THE RECTOR'S LETTER

All Saints' Rectory,
30th July, 1945.

Dear People of All Saints,

A day when we particularly remember our Parish Church (and all for which it stands) is drawing very near. It is August the nineteenth, when we commemorate the Consecration of our Church, by making it a day of Thanksgiving and Dedication. Thanksgiving for the vision, faith and service of those who built it, whose lives have hallowed it and whose gifts have enriched it; Dedication of ourselves to the task of even further enriching our heritage, and handing it on to those who shall follow us, not less but greater; remembering that the Church exists in this and in every parish to teach, to heal, to save, and to remind man of the power and truth and mercy and goodness of God.

The Church is God's answer to man's loneliness and weakness. The New Testament knows nothing of an isolated Christian. Man needs fellowship with others. Isolated effort is soon discouraged, but corporate effort kindles enthusiasm. "One keen spirit," says S. Augustine, "sets another on fire." There is the whole history of the Church in that one sentence. The Christian needs not only communion with his Master, but community with other Christians. This need God has foreseen and met by giving us the Church, "which is the blessed company of all faithful people."

We ask for the utmost co-operation and support of all parishioners in all arrangements for the Consecration Festival on August 19. Please get in touch with former parishioners and invite them to the services; there are, no doubt, many who would welcome the opportunity of renewing their associations with All Saints', Petersham. No special card of invitation is being issued, but we suggest you send your friends a copy of this paper, specially drawing their attention to page five.

Will those who have collecting boxes (issued about four months ago) please return them on the Festival Sunday? We hope that each box-holder will bring his or her box and present it personally; but if it is quite impossible for you to attend the services, will you please help by sending the box by some friend? An envelope for your special offering will be found in this issue for the convenience of those who have no box.

The Annual Festival Tea and Social Reunion will be held on Wednesday, August 22. We feel we can, with your co-operation, uphold the high standard of the Parish Tea, even allowing for the handicap of rationing. Donations are requested from any who may be willing to give a table, or portion thereof, and donations in kind will be most welcome. Tickets (costing one shilling and sixpence, admitting you to both Tea and Social Reunion) are now available and may be obtained from your District Visitor, from members of the Women's Guild, and also may be had at the Rectory. The prompt purchase of tickets is helpful, for it is by the sale of tickets that the organisers approximate the number of people for whom it will be necessary to make provision.


As already advised, Confirmation Classes commence during the first week in August. It is most essential that candidates should attend the classes regularly, giving their preparation "number one" priority. Special arrangements can be made for adults who desire to be prepared for confirmation, if there should be any who are diffident about joining a young people's class. If you are eligible for confirmation, do not defer it until some future date; take the opportunity which is offered you now.

Confirmation will be administered by His Grace The Archbishop of Sydney at the eleven o'clock service on October 28, which will enable the candidates to make their First Communion on Sunday, November 4, being the Sunday nearest All Saints' Day and therefore our Patronal Festival.

We specially invite the relatives and friends of All Saints' men and women serving in the Forces to attend the Evening Service on the Festival Sunday (August 19) when Chaplain Godfrey Kircher will be the occasional preacher.

Gifts of white flowers (particularly arum lilies) for the Festival will be most welcome.

New Guinea Mission, 1891-1945.—August 10 marks the commemoration of the foundation of the New Guinea Mission—a record of fifty-four years of service to the brown and white people of the Pacific.

The young people's effort on August 11 will, appropriately, give us all an opportunity of doing something practical for the reconstruction of this mission, and special mention will be made of its fine record of service on Sunday, August 12.
