## THE RECTOR'S LETTER.

All Saints' Rectory,  
30th September, 1935.

Dear People of All Saints'.

October will be the Children's and Young People's month. There is the Children's Festival on October 20, the Children's Tea on October 22, and, above all, the beautiful and Sacred Rite of Confirmation, will be administered by His Grace the Archbishop on October 27.

October 20, the day of the Children's Festival, is to be observed as Children's Sunday throughout the Diocese. Our Lord set an enormously high value upon a child, partly because of what it was and partly because of what it COULD be. The children are the men and women of the future, and we bring them on their Festival Sunday and set them "in the midst," as our Lord did on that memorable occasion described in St. Matthew's Gospel. We therefore have a right to expect that the parents of the children will have sufficient interest in them and in what the Sunday School is endeavouring to do for them, to make a special point of attending the services arranged for Sunday, October 20.

Parents and friends of the candidates are specially bidden to the CONFIRMATION SERVICE on Sunday morning, OCTOBER 27th, at 11 o'clock. Where it is possible, the Godparents of these young people should be invited to this service, to witness the Confirmees taking upon themselves the promises which their Godparents undertook for them in infancy.

The newly confirmed will make their First Communion at the 8 o'clock Celebration on Sunday, November 3, which is our PATRONAL FESTIVAL, and for which special services are being arranged. They are also invited to the Communion Breakfast at the conclusion of the Celebration on that Sunday. I refer you to page 8 for details of these services.

It would give me great pleasure if those whom I had the privilege of preparing for Confirmation in 1932, 1933, and 1934, would accept this invitation to be present at the Celebration on November 3, both as an ACT OF REMEMBRANCE of their own Confirmation and First Communion, and also as an ACT OF FELLOWSHIP with the newly-confirmed.

We are living in most uncertain times, and it behoves us to do all we can by prayer, by word, and by example, to develop the right attitude of mind—the Peace mind, especially amongst young people. Do not be carried away by glamour, noise, advertisement, superficial glitter and a flair for publicity. Posturing, saluting, flag-waving and showmanship seem to be carried, in some countries, to perfection; but these are not the things by which men live. Examine them closely, think over them, and you will come to see that a Christian democracy is a far better and healthier thing than any of these pagan tyrannies.

The argument is used that "the world without strife would be mere decay," but why anyone should imagine that the profession of arms—which means war—is the only or the best means of exercising our human and necessary fighting instinct, when there are so many evils within and around us which need to be fought, simply passes my comprehension. The fundamental evil of war is that it treats men as things—it is not consistent with the teaching of Christ. Admiral Mark Kerr's appeal to the American people to put into force throughout the world an Eleventh Commandment: "Thou shalt not go to war," comes to mind with special force at this time.

At the beginning of a new quarter I commend once again to those amongst you who have not yet adopted it, the Envelope System of Offertory. There is no better system of giving, nor any which can more successfully relieve those who have the responsibility of Church finances of anxiety, if adopted conscientiously by a congregation.

We are grateful to our friend, Canon E. Howard Lea, for his helpful address at Evensong on the Feast of St. Michael and All Angels, when he spoke from the words "Are they not all ministering spirits"?

## MATTERS MAINLY PAROCHIAL.

There is to be a Community Night on Wednesday, October 9th, in the Parish Hall, which will be conducted by Mr. Hammond. We expect the co-operation of all organisations in this effort. The admission is the small sum of sixpence.

**All Saints' Sunday School.**—The Kindergarten decided to have a direct link with missionary work in India, and the little ones brought a special offering for this purpose. The result exceeded expectations, and over £1/10/- will be forwarded to Mrs. G. F. Cranswick to help on the work among Indian children.

October may be regarded as "Children's Month," as there will be a number of functions in connection with the School; firstly, the "Parents' Night" will have taken place prior to this report being read, then on Sunday, October 20th, the "Children's Festival" will be held; there will be three services — 11 a.m., 3 p.m., and 7.15 p.m. — of a special character, with appropriate addresses, while the singing of the Scholars will be a feature.

We trust that Parents and all interested in the work of the School will attend the services in large numbers and help make the Festival a great success.

On Tuesday, the 24th, the "Festival Tea" takes place at 6.30 p.m. The Tea is for Scholars only; admission 3d. An entertainment will follow, to which we invite all interested friends; admission by silver coin. We would be grateful to receive any donations towards the financing of the tea.

Preparations are in hand for the "Shopping Carnival" to be held on Saturday, November 16th, and any assistance in stocking the stalls would be appreciated.

**Deaconess Children's Home.**—The Committee of the Children's Home in connection with the Church of England Deaconess Institution will hold the annual Gift Day and Rally of Friends at the Home, 57 Albert Road, Homebush, on Tuesday, October 29th, at 2.45 p.m. On this occasion the Hon. Lady Hore-Ruthven has kindly consented to be present. The Home, with which is incorporated a Domestic Training School, is the oldest Church of England establishment of the kind which has been carrying on this valuable work among children.

It is hoped that the Gift Day will be made an opportunity for inspecting the Home by old and new friends.

His Grace the Archbishop of Sydney has signified his intention of being present, and will preside at the meeting.

**Women's Guild.**—The third quarterly Rally of the Guild was held on 12th September, and despite the heavy rain there was a good attendance. The Rector, who is giving a series of addresses at the Rallies, took for his subject "The Land of the Second Mile." At the conclusion of the service a social hour was spent in the Parish Hall, when Mrs. Lindsay's and Miss Adams' groups entertained at afternoon tea. Opportunity was taken by the members

to thank the Rector for his most interesting and helpful talks at these meetings.

At the conclusion of the meeting on 26th inst., when the Guild members combined with other organisations in the B.C.A. evening, a short business meeting was held. It was decided to combine with the Women's Guild of St. Augustine's, Stanmore, in organising the Sweets Stall in connection with the A.B.M. Fete. A letter was read from the Secretary of C.M.S. Women's Auxiliary, thanking our Guild members for a donation of £5 towards C.M.S. Fete.

Saturday, 14th September, the Guild arranged a Musicale in aid of the M.O.P. Fund. A very enjoyable time was spent, and the Fund benefited to the extent of £11/5/-. **Y.C.I. Report.**—Lecturettes were the special feature of the first meeting in September, and the speakers were drawn from the ranks of the Institute itself. They provided one of the most interesting and entertaining nights in Institute affairs for many months. The subjects treated were varied, and comprised of the following:—"Impressions of Fiji," Mr. W. D. Simpson; the "Way of Abattoirs and the Australian Meat Industry," Mr. A. J. Walters; "The Romance of the Cricket Bat from the Willow to the Player," Mr. R. F. Atkinson; "Strange Cases of a Solicitor," Mr. M. A. Buckley; "The Human Senses and their Reactions," Mr. I. Gash.

The other September meeting was devoted to a discussion on "Books and Authors," with the Librarian in the chair. Mr. J. T. Hollands opened the proceedings with a review of the life and works of H. G. Wells, and dealt particularly with his book, "The Food of the Gods." Other speakers were Mr. Alec Hunter on Brian Penton's "Land-takers"; Mr. D. B. Hunter on Ethel Mannin's "Sounding Brass"; Mr. L. C. Calver on a book dealing with the memoirs of a member of the A.I.F.; Mr. Harold Jones on the American writer, Sewell Ford; and Mr. Atkinson with "Wars of the 'Nineties." This last book brought the Abyssinian problem into the discussion, and "Books and Authors" were superseded by a frank and telling discussion on the present Italo-Abyssinian dispute.
