THE RECTOR'S LETTER.

All Saints' Rectory,

26th October, 1936.

Dear People of All Saints',—

Ere this letter reaches you the 1936 candidates will have been confirmed on All Saints' Day, and will thus have passed through the gateway which admits them to the Sacrament of Holy Communion. During the thirteen weeks of careful preparation I have endeavoured to stress the fact that Confirmation is not a dead-end of their religious life, but a **Beginning**, which must lead them to greater responsibilities, and the seeking some avenue of service for Christ and His Church.

Will you please pray earnestly for the newly-confirmed, that they may have the moral courage to be true and loyal to Christ, and that they may keep the promises they will make at their Confirmation? In these days it is so terribly easy to drift away from all good influences, and we need to give these young people every support we possibly can. Whether they become slack and indifferent, and by outside influences drift into the crowd which puts self first, or whether they remain with those who are endeavouring to put God first depends, to a very great extent, upon the earnestness and sincerity of their preparation; but it also depends much (how much, you perhaps have never realised) upon the example of their parents and elders. I am sometimes amazed that the Church retains the loyalty of many of our young people, in view of the apathy and indifference of their parents.

This letter may come into the homes of parents who have not attended church or partaken of Holy Communion for years. If so, will you not make the Confirmation of your boy, or your girl, an occasion for a new beginning? You can encourage them best by coming **WITH** them; and if it so happens that you cannot attend because you have not been confirmed, arrangements can easily be made for your preparation. No one can plead a lack of opportunity. I earnestly ask you to consider seriously the very grave responsibility that is yours when you absent yourself from all association with your Church, and so give your young people a totally false impression. In view of the many anti-religious forces at work in the world to-day, one would think that parents and those who are in any way concerned with the training of the young, would use every endeavour to build up their characters so that when they go out into the world they will be well-equipped to meet such forces.

I trust you will not think I am writing in pessimistic mood, but I wish something might be done to break down the apathy and indifference of parents. I have read somewhere that for every thousand parents who look after the child's body, a hundred will study the mind, but only ten will include the spirit. That means that there are thousands of children physically and mentally fed, but spiritually starved. A wise Church will recognise that "prevention is better than cure," and that her chief duty must be the building up of a strong spiritual life in our youth as the surest method of reducing the numbers of spiritually atrophied, whose existence is no less dangerous to the nation than it is distressing to us.

Whilst we have cause to thank God for the many devoted, self-sacrificing people, without whom we could not carry on, there are many more whose barrier of apathy we do not seem to be able to penetrate. After the disappointment of the very poor response to an evening arranged by the Kindergarten staff to discuss ways and means of financing the building of the proposed Kindergarten Room, we have been mightily cheered and encouraged by the generous offer of Mr. R. C. C. Calver to contribute £200 towards the cost of a brick room (in memory of his late wife) which we propose to call "The Charlotte Calver Memorial Kindergarten." Remembering the late Mrs. Calver's love for little children, this will be a particularly fitting memorial, and we are more grateful than we can express to Mr. Calver for this generous gift. It puts the much desired kindergarten actually within sight, and should inspire the rest of us to do what we can, whether little or much, to raise immediately the additional £100 which it is roughly estimated we shall need in addition to the foregoing and the £50 kindly promised months ago by Miss Belfield. Will you send your donations in to myself, to the Superintendent, or any member of the staff, as soon as possible, so that the work may be put in hand with the least possible delay? "He gives twice who gives quickly!"

I commend to your interest and support the Sunday School's "Shopping Carnival" to be opened by Miss Williamson, on November 14, in aid of the Picnic and Prize Fund. We hope that the many who did not come last year will show some tangible evidence that we as a Sunday school are not, this year, entirely beyond the interest of All Saints' people!

Please note our Festival Services are continued on November 8, details of which have already been published in the October "Chronicle."

Meriden C. of E. Grammar School for Girls, Strathfield.—The Principal has forwarded the Rector the following particulars regarding the Entrance Scholarship Examination. There may possibly be girls in this parish who would like to enter this Church School:—

An Entrance Scholarship, valued at £12 per annum, and tenable for three years, subject to recommendation by the Principal, is offered by the Council of the above School for 1937, for girls 13 years of age or under. The examination is to be held at the School on Monday, 16th November. Application Form and full particulars from the Principal. Entries close on Thursday, 12th November. The subjects of examination are as for the Primary Final Examination, English, History, Geography, Arithmetic, with the addition of an easy paper on the Gospel Story. Candidates are requested to be at Meriden by 9.15 a.m. on Monday, 16th November.

Y.C.I.—The first Y.C.I. meeting, held in September, was devoted to impromptu speeches. The subjects discussed were of a varying nature, and as wide apart as Institute affairs and International politics; Church dogma, and Olympiad; Social problems and the coming Cricket season.

At the second meeting the members were paid a visit by the Revd. G. Stuart Watts, Editor of the "Church Standard," who addressed the meeting on The Problems that Confront the Christian Church. After outlining the ethics of Christianity, the speaker passed on to review many of the difficulties of the world to-day: touching on unemployment, the various social movements and the political schools of thought; war and pacifism, and the part the Church was playing in the lives of men.

At the end of his address he engaged the members in a discussion on the subject, in which many new avenues of thought were opened up. The members were delighted with Mr. Watts' visit, and were impressed with his vivid personality, his keen sense of humour, and his deep and profound learning.—D. B. Hunter, P. & L.S.

The special speaker for the occasion was Miss Vaughan-Jenkins, who proved most interesting and thought-provoking in her talk with her first-hand knowledge of the courage and endurance of the women in the lonely parts of our land. There was an excellent attendance, and the very liberal response to the appeal was most gratifying. A most enjoyable evening was brought to a close with supper, which was provided by some of the members of the executive.

A.B.M.—The Chairman and Organising Secretary for N.S.W. write as follows:—

The Executive Committee for New South Wales of the Australian Board of Missions desires to bring before you the claim which the Missionary enterprise of the Church makes on the assistance of your parish. The progress of Missionary work among non-Christian peoples wholly depends on the measure of support which it receives, in prayer and money, from the Home Church. To us of the Church in Australia has been especially committed the great and difficult task of evangelising the Aborigines of this country and the primitive Islanders of the South-West Pacific, and since its inception in 1850 the Australian Board of Missions has been the Church's recognised agent in the fulfilment of this task. The records of its Missionary advance in these fields in the past is one of which the whole Church may well be proud. The need, however, to-day of the entire support of the whole Church in maintaining and extending the work is as urgent as ever, and we therefore plead with you to encourage the people of your parish to take their full and responsible share in the discharge of so sacred and so compelling a task.

The Board of Missions has assigned to the Diocese of Sydney the duty of endeavouring to raise the sum of £4,000 for the year June 1st, 1936, to May 31st, 1937, and the share of this sum which it is suggested that your parish should aim at contributing is £27. We sincerely hope that you will accept this suggested amount as that which you will use your best endeavour to contribute through your parish.
