Money for such a Special Project, comes from half of the general offering taken at the World Community Day Services in October each year; the other half goes towards our commitment to Asian Church Women's Conference.

MYANMAR BIBLE TEACHING CONFERENCE:

Our team of 4 women and one 17-year old daughter arrived safely in Yangon (previously Rangoon) at 8 pm on December 31 2007 – very happy to be there after some anxiety because of the uprising in August/September and having had to change our schedule and flights. But our wonderful God took care of everything for us, before, during and after the conference.

The 4-day Bible teaching went extremely well. Each day began at 8.30 am, concluding about 4 pm, with an hour break for lunch. Each day we gave 6 different Bible teaching sessions, with prayer with many women at the end which took us up to 5 pm. They are so eager for teaching and took copious notes. 130 women, from all over Myanmar, were in residence (sleeping on the floor on mats) and 20 more from Yangon itself who came daily. We taught them songs, which we had translated into Myanmar, but then discovered they really wanted to sing in English! We had lots of fun and happy times.

Our translators were excellent and our hosts at the church were once again delightful, godly and super-efficient servants of God. The Mothers' Union worker also very capable, full of fun, who sang and played guitar. After the Conference she invited us to her home for a special breakfast on the Karen national day – she and her husband (and many others) are Karen.

On the Sunday we had dinner at the home of Simon and Deborah – he is Principal of the Anglican Theological College and was a student of my husband Bill's at Trinity College Singapore. Each of the team was asked to speak to the clergy wives gathered there. The next day we visited the Theological College and were asked to give our testimonies to encourage the students preparing for ministry. I was also able to spend profitable time with some now teaching at various Bible Colleges in Myanmar who were students at Trinity College Singapore when we were there.

One afternoon there was a visit to an orphanage way out in a village, also a visit to a village in the Irrawaddy Delta region, which helped us understand the poverty and how the women to whom we had ministered work and live and how hard their lives are compared to ours. They have so few resources in their own language to help them study the Bible and I am trying to do something to remedy this not only for the women but all people in that country.

Once again I would like to thank you for your support and particularly for your **prayers** – we knew that everything was working out so well because of your prayers.

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SOCIAL ISSUES:

As Australian Church Women inspired by the Gospel imperative we are challenged to be alert to the many ways and situations where women in our society today are suffering. These situations challenge us to be aware of the causes of their suffering and the means which can be taken to free them from such suffering.

Women in our society today can be found in situations where they are being deprived of their human dignity, struggling to balance life's demands as mothers and bread winners, raising children as a single parent, experiencing abuse and domestic violence, caring for an adult or younger child with severe disabilities while they themselves are experiencing the limitations of their own ageing.

Valuable information about these situations and the means being taken by various Government organisations is available in the Newsletter of the Office for Women and also in the Stakeholder Papers of the Australian Domestic and Family Violence Clearing House.

Women are juggling work and family and these pressures can impact on their health, emotional well-being, financial security and work or career opportunities. Family friendly workplaces can provide flexibility in a variety of ways e.g. paid maternity leave. Australia is one of only two OECD countries that does not offer paid maternity leave. What action can we take to support working women in this need? Are we aware of other flexible work options which would relieve working women of harmful stress? What are viable options for child care?

Violence against women and children and also people with disabilities is sadly still prevalent in our society and a cause of harm in so many aspects of their lives. Homelessness is one consequence as the victims are forced to flee their homes to find safety whilst the perpetrator is really the one who should leave. Many organisations are studying how to prevent this violence and how to respond to it. Refuges are often run by Church organisations to provide a safe place for these women and children.

How do we respond to women in these situations? Are we sufficiently well informed about what we could speak out about to the relevant authorities because of our concern for social issues? What relief are we supporting or initiating as Australian Church Women concerned for the well-being of our sisters in society today who are suffering in many different ways?

PAN PACIFIC & S E ASIA WOMEN'S ASSOCIATION:

At the first meeting for 2008 in February, *Margaret Groenwegen*, a PPSEAWA member, was the speaker.

Margaret spoke of being involved with children at risk and violence against women from an early age. When 19 her first appointment as a teacher was at a migrant hostel, where she was introduced to a group of 57 children and told "they are all yours." Rather daunting but she found that a class could consist of 30, 40 or 57 children on any one day as families moved frequently and dealing with the mothers, many of whom were insecure and did not wish to lose sight of their children for even a short time, was not an easy task. However with time and understanding she was able to obtain help from NAPCAN and DOCS.

As time went on, Margaret married and raised her own family but remained dedicated to education. In 2004 the Australian-Korean Welfare Association initiated a "Happy Hours" project/program for children from 3 to 4 years, which aimed to prepare children from culturally and linguistically diverse families for an easier transition into formal school life. The class is held every Tuesday from 9.30 am to 12 noon; this year around 20 children are participating and they have a waiting list. It is not a playgroup but a happy and interesting environment in which children experience extensive vocabulary, popular English cultural nursery rhymes, songs, fairy stories and common general knowledge about Australian flora and fauna and so on, presented through a variety of activities. Children are encouraged to express themselves orally. Margaret feels that the best outcome so far has been when the children begin to spontaneously converse with each other and with her in English.

The March meeting was the Annual General Meeting and the speaker was *Robyn Gaspari* on "Conflict Resolution."

WOMAN'S CHRISTIAN TEMPERANCE UNION:

WCTU began in NSW in 1882, so for 126 years has been following its motto "For God, Home And Humanity" in the cause of temperance and for the well-being of women and families. In the early years it was very active in the suffrage movement to obtain the right to vote for women. It was responsible for establishing the first baby health centres and had hostels for country girls coming to the city to work, and its history records many other worthwhile achievements.

However, times change, and while WCTU is still active nationally and in the other States, and in many countries around the world, here in NSW we have come to the point, because of much reduced numbers and the aging of members and officers, of winding up as an organisation and establishing a Foundation, so that our resources, which are considerable because of the efforts of so many women in past years, may continue to be used on into the future.

President Carmel and a number of ACW members attended a Luncheon at Parliament House, Sydney on April 7 which marked the closure of WCTU in NSW and launched the Foundation, and we have been encouraged by the interest and good wishes of many people – some giving their support by becoming members of the Foundation (for a one-off payment of \$10).

So, this is our last Report as an affiliated organisation of Australian Church Women NSW Unit. One happy outcome is that *Jean Drysdale*, who was our representative to ACW Council, has been appointed by the Churches of Christ as one of their delegates, so she can continue in the fellowship and friendship which we all so much appreciate.

HOPE FOR THE FUTURE --- In IRAQ:

Iraq has rarely been out of the headlines in recent years - a country torn by war and unrest, and with its future uncertain and insecure. However Iraqis are not alone - in the midst of the conflict, Bible Society has been distributing bulk deliveries of Arabic New Testaments, to offer them hope and security not only for today but for eternity. New Testaments are being given free of charge to high schools, colleges and university students right through Iraq. Bible Society has paid for 68,000 of these Scriptures at an overall cost of \$100,000. Bible Society is also handing out food and Bibles to families in Baghdad's poor and deprived areas, and hundreds came to receive these packages. *(From Bible Society's Bibles@work)*

Also from Iraq – Anglican Mothers' Union world-wide is rejoicing to hear

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of the establishment of a branch in Baghdad, the first ever in that country, with several hundred women attending the first meeting.

CARING FOR BODY AND SOUL In TANZANIA:

Helen Hoskins has been a Church Missionary Society missionary for more than 20 years, her main current task being responsible for all the Girls' Brigade Companies in Tanzania. She writes as follows:

"One baby in 700 is born with a cleft palate. In Australia they are operated on, but in Tanzania many children and young adults live with this disfigurement and the problems it brings. I enjoy all my ministries with children – religious education, Sunday school, Girls' Brigade – but when I find children suffering with cleft palates, I look for ways to help them.

In 2001 I met 9-year old *Mugosi* and was able to take her for surgery to a government hospital at Mwanza. The day we took her home there was great rejoicing, but also sadness, as her mother had given birth to another daughter with a cleft palate. I made plans to take this little one, *Bhoke*, to Mwanza, but her father refused to let her go - he felt it was a judgment on them for fixing *Mugosi*, that they shouldn't interfere, and if they did the cows might stop calving. As the years went by, I often thought of *Bhoke* and my heart wept for her.

In 2007 I was in that village again and met *Adventina*, a girl with a serious double cleft palate. As I made plans for her to have surgery, the pastor told me he had three other cleft palate children in his parish – *Verediana*, aged 2, *Elisha* 7, and *Bhoke*, now 6. On the Sunday before the surgery I met 19-year-old *Margaret*, and added her to my list. On Thursday evening the cleft palate children arrived in my town, Bunda, ready for an early start on Friday. And what a joy to see *Bhoke* with them!

Next morning we could see Jesus going before us to Mwanza and it was one of the smoothest hospital visits I have had. Our little family was quite a witness in the hospital, always encouraging one another, praising Jesus and praying together.

The following week they were discharged and as we drove home I have never had so much happiness in my car. Back in their villages they were received with great joy, and the pastor said that it was also an amazing witness, as people saw the Church caring for both physical and spiritual needs.

A few weeks later *Bhoke* was baptised, taking the name *Esta*. Her baptism was so special to me - to know that she has been transformed inside and out, spiritually and physically, is very exciting. *(From CMS Today)*
