

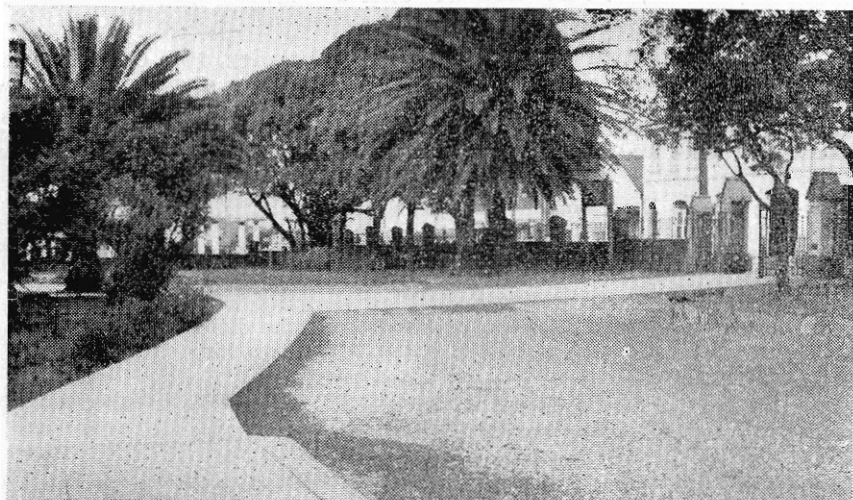

PARISH COUNCIL NEWS

Hon. Secretary, Mr. W. H. Hall reports that the work of restoring the Church Pipe Organ was completed by the Contractors in October. The fully completed organ was first used on Sunday, 18th October, although we were able to use it in a partly finished state on the two preceding Sundays.

The repairs to the Frederick Street brick fence have also been completed.

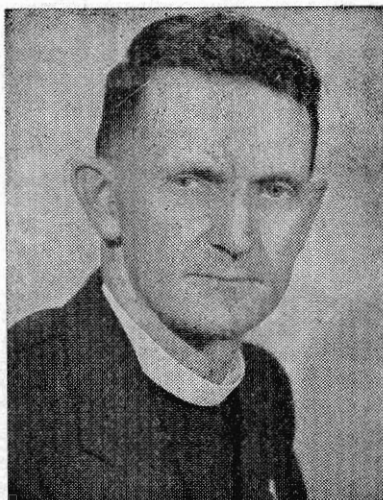

CONFIRMATION SERVICE



This is a last minute reminder that our 1964 Confirmation Service will be held on Monday, 2nd November at 8 p.m. The Sacred Rite of Confirmation will be administered by Bishop Clive Kerle, Co-adjutor Bishop of Sydney, and Bishop-Elect of Armidale.

This is a Service that should be supported by all parishioners, who by their presence, may show their personal interest in and encouragement of the young folk seeking to be confirmed. We stress that this Service is on a Monday, and not a Sunday night.

FETE NEWS

Once again, we are seeking to surpass the All Saints' Fete record of £1,340, set only last year. Prime aim of this Fete is to raise money to seal the Church grounds and to carry out a number of urgent repairs.

Here are some final reminders of help that you can give our stalls:

- **Refreshments:** The ladies cater for all meals from morning tea to supper, and would appreciate gifts of cakes, scones, butter, tea, sugar, or sandwich fillings. Could any such donations be left at the Parish Hall kitchen on the day of the Fete, please?
- **Vegetables:** Stocks will be secured at the Chinese Market Gardens, Arncliffe, on the morning of the Fete. This way, we get lovely fresh lettuce, carrots, rhubarb, beetroot, spinach, etc., the heavy demand for which has caused stocks to sell out by lunch time in the last few years. Donations of home grown produce would also be very gratefully received.
- **Groceries and Jams:** The Sunday School pupils and staff have been busy bringing groceries for their stall, but donations of home made jams would be especially welcome, as they always sell very well at the Fete.
- **Books:** Mrs. Millarey (LM 1643) is seeking used books for her stall. Give her a ring if you can make a donation.
- **Pottery:** Once again, Mrs. Champion and Mrs. Ingoldsby-Brown, will be conducting this stall, with special stocks from Diana Pottery, as well as other items. Any donations towards stocks would be greatly appreciated.
- **White Elephant:** This stall sells what other people don't want! A complete marquee outside the Hall will be devoted to "White Elephant" stocks, and we hope all parishioners will assist by donating things for which they have no further use around their homes. Let any Y.C.I. member or the Rector know, and collection will be gladly arranged.

Added Attractions

The James Bell "Punch and Judy Shows" as featured on Channel 7 will be presented free at 2.30 p.m. and 3.30 p.m. The Sydney Thistle Highland Band will play and march in the grounds from 1.30 p.m., while there will be pony rides and a merry-go-round in action all day.

A Free Poultry Dinner will be given to the lucky person who signs the Visitors' Book at the Hall door. The lucky visitor will be chosen at 9 p.m. on the night of the Fete.

Refreshments will be served by the Guild from morning tea until supper, and drinks, ice cream and "hot dogs" will be on sale all day.

Truly the biggest and brightest Fete in the Western Suburbs, our Fete will go from 10 a.m. to 10 p.m., wet or fine, so keep the 21st November free all day.

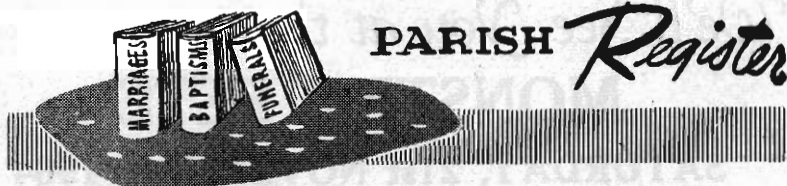
