WOMEN'S WORLD DAY OF PRAYER

Mrs. Rathie Selvaratnam, wife of the Rev. A.J.C. Selvaratnam of St. Paul's, Euroa, Victoria, and well known in ACW Circles has been invited by the International Committee of the World Day of Prayer to attend the Global Centenary Celebrations of World Day of Prayer at New York in May 1986.

Rathie writes -

Little did I dream when as a young teenager accompanying my mother to the Women's World Day of Prayer services in St. Paul's Cathedral, Singapore, that one day I would be elected the first Chairman of the International Committee of the World Day of Prayer at Anderson, Indiana, U.S.A. in 1967. As Chairman of the Asian Church Women's Conference, it was my privilege to write the WDP Order of Service for 1968, "Bear Ye One Another's Burdens".

To participate in the Global Centenary celebrations is to be part of the goodly heritage, begun in Faith by Mrs. Mary Ellen James in 1887, and continued by women around the world over the years, fulfilling in some measure the petition of the Lord, "That they may all be one".

The services through the decades written by women of different cultures and races have shown their imagination, talents, creativity and vibrant Faith in God who is Lord of history. Let us pray that the vision, strength and commitment that inspired the International Committee of the World Day of Prayer in the past continue to guide it as it steps into the second century, leading women and men to pray and work to avert a nuclear holocaust. Then "the Kingdoms of the World shall become the Kingdom of our Lord and His Christ and He shall reign for ever and ever."

ECUMENICAL UPDATE

BISHOP OF SAXONY FOR A.C.C. ANNUAL MEETING

Guest speaker for 1986 ACC A.G.M. will be the Rt. Rev. Johannes Hempel, Bishop of the Evangelical Lutheran Church of Saxony in the German Democratic Republic.

Bishop Hempel, a President of the W.C.C. and widely known for his work for Peace, expects to be in Australia 2nd - 15th July.

CASH TO MOZAMBIQUAN REFUGEES

An immediate emergency grant of A\$50,000 has been sent to help feed refugees from Mozambique in ZIMBABWE. There are 20,240 such people in four camps. The Government had run out of money to buy food for them and approached "Christian Care".

WHEAT FLOUR FOR ETHIOPIA

1,750 tonnes of wheat flour is being sent from Adelaide bound for Ethiopia to be used as part of the feeding programme being conducted by the Christian Churches in that land. ACC shares in the cost of over \$1.3 million with Australian Baptist World Aid, Australian Lutheran World Service and Australian Catholic Relief.

AUSTRALIAN EUCALYPTS FOR ETHIOPIA a Force 10 Project

Six Million eucalypt seedlings have been raised in Gama Goffa Province of Southern Ethiopia as part of a vital programme to halt the spreading desert. Overgrazing and clearing of land for fuel and agriculture have denuded native woodlands which once provided abundant fruit, herbs, animal forage and honey. About 200,000 hectares are destroyed each year. 10 tree nurseries are being established and local farmers instructed on the importance of trees.



Force 10 is assisting as part of its Project of the year: Africa's People - Africa's Future.

JUBILEE FLOWER DAY IN S.A.

To celebrate the fact that Combined Church women's involvement began in S.A. with a committee representing various denominations, appointed to organise a Float in the Centenary Flower Day procession in 1936, the S.A. Unit of A.C.W. entered a Float in this year's Flower

Day procession.

A successful Film Morning with Trading Table raised \$841 to finance the venture and a sub-committee worked very hard with the details of planning and execution.

Their efforts were rewarded when Felicity, a beautiful Clydesdale horse, stepped out in plume and flowers pulling the decorated cart with our A.C.W. Badge mounted on a pyramid of golden marigolds and ivy.

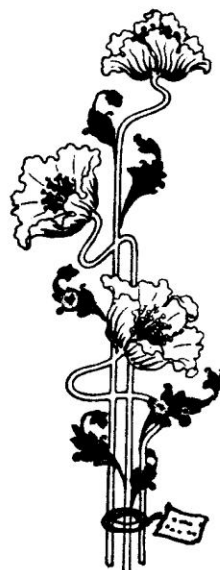
The two meter circles comprised a background of hydrangea petals, dried and stuck in place with 'AUSTRALIAN CHURCH WOMEN' picked out in orange daisies. These surrounded the map of Australia formed by a mass of orange marigolds. The large Cross made of hundreds of tiny white daisies and fine silver ribbon radiated from the centre.

One badge was placed in front and another on the back. Underneath were the words - "UNITY, SERVICE, WORSHIP" with flowers proclaiming "50 YEARS 1936 - 1986"

Six members wearing gowns and bonnets of a bye-gone era carried baskets of small posies each with a text, and these were distributed to onlookers along the route.

"How Lovely" were the words of the Queen when she was presented with a posy. She later sent a message of commendation for the Float. We were surprised and elated to receive 4th prize - a silver cup and a Jubilee sash.

CONSULTATION ON NATIONAL AGENDA FOR WOMEN

On February 25 in Sydney, the Australian Council of Churches' Commission on the Status of Women, along with other agencies sponsored a consultation on the Federal Government's proposed National Agenda for Women, one of a series to be held around Australia. Its purpose was to allow women to express their views on the Government's draft Agenda for advancing the status of women in our society.

About 130 attended to make their views known to Senator Susan Ryan, the Minister assisting the Prime Minister on the Status of Women. A wide range of issues raised included education and training, sex discrimination, domestic violence, reproductive technology and peace.

Women, either individually or as groups can make written submissions to Senator Ryan, Parliament House, Canberra A.C.T. (Brochures including a Questionnaire will be available shortly).

WOMEN, TECHNOLOGY AND THE FUTURE



The ACC's Commission on the Status of Women is to participate in an Impact Seminar on Women and Technological Futures in Sydney in May 1986. The Seminar is being sponsored by the N.S.W. Government and the Commonwealth Government Commission for the Future. Seminars will be conducted in all capital cities.

The aim is to create a forum for the Commission for the Future to work co-operatively with the host State Governments and to receive submissions on important issues relating to the impact of science and technology on the future of social organisation in this country.

Submissions in Sydney will include - Technology and Work.... Education, Training....Scientific & Technological Research..... Information Access and Participatory Structures.

Key issues in other States - S.A. - Urban Futures. W.A. - Youth, Employment, Technology. Vic. - Management Futures for Business. ACT/NT - Technological Innovation and Aboriginal Futures. Tas. - Socially Useful Technologies.
