Dear Friends,

On Sunday, 22nd August, we celebrated the Seventy-Ninth Anniversary of the Consecration of All Saints' Church, Petersham. About forty parishioners remained for a barbecue lunch following the service.

The address at the service was based on the Dedication of the Temple built by Solomon in Jerusalem. This was the first temple. Following Solomon's Great Prayer at the dedication of the Temple, God replied speaking of the building both as a place of prayer and a witness to all people.

It is obvious that every Christian congregation should view their worship building in the way God spoke of Solomon's Temple in Jerusalem. The church buildings are places of worship and centres from which a constant witness is maintained to Jesus as Lord and Saviour. To view the church buildings as anything else would not only be nonsense but also contrary to the expectations of God; Father, Son and Holy Spirit. A church building without this purpose is as God said to Solomon, "a ruin; every passer-by will be appalled and gasp at the sight of it; and they will ask, 'Why has the Lord so treated this land and this house?'" (1 Kings 9:8).

It must be our constant concern to see these two aims are always before us. The life of our congregation depends upon it.

Firstly, we must be constantly open to hear God speaking

to us. We must be ready to accept His guidance and His correction. We need humility to ask forgiveness and strength to resist evil in whatever form it comes against us. How important it is that we who claim to be God's chosen people live according to His laws and never become self satisfied with our own endeavours.

Secondly, our ever-present responsibility to witness to the saving power of the Lord Jesus Christ.

We here at All Saints' Church have a constant flow of new faces and visitors Sunday by Sunday. In the past nine months there would hardly be a Sunday without seeing one, two or even half a dozen different faces and new faces. We are blessed with tremendous opportunities for witness, but also with problems of how to deal with such a constant flow. We need your prayers, just as much as we need to pray for our own efforts.

Pray the Lord will make this house — His house where people may find Him and His power in their lives.

May the Lord bless you.

CARE FORCE is currently seeking to move beyond the boundaries of the traditional welfare agency in order to respond to the changing needs of local residents. The effective operation of Care Force depends on a two-way movement of assistance. Whilst Care Force is structured to provide welfare services and general counselling, its efficacy is enhanced by reciprocal community involvement and support.

Briefly the services provided include:

1. Family Support Scheme — involves local residents who can offer time, some skills and support to other local people who are having problems coping in their life situations. (Co-ordinated by Mary and Cathy.
2. Family, youth and drug counselling. A permanent youth worker, Tony, co-ordinates this service.
3. Financial Counselling and Credit Help is provided by David (no loans of money).
4. Tenancy Advice.
5. Material Aid and General Counselling. This service aims to help provide living necessities, such as food, to people in economic and personal difficulty. Parish assistance with foodstuffs, e.g., milk powder, canned meat, fish, fruit and vegetables, baked beans, baby foot, rice, eggs, cheese, vegemite and peanut butter, as well as toiletries, soap powders, toilet rolls and other groceries is greatly appreciated.
