



THE RECTOR'S LETTER.

All Saints' Rectory.

2nd January, 1945.

Dear People of All Saints, —

Before you read this letter I would suggest you read the message contained in B. C. Plowright's "The Law of Perspective," which comes to us through the British Broadcasting Corporation's fourth series of "Lift up Your Hearts," a selection of short talks given daily by the B.B.C. I make this suggestion because I feel it will be helpful to us all to see things in proper focus as we face together the unknown way of a New Year—a year which promises to be a "tough" one. We all know that times are difficult, and it's a good thing occasionally to have a rest from the burden and anxiety of it all. But the Christian always acknowledges the burden in the presence of God. Of course, if you are not a Christian, other ways are available. You can then do one of two things. Knowing the terrible sufferings which some people are undergoing, and knowing the horror of the times in which we live, you can either pretend they're not there, deliberately put them out of your mind, and get on with the job of enjoying yourself. That is why so many people have to find a fiercer and more hectic gaiety in wartime than in the normal days of peace. Or, on the other hand, you can admit that the times are terrible, and go about in a kind of fatalistic gloom and bitter resignation. But the Christian can do neither of these things. He knows the threats and dangers surrounding him as well as—probably better than—other men; but he can face the unknown with something that is **known**. He has the assurance that God is with him, and that He provides power for the fight against evil. The good news of the Gospel is that there is a Power, above and beyond and greater than ourselves which can come into the lives of those who seek Him, and give them the victory over all things that threaten to defeat our good resolutions. If this year is to be in any real sense a "new" year, there must be some change in ourselves, in each one of us, personally. There will be nothing that is new in 1945 if we ourselves prefer to remain much the same as we were, playing the same old selfish game, moving along in the same old groove, the same in our habits and in our little-minded prejudices. We have to get the auditors in and let them go through our books: each one of us must be his or her own auditor. Some people never take the trouble to sit down quietly and audit their book of life. It is always a wise policy to do this at least once a year if we wish to make a success of the business of living. Try to find out what you have lost or gained during the past twelve months. Have you been wasting time on things that are not really worth while? How do you stand in regard to the debt you owe to God and His children? Have you retained those early ideals which once were the foundations of your life? Are you as regular as you might be in attendance at Holy Communion and at the other services of the Church? Have you taken your stand with those who refuse to surrender their ideals—this is the challenge of the balance sheet of the book of life. Think of some of the things we would like to see made new. New houses, new schools, new cities, new industrial conditions, a new spirit among nations—and, above all, a new **ME!** If we adopt any lesser aim, it means that we make life aimless and turn ourselves into spiritual paupers, when all the limitless resources of God are ours for the asking.



It has often been said that women cannot keep a secret; but I have pleasure in refuting this as a gross and unjust libel on the women-folk of All Saints! The very delightful evening organised and arranged by the Women's Guild, assisted by the District Visitors and others, was all kept so "hush hush" that I was completely staggered when the object of it was revealed in all its amazing generosity and goodwill. I have always thought

the statement, "You could have knocked me down with a feather," a remarkably silly one; but I came near to realising the amount of truth it contains when Mr. E. C. King presented me with a cheque for £47 to mark the commencement of my fourteenth year of incumbency and in appreciation of my past thirteen years' ministry. I do thank most sincerely all those who had a hand in this kindly gesture of my people's regard: I value the presentation not merely as it is represented by certain figures written on a piece of paper, though, being a practical person, I will find that aspect of it very materially helpful; but I treasure it far more for the sincere, kindly appreciation underlying the gift, which both encouraged and humbled me. My sister, whose ever-ready and capable assistance has been such a big factor in the life and successful work of the parish, desires also to thank you for "saying it with flowers," and we both appreciate your good wishes much more than we are able to say—not forgetting our thanks for the added "Christmas touch" conveyed in a delicious cake, which bore the inscription, "1931-1944 Appreciation."

We join in wishing you all, in the best possible sense, "A Happy New Year"; may it bring us all nearer to a rightful, just and abiding Peace!

THE LAW OF PERSPECTIVE.

On most Sunday evenings the managers of our two local cinemas give our Rector and myself the privilege of speaking to the audience for five minutes in between the two main pictures. For a few moments before the first picture ends, I stand at the side of the screen and see the picture endways on. To see the picture from that angle is an illuminating experience, chock-full of optical illusions. The most modest prairie flower has the jaw of a he-man; you can't say which is villain and which is hero; what the audience sees as a last tender embrace looks from the side like a bear hug, and, most curious of all, when anyone speaks, his front teeth seem to be dropping right out. Now, I'm looking at the same picture as the audience, but because I'm looking at it from the wrong angle and seeing it out of focus, it's just a confused jumble and medley. Life is like that; you can see it steadily and see it whole, and still get it all wrong, because you see it out of focus. It's all blurred, without rhyme or reason. When I was a boy, I used to watch a well-known Victorian landscape painter at work in the neighbouring fields and lanes. He would paint steadily for a time, his eyes only travelling backwards and forwards between the picture and the scene he was painting. Then he would get up for a moment or two and stand well back from the picture. Why? Because he wanted to be sure that he had got the proportions, the perspective right. Just so, we are often too near the events of our own times, especially its sorrows and tragedies, to be able to see them in their right dimensions. We need something that will see them in their true perspective. That is what faith does when we read it into our situation. It gives us the true focus, the real setting.

For one thing, it sets the contemporary event that looms so large in our eyes in the context of God's eternal purpose. You can read that purpose either in the Bible or in the scientific story of evolution, or, better still, in both together, and there is only one conclusion to be drawn. This isn't the first time that evil has run riot in the world; it isn't even the first time that it has seemed to have things all its own way. It happened when those cruel, thin-lipped Assyrians raped Jerusalem and carried the children of Israel away captive. But the Jews and their faith endured, whilst their oppressors perished. The most dramatic conjunction of names in the Bible is that in which St. Luke announces "In Bethlehem, in the days of Herod the

Great . . . of Caesar Augustus . . . Jesus was born." Caesar Augustus, the head of the greatest totalitarian state ever known, Herod the Great, a byword for fiendish cruelty . . . and Jesus, the most truly human of all men. The obvious thing is that Jesus has proved the tougher, the more enduring. The power of Augustus died with him, and to-day we remember Herod only to execrate him, but Jesus—well, as Napoleon said of Him more than a hundred years ago, "Though He has been dead these eighteen hundred years, millions would die for Him." And faith discerns that tough, that lasting power of goodness, and knows that it both outlives and outlasts it. "The light shined in the darkness," wrote St. John of those days, "and the darkness did not master it." Nor ever will.

Moreover, faith helps us to set our sorrows and defeats in the framework of our mercies and our joys. Pessimists have curious minds. They seem to think they can only get a true picture of life by dwelling upon its ugliness and squalor, which is just about as sensible as a business man would be who thought he could get a true account of his financial position only by totting up his bad debts. Faith counts the bad debts all right, but it sets side by side with them the assets of life. A few weeks ago, in the bleak hours of dawn, I stood in the wreckage of my room. Glass, splintered wood, dust and confusion were everywhere, and the ceiling yawned with huge crevasses. And there on the table, their golden trumpets shining fresh and bravely amid the ruins, stood a bowl of daffodils. And I knew then that in all growing things, in all life, in history and in man himself, there is an abiding beauty that no evil can destroy.

MATTERS MAINLY PAROCHIAL
