus, some of the highlights being the **quarterly Rally** on Thursday, March 8, Miss Herring, Warden of the A.B.M. Hostel, to be the guest speaker, in the Chapel at 3 p.m., and to conclude with a social time in the Parish Hall; **Sewing Day** at the Home of Peace, March 12. **Market Day**, April 14, and the **Annual Luncheon**, May 24.
