



THE RECTOR'S LETTER.

Dear People of All Saints',—

All Saints' Rectory,
26th February, 1937.

Although we had scarcely "got into our stride," parochially speaking, after the holidays, the Harvest Festival passed off successfully, and we are grateful to EVERYONE who helped to make it so. A fine Harvest Offering, including the gifts of the girls and boys of the Sunday School, was kindly taken to the Home of Peace, by our Churchwarden, Mr. W. P. Bannan, and the Matron has duly acknowledged it, with many thanks to you all.

By the time this letter reaches you we shall be more than half way through the Season of Lent, and our thoughts will once again be turning to Holy Week and the commemoration of the Great Sacrifice.

You will have already heard about the Mission to be conducted by Captain J. S. Cowland, of the Church Army. It is to be called a "Holy Week Crusade," and by it we shall endeavour to present the Christian Religion to the people of this parish and district, as the solution of the problems of modern social life as they see it and experience it. A crusade endeavours

to give this message to all, but particularly to those whom the Church does not ordinarily reach. We ask your enthusiastic co-operation in doing your part towards making the crusade a blessing to many in this parish.

First, you can pray daily for the Mission and the Missioner, then you can begin to be an active worker by letting everyone know about it, and give them an invitation to come to the services. A piece of practical work for the crusade has already been done by George Hammond, one of our choir-boys, who has donated a very good sign (all his own work) for the Church Notice Board.

A special programme of the services for each day of the Mission has been issued and your District Visitor will hand you a copy when she brings your "Chronicle." Copies may also be obtained at the Church.

I ask that you will do your utmost to keep Holy Week (which commences on Palm Sunday, March 21) free from social engagements, so that you may be free to meet together for prayer and meditation upon the events of that week. The Cross is the centre of our religion; it shows what love can do and be; it wins where no force, no display of power, could ever do.

There will, of course, be no meetings of the clubs during Holy Week. Members of the various societies are asked to attend the services, especially upon the evening of their regular club night. I am sure the young people of the parish will understand that the proper keeping of Holy Week concerns them just as much as the more senior parishioners.

I plead once again for a right observance of Good Friday. It should not be necessary (but we find that it is) to remind people year by year that the **ONLY REASON** why Good Friday is a holiday is because our Lord was crucified for us on that day. Good Friday brings us face to face with that great fact of history—the Cross of Jesus Christ—which reveals to us as nothing else could ever reveal it, the depth and intensity of the love of God. "God so loved the world that He GAVE . . ." He gave Himself. He came amongst us to share our life with us, to bear with us the woe and weariness that make our hearts ache, so that with His comradeship we might be comforted and with His stripes we may be healed. Moreover, that is not merely a fact of history, it is a fact of experience. The Cross reveals not what God was, but what God eternally is. He still shares. He still suffers. He still stands with us in every sorrow that can come to us because He still cares.

Your Church makes ample provision for you to spend Good Friday quietly and thoughtfully in a corporate act of penitence and thankfulness. Will you make use of the opportunities provided, and thus prepare yourselves to enter into communion with your risen Lord on Easter morning?

There will be three celebrations on Easter Day, seven o'clock, a quarter past eight, and at the eleven o'clock service. Full details of the services arranged for Holy Week and Easter Day may be seen on page six of this issue.

Will you please return your Lenten Boxes or Envelopes on Easter Day, together with your Easter offerings? If you contemplate being absent from the Parish for Easter, you can assist us by sending your box by some friend.

Gifts of white flowers for the Easter Festival will be most welcome on Saturday morning, March 27th.

With every good wish for a holy, happy Eastertide.

Good Friday.—His Grace the Archbishop writes as follows concerning the proposals for a Procession of Witness on Good Friday:—

I have come to the conclusion that it will be a very great help for the better observance of Good Friday if we can have a diocesan Procession of Witness on that day. I, therefore, propose that on Good Friday afternoon next all parishes in the metropolitan area should be asked to send as large a representation as possible, to assemble in the Domain at 4 o'clock, with the Clergy and Choirs in their robes, and with the banners of any organisations. We will then march in order, at 4.30, to the Cathedral, where a brief service will be held. Amplifiers will be installed in the Chapter House and grounds. It is anticipated that the service will conclude between 5.15 and 5.30. This will not interfere with those Churches which have Three Hour services or the evening services which they usually plan. I trust, therefore, that in view of this early notice you may be able to co-operate in this procession of witness.
