Synod of the Diocese of Sydney.—ELECTION OF REPRESENTATIVES to the Seventeenth Synod. The Rector having received the Archbishop's mandate for the election of Representatives to the Synod of the Diocese from this parish hereby convenes a meeting of the adult members of the Church of England attending the services at either of our Churches or resident in the parish to be held on Wednesday 7th July at 8 30 p.m. in the Vestry of All Saints' Church for the purpose of making such election.

The District Visitors of both our Churches undertake the distribution of some 1200 copies of this monthly paper, which represents about 1200 houses visited by them every month. If there are any who are inadvertently omitted and who will place their name and address in the box provided for the purpose in the porch of either Church the omission will be at once rectified. We appeal to every householder to give these ladies a welcome and assist them in their work which is to bring the Church into closer touch with the life of the people and to keep the Clergy informed of changes of residents, cases of sickness or trouble, or any circumstances calling for their attention. At the same time they represent the Church-Officers as collectors of funds and are asked to encourage regular contributions for this purpose. It is the duty of every adult member to contribute in proportion to his or her means, according as God has blessed, to the support of His Church, and by giving in a direct and systematic way is this duty most likely to be worthily accomplished. We should like to ask from all our people a more hearty co-operation with these ladies who do such a very valuable work on behalf of their fellow-parishioners, and who do not always meet with the encouragement which their efforts deserve.

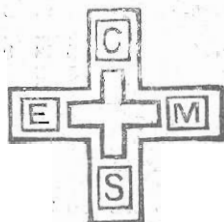

Confirmation.—On Sunday afternoons at 4.30 in the Parish Church the Clergy are giving lectures on "The Sacred Rite of Confirmation—its Meaning and Purpose", and those who desire to attend are asked to come and also to leave their names at the close of the first class they attend. The classes begin on Sunday 4th July.

Australian Board of Missions.—A public meeting will be held in the Manchester Unity Hall, Castlereagh Street, on Monday 5th July at 7.45. The Archbishop of Sydney will take the chair and the speakers will include the Bishop-elect of Willochra (Dr. Gilbert White), the Bishop-elect of Goulburn (Rev. Dr. Radford) and the Bishop-elect of Carpentaria (Rev. Henry Newton, B.A.). The Council of the Board of Missions cordially invites the attendance of Church people of this parish.



C. E. M. S.—At the last two monthly meetings the Rector has given lecturettes on the origin of the Gospels with special reference to the Gospel according to St. Mark. The members entered with interest into the subject which provided grounds for belief as to the genuineness and reliability of the Gospel Story.

THE ANNUAL MEETING will be held on Monday 12th July in the School Hall, Crystal Street, when the officers for the ensuing year will be elected and a programme of future operations will be considered. Every member is asked to make an endeavour to be present at this summoned meeting.

District Visitors' Meeting.—The next meeting of the All Saints' lady-visitors will be held on Wednesday afternoon 14th July at the Rectory, and, after the usual business, it is proposed to hold a short conference on the work of district visiting and how to make it most effective for the good of the parishioners and for the furtherance of the work of the Church. It is hoped that all may be able to attend.

All Saints' Church.—Mr. Kemp, who has held the office of Organist and Choir-master for some fifteen months, has resigned his position in order to enlist in the Military Forces and is now at the Camp at Liverpool with several other members of our Choir undergoing the necessary course of training. Mr. F. W. Drake has been appointed to succeed Mr. Kemp in the dual position of Choir-master and Organist and will commence his duties after the first Sunday in this month. Mr. Drake comes with excellent credentials, having been Organist in important Churches in Victoria and having filled the position of Organist and Assistant-Choir-Master at Bendigo Cathedral. For the past eighteen months Mr. Drake has been Organist at Christ Church, Kynmore. Mr. Drake proposes to give the Choir-boys useful instruction in vocal music in addition to the practices for the Church services, but this will only be possible if he can secure regular attendance of all the Choristers on Mondays and Wednesdays at 4.30 and on Thursdays at 7.30. He therefore asks the parents to co-operate with him in securing that regularity upon which success so largely depends. The boys are not required to reach the Church more than five minutes before the stated time. There is room for several boys from nine years old upwards as probationers, their names may be given in at the Sunday School or they may be brought to either of the week-afternoon practices when Mr. Drake will be ready to receive them.

All Saints' Church.—Special Services of Intercession with reference to the present warfare will again be held on the second Sunday in the month (July 11) when the surplus offertory will be devoted to the Belgian Fund. On every Wednesday evening there is a weekly service of similar intercession to which a larger attendance is invited. The service begins at a-quarter-to-eight and lasts about forty minutes.

Church Tent for the Soldiers at Liverpool.—The Home Mission Society has made an appeal to every parish to help in maintaining this great convenience and comfort for our young men who are in training in the Camp at Liverpool. At All Saints' the Wardens have promised to give the congregation attending the Intercession Services on Wednesday evenings an opportunity of contributing on leaving the Church, a plate being placed near the porch for the purpose.

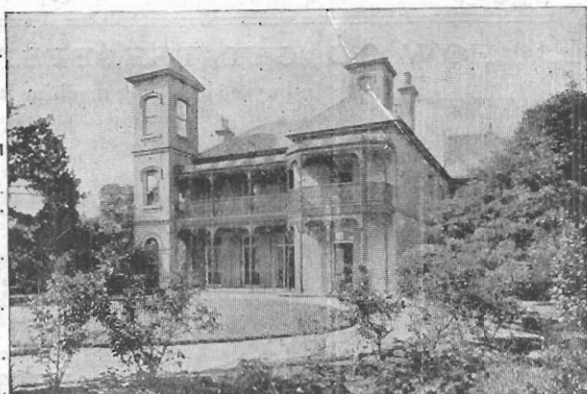
