

IN THE PACIFIC: Pacific Conference of Churches

IN THE CARIBBEAN: Caribbean Conference of Churches

These are partners in the Coalition and other similar bodies will be invited to join. For several years churches and other groups of people have become aware of the profound effects tourism is having on their economy, their culture and life style. If the negative consequences are to be changed to opportunities for people's development urgent action is required.

Some of its aims are to provide opportunity for people affected by tourism to express their views, to focus on the effects of tourism on the Third World, to denounce unfair practices and to create and encourage models of

tourism which are just and enable people to exchange.

An office, resource centre and Library will be set up and networks of communication and solidarity between groups wishing to take action will be built up. It plans to publish a newsletter, to do research and plan education programs for both tourist affected areas and for tourists. It hopes to liaise with decision makers and publish case studies and resources.

JOTTINGS FROM THE S.A. UNIT

Our exciting news this month is the recent arrival in Adelaide of our 1983 Winifred Keik Scholar, Catherine Min, from Korea. Unfortunately, Catherine's passport hold-up caused her to miss the first term of her course at St. Barnabas Theological College. However, Catherine is spending the first term holidays with the family of our Vice-President, Margaret Chittleborough, during which time she is working extremely hard to perfect her command of English. Catherine attended the May Unit Meeting at which Rev. Norah Norris conducted an interesting bible study on "Images of Life."

At another recent Unit Meeting, our President, Dorothy Haensel, read a letter which I had received from Elizabeth Lovatt-Dolan (World President General of the World Union of Catholic Women's Organisations) extending sympathy to the S.A. and Victorian victims of the recent tragic bushfires and enclosing an Order of Service of an "Ecumenical Service of Prayer for the Victims of the Australian Fire Disaster."

The service was held in St. Mary's Catholic Church, Haddington Road, Dublin, soon after the fires and was led by clerical representatives of the Anglican, Methodist, Presbyterian and Catholic Churches of Dublin. During the Service, the Readers were Australia's Ambassador to Ireland, the President of the Ireland-Australia Association and members of the Australian Embassy staff in Dublin. The Homily was delivered by Mons. John Moloney. Elizabeth also mentioned that prayers for the victims had been included in many of the World Day of Prayer Services held throughout Ireland on March 4th - a hopeful indication that the work towards Christian Unity is alive in Dublin.

A letter from A.C.W.C. President, Boonmee Julkiree, about another matter, also included a message of sympathy to the S.A. fire victims.

Both these letters helped to deepen our awareness of the fellowship which obviously exists throughout the world among churchwomen and served as an encouragement to us in our work for Australian Church Women - S.A. Unit.

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Mrs. Myra Dixon, delegate from the Australian Church Women, reported that their Working Committee had received a letter from the Asian Church Women, re the Australian women's concern regarding tourism and prostitution in Australia. The Australian Church Women wished to draw attention to this situation, especially the involvement of Asian women, both in Australia and in East Asia, and they recommended that each woman in her organisation commit herself to initiate action against prostitution which degraded women. The Australian Church Women refused to promote a brochure "Discover Melbourne" at their Conference in August - they did not condone the 'Escort' advertisements.

Dame Phyllis Frost said it was time for a general onslaught against this dehumanising degradation of women, and she would draft a suitable resolution.

Mrs. Horne suggested that N.C.W.V's statement on prostitution be reviewed and the matter referred to the Social Welfare Committee.

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BURMA/PRAYER PARTNERSHIP

It is most encouraging to learn from reports from various State Units of the emphasis being placed on the Burma/Australia Prayer Partnership through Guest Speakers, Films, etc., - we are learning more of the customs and culture of the Burmese people. Individual members have made contact by correspondence with Christian women in Burma. Prayer Groups have met in Unit Meetings and in homes.

It is pleasing to learn also that the Women's Committee of the Burma Council of Churches have been praying and promoting the Burma/Australia Prayer Partnership and that a regular newsletter is being sent to Christian women throughout Burma with the Prayer Partnership being a theme in the newsletter.

A letter has been received from Bundaberg, Queensland, seeking guidance as what should be the proposed manner of implementing our prayer partnership with Burma.

A specific reply has been forwarded giving guidelines, however, a prayer partnership sample Order of Service has been prepared and will be forwarded with this month's copy of Women at Work. This can be used as a guideline using your own initiative in implementing and preparing service.

From the Queensland Unit now comes the report that part of their last meetings was handed over to the Guest Speaker, Brigadier Rose Flood, who had spent many years as a Missionary in Burma who related some experiences of her work in Children's Homes there.

We trust that this good work will continue.
