RECTOR'S LETTER

My dear Friends,

Next month we shall celebrate the 51st Anniversary of the Consecration of this beautiful and historic church. I feel that we should make early preparation for this great event. Will you make a point of remembering it in your prayers, and also remind people of it so that they will join us in worship on that occasion. There will be special services throughout the day on August 15th. 8 a.m. Choral Communion, 9.30 a.m. Children's Festival Service, 11 a.m. Matins and Sermon, at this service members of the schools in the district are being invited to attend and the lessons will be read by pupils from Petersham Junior High School and Stanmore Home Science. As this week will be Education Week, this service will also commemorate that event. At 7.15 p.m. Festal Evensong and Sermon with special music by our choir. I hope that at the 8 a.m. celebration all those who have been confirmed in All Saint's will come and make it a confirmedes reunion, and in a very real sense we trust that it will be a week of "Back to All Saints." On Wednesday, August 18th the Parish Tea will be held in the Hall at 6.15 p.m., this will be followed by an Organ Recital by Mr. W. Roland Eagar. At 7.30 p.m. Evensong will be sung in the Church and a Religious Sound Film shown. A short Concert will be held in the Parish Hall at 8.30 p.m. I commend these events to you and hope that you will encourage others to come and make it widely known to parishioners and your friends.

This month we are to have on Sunday 18th a religious sound film in place of the usual sermon, the film will be introduced, and then screened in place of the sermon. These films are very well produced and bring the Gospel message in a very vivid way before our eyes. I do trust that you will invite people to come so that the best opportunity can be given to this modern form of evangelisation.

On Wednesdays at 7.45 p.m. a Prayer Meeting and Bible Study is held in the chapel. I do hope that many will come to this mid-week meeting, we are studying Paul's Second Epistle to Timothy. In these days we need to return to our Bible and study the Word of God afresh. Spiritual and moral life is at a very low ebb, and only a return to worship and the word of God can restore the integrity of the nation. We have tried in many ways to make man a moral being, the tendency of the last decade has been to place our faith in education, science, sport and the machine to reach the Utopia of man's dreams, while all these things are legitimate, and indeed important, they of themselves cannot satisfy the hunger of man's soul. We have tasted well of the tree of knowledge, it has indeed given us much fruit that has been good and beneficial, but we have also discovered that evil has also been with the good fruit, mainly because we have not had the spiritual discernment or knowledge to use the fruit that has come to us. Man has developed the material resources available to him but has not developed spiritually or morally nearly as quickly and thus we find that he is not able to control his discoveries. The discovery of atomic power is a case in point. Only the love of God in man, can use and develop such a wonderful discovery, without that love man will surely destroy himself and all life. That love is found in Christ, who came that we might have life, and as John says in his Gospel, "In him was life; and the life was the light of men." Christianity begins with the unique fact of Christ's re-making of man, with His reconciliation of man to God, secular thinking takes its rise from an abstraction, the Christian faith springs out of a concrete, historical reality; the saving power of Christ to lift men out of the old way into the new. To that task as His servants we are committed at All Saints, may our life and service be such that men may meet Christ. Let us all remember that there will be a Final Judgment, the final act in the process of history. On this the Bible speaks with the sound of a trumpet. Man has sinned, and departed from God. God has Himself in Christ reconciled mankind to Himself. This is the Church's great opportunity to proclaim that message and it can only be proclaimed by those who know the fellowship of repentance, for out of

that fellowship will spring the power of God unto salvation, yes Salvation of the human race.

Will you share in this fellowship; will you work for the Kingdom of God; come and join us in the Crusade.
