THE RECTOR'S LETTER

All Saints' Rectory,
30th May, 1953.

Dear People of All Saints',

Foremost in our minds at this time is the Coronation. Though it is a great State ceremony, full of pageantry and colour, it is, first and foremost, a great religious act of deep spiritual significance. As in the case of the consecration of a bishop, the consecration of a king or queen takes place within the framework of the Holy Communion and partakes of its sacramental character. The Queen is crowned in a Christian Church, not in a hall of State; she is crowned by ministers of Jesus Christ, not by ministers of the Empire. Our Queen comes not to her coronation to fulfil a pageant, but to get a clearer vision of her task, and to offer herself to be led and guided by the King of kings and Lord of lords.


How fortunate are we to have as our sovereign, one in whose heart and mind the ideal of service is so firmly planted. It is well to recall at this time some of the words of her Christmas broadcast, 1952: "My father and my grandfather before him worked all their lives to unite our peoples ever more closely and to maintain the ideals which were so near to their hearts. I shall strive my utmost to carry on their work. At my coronation I shall dedicate myself anew to your service. . . . You will be keeping it as a holiday, but I want to ask you all, whatever your religion may be, to pray for me on that day—to pray that God may give me wisdom and strength to carry out the solemn promises I shall be making and that I may faithfully serve him and you all the days of my life."

We may give to our Queen lip service, a mere formal acknowledgment of the outward signs of her high office; yet that is but mock loyalty if we do not share her consecration to God, and the Christian ideals of goodness, justice, love and service. It is idle to say "God Save the Queen" if God means little or nothing to us. It is idle to talk about the glory of the Empire if our personal lives do not add to the righteousness and brotherhood and justice and moral character upon which alone empires are built and maintained. To every man and woman in the realm this coronation is a personal call; a personal summons to a new and better way of life, a recall to religion as the motive and means of nobler living, a challenge to a life of dutiful service to others. The Queen's crowning must be her people's consecration. When the Queen seeks the help of God and of religion for her great task, shall not her people follow her example and make her task lighter by their consecrated moral and spiritual loyalty?

Through the years of what we pray may be a long, happy and peaceful reign, amid all the changes and challenges and trials that are sure to come; before God the Eternal Father we pray: "God Save the Queen."

Remembering the Queen's Christmas broadcast we might have expected a crowded church on Coronation Sunday. The congregations were, I suppose, good according to "modern" standards, but they could have been much better! The attendance on Whitsunday—that great Festival of the Church—also left much to be desired. If this should concern **YOU**: please don't read these words without **doing** something about it.

MATTERS MAINLY PAROCHIAL

The Challenge of South East Asia.—As you know, the Women's Guild Special Missionary Appeal this year is for the C.M.S. for the Diocese of Borneo. In his Ascensiontide Pastoral Letter, our Archbishop writes: “We have become aware, in the post-war years, as never before, of the vast mass of yet unevangelised people in the islands and territories to the north of Australia, and of the competition from the forces of Communism for the controlling influence in their way of life. We have seen how China has closed its doors to all missionary effort; how Japan has regained its independent sovereignty; how the Philippines have shaken off American control, and how Indonesia has thrown aside Dutch rule. We know that there is war, open or concealed, in Korea, in Indo-China, in Malaya, in Burma. The Western Powers have been and are being gradually excluded from the countries where they were once so dominant. We almost fear that the day is at hand when the cry of many will go up, as of old—“The harvest is past, the summer is ended, and yet we are not saved.” Will you pray that it may please God to awaken all members of the Church in Australia to a new and urgent sense of responsibility for these people who are among the other sheep whom He would gather in? Will you give yourself to some new effort to make it possible for the Churches to establish new bridge-heads for the Gospel in these countries and islands of South-East Asia, geographically such close neighbours of ours?”
