## THE RECTOR'S LETTER

All Saints' Rectory,

22nd February, 1947.

Dear People of All Saints',

For many years we have had generous Thankofferings for the Harvest Festival, and this year was no exception. Once again we had a very fine response, the gifts including a great number which the girls and boys of all departments of our Sunday School offered at the Children's Festival Service. We are indeed most grateful to **ALL** our parishioners and friends for their kindly and willing co-operation in making our Festival a day of real Thanksgiving. Especially do we thank Miss Adams and her helpers (Mrs. Yarrington, Mrs. Morris and the Misses Watkins and Lucas) for the very effective Harvest decorations, notwithstanding the absence of wheat this year. Also we appreciate the good work of the Choir throughout the day, and the very practical service of Mr. A. J. Harris, Norman Harris and Mr. Sayers in transporting our gifts to the Home of Peace, where they are so gratefully received, as you will see from the Matron's letter on page three. Such a festival is a reminder that, in spite of the losses caused by drought (which has since happily been broken in many areas), we in Australia have so much for which to give thanks; and it should be an incentive to do all we can for our friends in Britain who still need all the food we can send them.

Lenten boxes and envelopes were given out in readiness for the commencement of Lent on 19th February. As you are aware, all our Lenten offerings received in this way are devoted to the work of the Australian Board of Missions and the Church Missionary Society. Both Societies seek increased support to enable them to meet the tremendous challenges facing the Missionary Church (which means you and me) in this post-war period. If you have not yet received your Lenten box or envelope, please ask for one when you come to church; if you cannot attend, ask your District Visitor to procure one for you.

I trust you will readily respond to the invitation and take advantage of the many opportunities your church provides for the proper observance of the solemn Season of Lent and Holy Week.

The next issue of the "Chronicle" will be on 6th April, which is Easter Day. It is necessary, therefore, to advise you now, regarding Holy Week and Easter Services, details of which will be found on the inset of this issue.

So far as you possibly can, will you keep Holy Week (commencing on Palm Sunday, 30th March) free from all social engagements, so that you may be able to spend at least a portion of each day in meditation and worship. There will, of course, be no meetings of clubs and societies during Holy Week; their members are invited to attend the services, particularly on the day of their regular meeting. Our young people will, I hope, understand that the observance of this sacred season concerns **them**, as well as the more senior parishioners.


Once again, we urge that you will range yourself on the side of those who, by word and deed, are preserving the most sacred day in the whole year—Good Friday—as a Holy Day and not a mere holiday. Your Church makes ample provision for all her people to spend this most sacred day quietly and thoughtfully. Because men use the Day on which our Lord was crucified on Calvary's Hill for us and for all men, as a day devoted to pleasure and material gain, with a total disregard of the meaning of Good Friday, we must continue to protest against anything which mars the solemnity of the day when we remember the Cross of Christ, where the love of God and the sin of man meet, and where the sin of man is vanquished by the love of God.

A right and proper observance of the days preceding Easter is the best preparation for our Easter Communion. There will be three Celebrations of Holy Communion on Easter day—at seven o'clock, a quarter past eight, and at the eleven o'clock service.

Gifts of white flowers for the Easter Festival will be most acceptable, and should be left at the Church or Rectory not later than Saturday morning, 5th April.

**Harvest Festival Gifts.**—The following letter of thanks and appreciation has been received from Matron Claydon of the Home of Peace:—

"It was a pleasure to receive once again the gifts from the Church of All Saints', Petersham, as a result of the Harvest Festival Service held last Sunday. Will you please thank your parishioners very much for their generous gifts and tell them how much everything is appreciated. The groceries are a big help and great saving for us in the monthly budget, and your very generous contributions in this regard were especially welcomed. It might interest you to know that as a result of the gifts from last year's Harvest Festivals we had enough flour and cornflour to last us for four months and enough jellies for 12 months. The fresh fruit, vegetables and eggs are a great asset to us and, besides giving out quantities of fruit, I was able to preserve some and make up the remainder into jams or chutneys, so you can see that nothing was wasted. I do trust that your parishioners had as much joy in giving their gifts as we had in receiving them. I enclose herewith our official receipt for the money donated (£2/1/-) during the Harvest Festival Service."

**A.B.M. Centenary Campaign.**—The Right Reverend F. L. Ash (formerly Bishop of Rockhampton) was commissioned by the Archbishop of Brisbane (in the absence of the Acting-Primate) on Wednesday, 12th February, in St. Andrew's Cathedral. The Bishop is sent forth as the Commissioner and Organiser of the Centenary Campaign of the Australian Board of Missions, which aims to find 50 new trained missionaries and £100,000 new money by the centenary year, 1950. Pray for the Commissioner and his work (which is also our work) and for all who are sharing in this great task.

**Good Friday Procession of Witness.**—As in former years, we are requested to assemble at the rear of Sydney Hospital at four o'clock on 4th April, so as to be in readiness to move off in procession at 4.20 p.m. Parishes will be grouped according to their Rural Deaneries. This parish is in the Rural Deanery of Petersham. We hope we shall again be well represented.

**District Visitors.**—We record, with pleasure, that after many months' absence from her district, Mrs. Handel was able to do a portion of it last month. We regret that Mrs. McLean, who has not been really well for some little time, but carried on her work nevertheless, has had to give up and is about to enter hospital for observation. We shall continue to pray for her restoration to health and strength. Meanwhile, Mrs. Booth, of Shaw Street, has come to our aid, and taken over Mrs. McLean's District temporarily. Miss Bayley has been assisting Mrs. Brennan in Croydon Street. We welcome these new visitors to our Association, and feel sure the parishioners in their respective districts will assist them in their work, which is strange and new, and therefore difficult, until one becomes accustomed to it.

**Personal.**—We offer our sincerest sympathy to Mr. J. Paterson of Wallsend, Mr. R. N. Whetton and his son, Mr. and Mrs. Delaney of Maria Street, and their relations, in the passing of Joyce Irene Whetton, who died suddenly in Newcastle Hospital on 8th February, leaving a baby daughter. Joyce was better known to us as Joyce Whetton. She was confirmed here in 1937 and married here in 1946, and was beloved by all who were privileged to know her. Also we extend our sympathy to Mrs. Cooper of Livingstone Road in the loss of her sister; Mrs. Otter of Newington Road, who was bereaved of her eldest son, her brother and her nephew in the short space of three days; and Mrs. Gottke of Stanmore Road, who recently lost her brother. May all who are bereaved have the comforting and consoling power of the Holy Spirit in their sorrow.

**The Choir.**—The choir is now preparing Stainer's Cantata, "The Crucifixion," for presentation on **Wednesday, 2nd April, at 8 p.m.** This deeply religious work has now become an integral part of our Holy Week worship, and has a very definite message for us all on the sufferings of Our Lord during the time of His Passion. The choir is beginning to feel and express in song the deep spiritual beauty of this music; and it is hoped that you will make the date—2nd April—as widely known as possible. The choir is to be assisted by some members of the Masonic Choir, and two very fine soloists have been engaged for the occasion. The tenor part is to be sung by George Tiley, and Mr. Ray Frith is the bass soloist. I would recommend for your consideration the question of new boys for the choir. I am slightly perturbed at having had no new recruits of late. There is nothing so beautiful as boys' voices for the true and beautiful expression of our church services. The training the boys receive in the course of their studies is an invaluable asset to them later in life; the majority of the leading English singers to-day have been originally trained in the English church choirs; and it should be remembered that they form the basis for future adult members. We still have vacancies for basses and tenors; even if you have had no previous musical training, arrangements can be made to make up this deficiency, by having a special voice-training choir for men only.—**ROWLAND EAGAR**, Organist and Choirmaster.
