



From your Minister's Desk



My dear friends,

August is an important month in our calendar. In August we remember the day when some 77 years ago the Church of England in Petersham was Consecrated for the use of worshipping God. Each year we mark that occasion by a special occasion and service.

This year the celebration will take place on Sunday, 17th August. We will hold a Barbeque Luncheon following the morning service. It is hoped that all parishioners will try to attend to make the day a very special one indeed. Tickets for the Luncheon are available from members of the Parish Council and other Church Officers. Adults will be charged \$2 and children \$1 for the meal. It is obviously helpful to those arranging for the meal if folk obtain their tickets early so that proper quantities can be obtained for catering.

Another aspect of the celebration that adds particularly to making the day special is that the morning service will be a **CONFIRMATION SERVICE**. At this service several people (adults and teenagers) will be received into the communicant membership of our church. Confirmation is always seen as the occasion when an individual declares his or her faith in Jesus Christ as Saviour and Lord, and takes the step publicly of joining the responsible membership of the local worshipping family of Christ. So this is an exciting time for the church and most suitably makes our celebration of the Consecration Festival very special. Bishop John Reid, Assistant Bishop to the Archbishop of Sydney, and the bishop of our zone in our Diocese, will be the confirming bishop. The Service will commence at 9.30 a.m.

Those confirming their commitment to discipleship of Christ are: Mrs. M. Rühle, Mrs. Cathy Hitchcock, Mr. Bill and Mrs. Sue Ritchie, Elizabeth Granger and Samantha Freeman.

I ask you all to join with me in praying for them in their new responsibilities — and that the Lord may richly bless them and strengthen them in their living for Him.

We look forward to seeing all who value the work and witness of All Saints' joining us on our day of thankful celebration.

The care of the church is always a matter of concern to the church officers. In recent months there has been an increase in the number of children who have been playing in the grounds. This activity has been discussed many times in the Parish Council. We feel that we do not want to discourage local children seeing the church as a place where they can find acceptance and hospitality. So we do not like to ask them to go away. Their problem is made the more severe locally by the fact that inadequate facilities are available to them to play elsewhere. Indeed an officer of the Marrickville Council indicated to me over the phone that Council's policy is to so design parks that they are suitable for passive recreation. This means ball games are discouraged in these "open space" areas. Both kinds of open space are needed, of course — both for passive and also active use. Especially is this so in suburbs as heavily developed as ours. It is good to note that Council is making new active use area available in Brighton Street. However, this will not relieve the pressure on our grounds, I fear. This, and our unwillingness to drive children away from our church, necessitates that we take steps to protect the lovely windows of our building from unintentional damage. New protective screens are needed and are going to be costly. May I make bold to appeal for readers' help in meeting the cost of preserving the windows, which must be of considerable local significance.

THE TOOLS OF GOD

When we commit our lives to God utterly, we never know what is going to happen. We are born into a new world. We have to learn the laws of that world. The old laws won't work. Many make the mistake of thinking they can have the new life in God on the level of self-directed thinking and planning.

When we give God control of our lives we give Him the right to use us as He chooses. We become His tools, to be used for His purposes in the world. So long as we claim the right to self-determination we thwart God. When we die to self we literally cease to have any right to ourselves apart from God. Our new aim is to discover His purpose for us and with us.

If He chooses to ask us to face a difficult situation or work with awkward people, or bear a heavy burden, we face these things as part of our service to Him. If we complain or feel sorry for ourselves we proclaim that we have not completely lost ourselves. God asks His disciples to have unquestioning faith in His leading.

Can we hold on to His declared Will even when material things suggest we are wrong? That was the triumph of the Cross: Humanly speaking, it seemed absurd that Christ should allow Himself to be crucified. Yet it was in line with the Will of God, and He never wavered.

We can trust God utterly. He never fails. Out of seeming disasters God can bring His most wonderful victories. Trust and obey.



EVANGELICAL CALL TO SIMPLIFY LIFESTYLE FROM "CRUSADE MAGAZINE"

A strong challenge to Christians in affluent circumstances to simplify their lifestyle and take political action to bring about radical change in the present unjust trade and economic structures is contained in **An Evangelical Commitment to Simple Lifestyle**, which has come from the first International Consultation on Simple Lifestyle, held at Hoddesdon in March.

The 2,500 word statement, endorsed by 80 participants from 27 countries, represents the strongest call yet by evangelical Christians to take a stand against economic injustice and in support of a redistribution of wealth.

"Poverty and excessive wealth, militarism and the arms industry, and the unjust distribution of capital, land and resources are issues of power and powerlessness," the statement says. "Without a shift of power through structural change, these problems cannot be solved."

The statement prefaces its call for evangelical involvement in changing international structures with a commitment to responsible stewardship, freedom from "the seduction of riches", a new sense of community among believers, and a personal and corporate lifestyle.

"We intend to re-examine our income and expenditure, in order to manage on less and give away more. We lay down no rules and regulations, for either ourselves or others. Yet we resolve to renounce waste and oppose extravagance in personal living, clothing and housing, travel and church buildings. We also accept the distinction between necessities and luxuries, creative hobbies and empty status symbols, occasional celebrations and normal routine."

The statement goes on to call for a greater commitment to international development. It criticises the governments of affluent nations for failing to meet their targets for official development assistance to maintain emergency foodstocks or to liberalise their trading policy. It also urges that multinational corporations should become more subject to controls and more accountable.

But the statement asserts that "the present situation of social injustice is so abhorrent to God that a large measure of change is necessary. This change will not come however, through commitment to simple lifestyle or human development projects alone."

The statement outlines four areas where action is needed: prayer for peace and justice, education of Christians in the moral and political issues involved; participation in the struggle to create a just and responsible society; and the willingness to suffer.
